Athens, Nov. 25—Greece has met the demands of the Entente powers and given guarantees that requirements will be fulfilled.

London, Nov. 25—Although the full text of the Greek government's reply to the Entente powers' note had not yet been made public in England, there is every indication that the British government is satisfied with the position taken at Athens. The assurances given by Greece differ in marked degree from the previous expressions of benevolent neutrality. They are neither vague nor evasive, but promise explicitly that no similar measures will be taken against the Serbian, French or British troops in case they retreat to Greek





THE WAR NEWS.

The good news of today is that Greece has agreed to the terms of the Allies and that a source of danger in that quarter has been removed. The Allies are now free to develop their plan of campaign, and yesterday's cables intimated that they might have a surprise in store for the enemy. The realization of this hope would be intensely gratifying, for though the Serbs are fighting with great decemination their country has been largely over-run by the enemy and the situation of their armies is still critical. The news from Roumania is again a little more favorable.

In an address in Ottawa last week on the German philosopher Nietzsche, whose teachings had so demoralizing an affect upon the German mind, Prof. H.

I. Stewart of Dalhousie University, culled the following among other salient points from Nietzsche's writings:—

"Germany is suffering from two gross narcoties, alcohol and Christianity."

"The Christian religion has done more to blast civilization than anything else."

"The sin of sins in Germany is obaracter softening," the subservience of the nation to the doctrines of equality."

Prof. Stewart summarised the chief features in Prussian philosophy as "brutal callousness, the assumption that the proletariat was created for the do-
