WILL FINISH IN STYLE

(Canadian Courier)

No more splendid phrase has been coined in this war period than that sent over by Lieut.-Col. E. W. B. Morrison of the Canadian artillery. Colonel Morrison was editor of the Ottawa Citizen for years, but his enthusiasm for soldiering took him to South Africa for the campaign of 1900 and eventually led him into the militia department. Writing home after Langemarck he said: "Whatever may happen, I think Canada can depend that we will finish in style." Such a phrase is an inspiration. To those of us who are forced to stay home and miss the glory of it, there is a lesson. We, too, must finish in style. Whatever must be done to support our soldiers abroad, whatever is necessary to produce the supplies that are needed, whatever is advisable in the Empire's interest must be done, no matter what the cost. We, too, must finish in style, even if that should mean the effacement of our most thrilling occupations—the playing of petty politics and the scrapping over political patronage.

Putnam Stevens, of Portland, Me., present Imperial Deputy Potentate, will probably succeed to the high dignity of Imperial Potentate, on the retirement of the present royal leader, Dr. Frederick R. Smith, of Rochester, N. Y.



HORSE ARTILLERY IN ACTION SOON

Long Wait of Crack Canadian Battery About Over

QUERY IN COMMONS

Under Secretary of War Tennant Admitted Difficulty in Placing Them—Delay is no Reflection on Men

London, June 10.—R. P. Houston, Conservative member of Toxteth, addressed a series of questions to the under secretary of war in the house of commons regarding the alleged undue detention in England of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, under command of Colonel Fane, and upon the efficiency of the unit and its officers. Mr. Houston explained that Colonel Fane had had great difficulty in managing his men in consequence of their disappointment and keenness to go to the firing line, and in many cases they had deliberately absented themselves and stowed away to France with other units, only to be discovered and sent back to Maresfield Camp.

Are you aware, asked Houston (1) whether the R. C. H. A. landed in England so far back as October 16, and are still at Maresfield, although the other three of the four units comprising the Brigadier General Seely's column, the Canadian Dragoons, Strathcona's Horse and the 2nd King Edward's Horse have already been in the trenches; (2) whether the Canadian Horse forms part of the permanent force Canada and its commanding officer is one of the best and most efficient Canadian regular soldiers; (3) whether the government-general has assured the brigade before its departure that they would be utilized immediately; and (4) whether their detention was due to their being armed with the 18-pounder gun.

Mr. Tennant replied that the facts stated regarding the early part of the question are substantially accurate. He had no information as to what the Duke of Connaught told the battery before it left Canada. I have every reason to believe Colonel Fane to be a very efficient officer.
