the Somme," in which the British initiated their offensive July 1 and depicting the most stirring scenes of that drive have attained such a widespread prominence and discussion that they are now the object of international attention.

The pictures took England by storm, bringing to millions of people who flocked to the moving picture theatres a keener realization of the significance of the Somme offensive than all the newspapers had been able to do through lengthy despatches and official statements from the front.

King George and Queen Mary saw the pictures and the king advised everybody to see them. Lloyd George declared the pictures should reach everyone. Sir Donglas Haig, the British commander in the field, changed some of the subtitles, but found no other changes necessary.

No battle in which the British have been engaged has entailed the use of so many men, so many guns, such vast quantities of such powerful ammunition as the Somme. The Battle of Waterloo was a skirmish compared to the first drive of the British in this conflict.

In July's operations the British casualties were 20,000, or a little less than the total army commanded by Wellington at Waterloo. Long before the big attick was launched preparations were made. Now that the drive is under way there is intense but methodical activity for miles behind this part of the allies' front.

The British government sanctioned the film as an official historical record of one of the greatest episodes in history, and it is the first war film that was ever allowed to pass without coming under official British censorship.

The matter cannot be allowed to rest here. This is a very serious charge which calls for instant action. If such men, as Colonel Bruce and his fellow investigators allege, have been pitchforked into the Medical Service, and are still there, not a day should be lost in getting rid of them; and the country should demand, and must demand, that this horrible situation be cleaued up without a moment's delay.

RAISES THE PAY OF POLICE AND FIREMEN

New York Mayor's Recommended Increases Approved

235 Are Added to Force—Mr. Mitchel Says More Money for Faithful Service is "Urgently Needed and Greatly Deserved"

The New York Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate at a session the other night approved an increase in the pay of first grade policemen from \$1,400 to \$1,450 a year. It also approved increases for captains from \$2,750 to \$8,900, these being one-half of the increases recommended by Commissioner Woods. Likewise it approved an increase for the Chief Inspector of the force from \$5,000 to \$6,000 and for the Borough Inspector of Brooklyn and Queens from \$3,500 to \$4,200 a year.

Upon the mayor's recommendation the committee made provision for 235 policemen to be added to the force during the coming year and for the promotion of forty-three patrolmen to the grade of sergeant. This action in the police department amounts to an added expenditure of \$587,100.

At the same time the committee adopted the mayor's recommendation that first-grade firemen be advanced from \$1,400 to \$1,450 a year and that graineers of steamers be advanced from \$1,600 to \$1,700 a year. These increases involve an added expenditure of \$208,000. In announcing the increases the mayor said:

"This seems to be the smallest measure of recognition that the citizens of New York can accord the policemen and the firence." There is a finer esprit de corps, a marked freedom from graft, and a noticeably increased good record of devotion to duty, self-sacrifice, and bravery. I do not believe that any thoughtful citizen will deny that these raises in salary are urgently needed and greatly deserved.

"What has made it possible for the Board of Estimate to take this step in recognition of the services of the police and firemen is the painstaking economy of the administrative departments under the jurisdiction of the mayor during the last three years, which permitted a reduction of the aggregate of the budgets
