Glace Bay, N. S., June 4.—The police investigation was continued today. A prominent citizen gave evidence that one of the police officers had served liquor over a bar in town, while in his uniform. According to other testimony a second policeman was seen staggering on one of the main streets, and by a bartender's testimony three others were in the habit of having free drinks in the house.

Rev. William Mele stated on the stand that he had made charges previously and had never materialized. It was common report that liquor dealers were getting a tip before officers reached their place of business to serve the papers.

The investigation has made some stir and promises to make more later on. The case was adjourned until Saturday next.

HORSE CAUSES BAD SMASHUP ON G. T. R.

Toronto, June 4.—A horse made a bad wreck of a double header fast G. T. R. south-bound freight this morning about a mile above Rogers. The horse jumped a fence to the track and when the freight came down a grade it started to run ahead between the rails. The first engine was thrown off the track to the left. The second engine ran clear over the leader and fully two car lengths ahead, then jumped the track to the right.

Twelve of the twenty-eight cars on the train were badly smashed. The train was in charge of Conductor Agel of Palmerston. On the first engine were Engineer George Jeffrey and Fireman R. J. Moorehead. On the second engine, Engineer Munroe and Fireman Collins. Collins escaped without a scratch, but Moorehead, Jeffrey, Munroe and Brakeman John Pettigrew all received painful injuries.



"SHOCKING CONDITIONS" SAY ROOSEVELT'S COMMISSIONERS

Report of Men Sent to Chicago by the President Submitted to U. S. Senate and Congress—It Tells a Story of Criminal Carelessness, Gross Neglect, and Filthy Practices in Packing Houses.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The report of the government inspectors who were sent to Chicago to investigate the conditions in the packing houses, submitted to the senate and congress today and even more sensational than those which were submitted to President Roosevelt, in transmitting the report of James H. Reynolds and Charles P. Neill, the special investigating committee appointed by him, delivered a brief message in which he called attention to the revolting conditions in the Chicago stock yards and the imperative necessity of a radical change. He then told of conditions leading up to the appointment of Messrs. Reynolds and Neill. Their report showed that the packing houses are not kept even reasonably clean and that the method of handling and packing of the meat is grossly careless and filthy.
