PASTORAL LETTER.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church.

MY DEAR FRIENDS :

I invite you to read the following reports, and preserve them for future reference. While not showing extraordinary increase in any department, they are on the whole of a gratifying nature. It is not wise, however, to attach too much importance to mere figures. I find a far deeper ground of thankfulness in the signs of deepening spiritual life amongst us, in your intelligent and sympathetic co-operation with me in my labours, and in the consciousness that these labours, imperfect though they be, are not in vain in the Lord.

The attendance at public worship has been large and regular, the various organizations of the Church have shown a marked degree of efficiency, and perhaps we never had so large a number of willing workers in the congregation as we have to-day.

I desire to express my thanks to the Trustees and Elders of the Church, and to all others who in any way have shown a practical interest in its welfare.

The memory of those who have been removed during the year by the hand of death will long linger with us. Our losses include a venerable and much-beloved Elder and some of the oldest and most faithful members of the Church. I pray that the Divine comfort may be felt by the bereaved families, and that we may have grace to follow those who obeyed their Master on earth and are now entered into rest.

As my conviction deepens year by year that the main duty of the Minister is to prepare himself for the broad Christian culture of his people through his public teaching, the time at my disposal for the lighter task of general pastoral visitation is limited. I feel, however, that it is helpful to me to have a growing knowledge of the home-life of my people ; and I shall never be so much occupied with other work on your behalf as not to find it a joy to bring to the sick and troubled and care-worn a genuine human friendship and the infinite consolation of God.

gation, many of whom, I am glad to say, exhibit an ever-increasing interest in Christian work. Their presence in such large numbers at our services is to me a source of great encouragement, and I shall always deem it a privilege to help them in any way I can.

The Sunday School has been well maintained throughout the year, and the thanks of the whole Church are due to the able Superintendent and to the band of devoted teachers who labour with him. The Sunday School Orchestra has given excellent assistance not only in the School but at our mid-week services, and I greatly appreciate the fidelity shown by its members. The Young People's Society continues to promote a spirit of fellowship and readiness for Christian work.

The Glebe mission has sustained a severe loss in the removal of the Rev. Mr. Winfield to Montreal. His earnest and successful ministry there has laid a solid foundation upon which to build for the future, and he will be followed by the best wishes for his prosperity in the larger field to which his talents so well entitle him. At a recent meeting of the congregation Rev. J. W. H. Milne was the unanimous choice for the vacant pulpit. He has accepted the call, and will shortly enter upon his duties under the most encouraging auspices.

It is my earnest prayer that the year upon which we have entered may be a year of greater devotion to the Master's work with all of us, a year of growth in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

KIRK-SESSION REPORT

In expectation of the very full and interesting reports that are to be presented at this meeting, showing in detail what has been done in the several departments of our Church work during the past year, the Session would only further report that the religious ordinances of the Church have been observed with regularity and undiminished interest by the membership and others, who, though not connected with this Church, frequently avail themselves of its privileges. The attendance at these services has been very encouraging, and in view of the varied means of spiritual edification with which our members have been privileged, there is reason to believe that the use of them has been followed with beneficial results in many lives. Although we may not be able to trace them with accuracy or report them fully, yet the numerous attendance at both morning and evening services on the Lord's Day, the greater interest manifested in the mid-week meetings, the increased attendance at most of the quarterly communions of the congregation, the Christian zeal with which the Church organizations have been sustained, and the generous spirit in which so many of our members have contributed to the missionary and benevolent schemes of the Church—these evidences of Christian activity and spiritual vitality afford gratifying indications of prosperity in our Church life and work for which we lift our hearts in thankfulness to God, and pray that His blessing may attend our further efforts in Christian service throughout the coming year.

The Session, recognizing that, under the Divine blessing, much of this prosperous condition of our Church is due to the ability and faithfulness with which our Pastor has ministered to the congregation in the manifold duties of his office, especially in his pulpit ministrations, they pray that he may be blessed with such measure of bodily health and spiritual power as shall sustain him in his ministry, and that he may be encouraged by seeing the work of the Lord prospering in his hand, and cheered by knowing that many of those to whom he ministers are bringing forth in their lives "the fruit of the spirit, which is in all goodness and righteousness and truth."

supplied by Rev. Principal Grant and Rev. Dr. Smith of Queen's College, Rev. Prof. Ross of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and Rev. Mr. Winfield.

The average attendance at the quarterly communions of the Congregation, which were all observed in the past year, was 256 of our own membership and 34 visiting members from other congregations.

At the commencement of the year the Communion Roll numbered 540 members in full communion with the Church; since then 36 new members have been enrolled, 9 on profession of faith, 23 by certificate from other congregations, and 4 re-admitted after absence. During the same time 33 have been removed from the Roll, 10 by death, 16 by certificate and 7 by action of the Session. The Roll thus adjusted numbers 543, being a net increase of 3 members since last report. The revised roll of the membership at this date is appended and forms part of this report.

The breach which death has thus made in our membership is greater than in most of our past years. The obituary list includes the names of some of the oldest members of this Church, as well as those of more recent connection with it. In the removal of so many much-respected and loyal-hearted members, the Congregation has sustained a serious loss. A breach has also been made in the diminishing ranks of the Eldership; they have lost another much-esteemed senior Elder by the death of Mr. Thomas Borthwick, who died in April last, at the advanced age of 90 years. He was an Elder in this Church for rather more than 45 years. The Session recall his conscientious discharge of duty, his many years' exemplary attendance on the ordinances of the Church, which he continued to observe until the infirmities of age prevented his frequenting the House of God, which he loved, or taking any part in the duties of the Eldership.

For some time past the Session and Congregation have been deprived of the valuable services of Messrs E. H. Bronson and Robert Cassels, who have been laid aside from active duty by reason of failing health. The Session sincerely sympathize with them in this time of their affliction, and express the hope that God in His goodness may be pleased to restore them to health and permit them to resume their duties as office-bearers in this Church.

The Session are intrusted with the plate collections at the Sunday services, and also with the annual contributions of our members to the schemes of the Church. The plate collections have been about the same in amount as those of the previous year. The details of receipts and expenditure of this fund will appear in the Treasurer's Annual Statement. The Treasurer's Statement of the contributions to the Schemes of the Church, and Interest on Church loan, shows the receipt of \$3,529.80 for the past year. The amount at the credit of the fund has been allocated to the several objects named in the Church schedule as follows :—

These allocations, amounting to the sum of three thousand five hundred and thirty-five dollars.

The Glebe Mission Station, which is still under the care of the Session, and assisted, financially and otherwise, by this Church, has increased its membership and prospered in its work under the pastoral care of the Rev. Mr. Winfield, who ministered to the Mission up to the end of December last, when he resigned the charge to accept the pastorate of Melville Church, Westmount. It is hoped that the vacancy thus caused will shortly be filled, as any long delay in a settlement would prove injurious to the Mission in the present stage of its existence. Reports were received from Kirk Session, Kirk Session Financial Statement, Temporal Committee, Glebe Trustees, Home Missionary, Foreign Missionary, Ladies' Aid Society, Poor Relief Committee, Schedule Fund, Sunday School, Young People's Society, Orchestra and Ready Circle King's Daughters.

Moved by Mr. F. H. Chrysler, seconded by Mr. J. W. McRae, that the reports just read be received and adopted, with the exception of the financial statements of the Temporal Committee, Glebe Trustees, Kirk Session and Schedule Fund, and that the Printing Committee be requested to have the said statements printed in galley form and distributed to the Congregation next Sunday, said statements to be considered at an adjourned meeting to be held on the 17th inst. —Carried.

By-Law No. 30.

A By-law of the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland :

NOW, THEREFORE, the said Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland, doth hereby enact and ordain as follows :

1. THAT the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, be required, and they are hereby required and directed to pay to the said Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa,

the sum of \$5,000, to be applied by the said Temporal Committee to the reduction of the mortgage on the Church, held by John Manuel, Esq.

And this By-law shall be sufficient authority to the said Glebe Trustees for payment of the said sum of money, as aforesaid.

Adjourned Annual Meeting.

Adjourned Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, held in the Sunday School Hall this Thursday, March 17th, at 8 p. m.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises by Rev. W. T. Herridge.

Rev. Mr. Herridge in the chair.

Mr. P. Larmonth acted as Secretary.

Minutes of Annual Meeting of March 7th were read and confirmed.

Rev. Mr. Herridge asked Mr. L. Crannell to preside over this meeting. Mr. Crannell took the chair.

Mr. Crannell read a supplementary report of the Temporal Committee.

Report of the Temporal Committee.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church :

Your Committee herewith submit their statement of receipts and expenditures for the Church year, duly audited, showing a balance of \$263.72 due the bank. The accounts for the current year have all been paid, with the exception of \$944.40, being for interest falling due March, 1898.

Your Committee also report that their ordinary revenue, made up entirely of pew rents, nearly pays the regular expenses, leaving out the interest charge and the Glebe mission expenses.

Pew rents should be paid quarterly in advance, according to by-law. This is not done, however, the majority not paying until nearly the end of the year. The consequence is that we have to borrow money to pay salaries, etc., with the result that about \$100 is added to the charge for interest, which amount might be saved.

For the last twenty years or more a sum generally running from \$1,400 to \$2,000 per annum has been taken from the Schedule Fund by the Session and given to your Committee to pay the interest on the Church debt. We think that the same course should be taken for say two or three years more, when we believe the interest charge will be removed, as the debt of the Church will likely be wiped out by that time.

Interest paid year '97-8, was \$2,081.65.

The interest charge this year will likely be nearly \$400 less than last year.

We are informed by Mr. Chrysler that probably \$10,000 will be realized from the Glebe mortgages during the coming fall. If so, the interest charge next year will be reduced another \$500 or more ; consequently as the ordinary revenue nearly equals the ordinary expenses,

a reasonable increase in the Sunday collections will enable the Session to help the Temporal Committee to the amount of the excess expenditure. Many of our members and pewholders are absent from the city for a length of time during the summer, and consequently the Sunday collections are much smaller at that season. We think that if the amount thus withheld was made good on their return to the city, the collections would be quite largely increased and would go a long way towards covering the extra amount required.

During the last two years we have paid towards the expenses of conducting the Giebe mission as follows :

1896-1897	\$ 594 46
1897-1898	474 16

We consider that the building and carrying on of that mission adds to the value of the property, and, if no better way appears, the charge can stand as an overdraft, and later on come out of principal monies from sales of the property, should it be so decided by the congregation.

As regards deficit referred to at annual meeting, Mr. Herridge suggested a way by which a portion could be arranged for at once, and wrote a letter asking to have his salary reduced by the amount of \$500 per annum. This letter was duly considered and the Committee decided at once that such action was not necessary or advisable ; that instead of the reduction it was felt that as soon as the church saw its way clear to do so an increase should be made ; and while we appreciated Mr. Herridge's offer could not recommend the congregation to act on it. We fully believe that in a reasonable time sales of the Glebe property may be made to a sufficient amount that the balance of the Church and the Manse debt can be taken care of, and thus wipe away all charges for interest and enable a large portion of the subscriptions to the Church schemes to be devoted to such purposes as the donors may wish or the Session in their wisdom may allocate.

In presenting this, their twenty-fifth annual report, the Ladies' Aid Society have much pleasure in stating that the past year has been one of much encouragement and good will.

Regular meetings have been held on the second Friday of each month at 3 p. m., with an average attendance of eleven (11). The Poor Relief Committee an hour later, or at the close of the Wednesday evening service.

At the annual meeting held on the 26th of February last, it was resolved to continue the voluntary system of raising money, and acting upon the suggestion of our president a circular letter, asking the minimum sum of ten cents a month, was distributed by the kindness of the district visitors to the members of the congregation. The amount was to be put into envelopes provided for the purpose, with the name of the giver written on the outside and placed on the collection plate at any of the church services, either monthly or half yearly as best suited the giver. This appeal has been fairly well responded to. The amount realized from this source being \$126.21; donations, \$23; fees, 14.50; balance, \$62.53.

The time and money of the Society has been principally devoted this year to the interests of the Presbyterian Ladies' College. This institution having passed into the hands of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa. Our Pastor, who is President of the Board of Management,

laid before the Society the necessity of making the interior of the College more comfortable and attractive.

The College was visited by a committee of ladies, and the result of their investigations was such that a dinner service, table linen, carpet for one room, four pairs of blankets, four white quilts, one piece of sheeting, one dozen towels, one dozen pillow cases and four pillows were immediately donated.

The "Perley Home for Incurables," associated as it is with the name of our dear President has the sympathy and interest of all our members. A room in this institution, containing three beds, has been furnished by the Society, and the room is to be henceforth known as the "St. Andrew's Ladies' Aid Room."

Other institutions have not been forgotten, the "Home for Friendless Women" receiving one piece of sheeting, the Maternity Hospital twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) towards the erection of a porch, and the Associated Charities ten dollars (\$10.00.)

The anniversary social held on the 26th of January was in a true sense an "At Home" of the congregation. Large numbers were present an excellent programme was rendered by the S. S. Orchestra, members of the choir and their friends, and interesting addresses were given by His Excellency Lord Aberdeen and the Rev. Mr. Herridge. Everyone from Their Excellencies down to the youngest member in the congregation vieing with each other in cordiality and cheerfulness.

The resignation of Mrs. Scott, who is one of the original founders, and Treasurer of the Society for the past twenty-five years, has been accepted with great reluctance. Mrs. Scott's financial statements have been models of accuracy, and the strong helpful energy she always gave to the various undertakings of the Society will never be forgotten. To mark in a small way the love and appreciation the members of the Society bear towards her they have asked her to accept the position of Honorary Treasurer, hoping that with the burden of the work removed she may continue to help on the work of the Society by her wise counsel and loving sympathy.

We have to record with deep sorrow the death of two of our oldest and most valued members, Mrs. Brough and Mrs. McKay. For many years Mrs. Brough had not been able to attend the meetings of the

Society, but always retained her interest in the work, more especially in that of the Poor Relief, as she had in years past been convener of that committee.

As one of our Vice-Presidents, Mrs. McKay will long be regretted. To her church work was always very dear, and we may be pardoned if here we repeat what she once wrote in a work written by herself especially for the benefit of a church, for this reason, that she so well fulfilled in her own life the words she wrote.

"The Christian woman who shows in her daily life the fruits of the spirit which St. Paul so carefully enumerates is to all intents and purposes the true lady ; for Society, as well as Christianity, requires love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, and all things that are lovely ; and the intellect and the heart are both involved in the making of a gentlewoman." "To those who go to the same church, who sit down with us at the same communion table, and whom we meet Sabbath after Sabbath we should show unfailing courtesy of manner, and do them a kindness when we can, and to those belonging to other churches we should show good-will and pleasantness, feeling that though we may be divided here we shall all wish to meet at last 'Beyond the river.'"

In closing this report we desire to thank all those who have so kindly and ably supported us in our work for the past year, and to express the hope that in the years to come we may be able to extend our field of usefulness and to record greater labours of love to the end that we may all receive at last the reward of "Well done, good and faithful servant."

TENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

We will now endeavor to give a short synopsis of the year's work. The meetings have been held regularly on the first Friday of each month, and it is gratifying to note that the attendance has been very well kept up, and several new members have been added to the Society.

The support of a missionary at Lake Dauphin is still the aim of the Society, and from Mr. Gourley, who was appointed to this district in the summer of 1895, most interesting letters are received monthly, and their reading affords the main interest at the meetings.

Lake Dauphin has now a population of 500, and the average attendance at the Presbyterian services under Mr. Gourley is 200.

The new manse has been completed at a cost of \$700, besides the lot, which cost \$150, and the stable \$200. The lot for the church had been given free, but it was not yet built, and the people now worship in the Orange Hall. Mr. Gourley also conducts services weekly at Spruce Creek, where there is an average attendance of 42, and at Valley River of 24. The Ochre district was formerly included in the Dauphin district, but has filled up so rapidly that it had been necessary to have an extra missionary appointed—a Mr. Hogg, who has now established five different preaching stations. At Ochre a new church had been erected, capable of seating 100 people, and occupies a very central and important position. The sum of \$40 was needed to defray its debt, and Mr. Gourley's request that this sum should be taken from the amount already subscribed by this Society, and laid aside for church building, was acceded to, and Dr. Robertson instructed to send Mr. Gourley this money, which he did.

There had been two missionaries all summer in the Gilbert Plains district, and Mr. Gourley had several times dispensed the Sacraments of the Lord's Supper and Baptism. These services have been obliged to be discontinued during the winter, for want of funds, but will be resumed in the summer.

In April last the Home Mission Board decided to remove Mr. Gourley to a new post—Yorkton—and replace him by a man of more

experience, as being more suited to the growing requirements of the congregation, but his people resented this proposed change, and after some explanations and a visit of enquiry to the field by Dr. Robertson and some members of the Board, Mr. Gourley was allowed to stay on until the spring of 1898, when it is hoped that this will become an augmented congregation and proceed to call a pastor of its own. Judging from his letters, the work is not allowed to retrograde at his hands, and he sends full accounts of the services conducted and money raised, and seems especially interested in the young men and children, and the Sunday Schools have grown considerably.

In April the usual thank-offering was held, 40 members being present, and the sum of \$131.55 contributed.

At Christmas the usual box was taken out free, through the kindness of a friend, and was more amply provided than usual with gifts for the Sunday School children—toys, books, cards and warm clothing, while for the elder people were magazines and other reading matter. A large supply of the disused hymn-books were also sent, while to Mr. and Mrs. Gourley a little present of silver spoons from some of the ladies met with hearty appreciation. Mr. Gourley had distributed some of the reading matter among the bachelors and men in the lumber camp, and the gifts to the children had arrived just in time to be distributed at the Christmas tree of the Spruck Creek Sunday School.

A special effort has just been made to increase our finances, in the shape of a tea held in the Manse on January 13th, at which a very large number availed themselves of Mrs. Herridge's hospitality. A pleasant musical programme was rendered, a short address by Mr. Herridge on the work of the Society, a long letter from Mr. Gourley read, and the collection taken, which amounted to \$76.75, and which announcement was received with great delight. \$5 of this came from the Ladies' College, and this evidence of kindly aid and sympathy was much appreciated.

In closing we would record with much regret that we have no longer with us one of our beloved vice-presidents, whose kindly face we so much miss at these meetings, which it was ever her delight to attend, and whose wise counsels and ever-ready assistance were of valuable aid to this Society; and we all feel in Mrs. McKay's death

that we have lost one of our most faithful adherents. May her example and influence be long felt, and stimulate us to further good works!



The teachers are considering the question of organizing what is known in many Sunday Schools as the Home Department, the object being to bring into touch with the School those who, by reason of distance from the School or other cause, are unable to attend, but are desirous of following the studies pursued by the School, and otherwise sharing its privileges. We believe that in this way Bible study in the homes of our people will be encouraged, and we bespeak the co-operation of the congregation in this effort.

In October, 1893, the Sunday School Orchestra was organized by Mr. A. H. Gallup with a strength of six pieces. Since then, each year has seen a numerical increase till it is now composed of some twenty pieces. The work of the Orchestra has also expanded greatly. For the first year or two, only the regular Sunday School services were assisted, but in 1895 the Wednesday evening services were also constituted a part of the Orchestra's duties.

Besides attending these regular services the Orchestra has on several occasions taken part in the various entertainments which have been held from time to time in connection with our own Church and the following sister churches: Hintonburgh, Stewarton, Glebe Mission, Billings' Bridge, French Presbyterian, Merivale and Bank Street Mission Hall. There is also, affiliated with the Orchestra, a quartette which has proved a valuable source to draw upon for musical entertainments.

The Orchestra has been maintained wholly by a grant of fifty (\$50) from the Session and by voluntary contributions from members of the congregation, but these have not been adequate to meet the ordinary

expenses. It is therefore intended to give a Concert on Thursday, March 10th, from which it is hoped to derive sufficient funds to meet all present indebtedness as well as to provide a surplus to aid in carrying on the work for the coming year.

The success and progress attained by the Orchestra to the present time is in a very large measure due to the untiring efforts of Mr. A. H. Gallup, the organizer and subsequent leader for over three years, H. H. Williams our late leader, and C. H. Clendenning the present leader, all three gentlemen having given a great deal of time towards making the organization a success. Credit is also due to Mr. F. M. S. Jenkins, the church organist, who from time to time has assisted the Orchestra.

The interest which our pastor has always taken in the Orchestra has greatly encouraged the members in their work. The thanks of the Orchestra is also given to the members of the congregation for their sympathy and practical aid.

The prospects for the coming year are very bright and great success is looked for in connection with the Orchestra.
