CANT JOIN WOMAN'S KILLED IN GASPE

MRS. H. A. MENGE IS VICTIM OF AUTO ACCIDENT

Husband and Daughter, Kathleen, Badly Injured

CAR OVER A CLIFF

Turned Off Road by Rut and Crashes Through Fence; Drops 55 Feet

MRS. HILDA MENGE, wife of Henry A. Menge, local manager of the Dominion Life Insurance Co. and resident at 100 Main street, North End, is dead; her daughter, Kathleen, aged 15, is said to be greatly shocked, and Mr. Menge himself is seriously injured as a result of their Dodge sedan falling over a cliff 55 feet high on a precipitous roadway at St. Simons, P. Q., between New Carlisle and Gaspe yesterday afternoon.

News of the accident trickled through meagrely last night to relatives and friends in this city. The place at which the accident occurred is a straggling hamlet on the mountainous roadside skirting Bay Chaleur about 20 miles west of New Carlisle, and about 70 miles from Campbellton. The place is not easily accessible by telephone and the Times-Star secured its information through the kindness of Manager Gordon of the railway facilities at New Carlisle, who seems to have been suffering in his attention on behalf of the unfortunate family.

Body Coming Home The body of Mrs. Menge is today being brought to N. W. Brennan & Sons, funeral directors of this city, with instructions to have the body placed in a casket at Fernhill until details for formal burial can be arranged, pending the examination of the car by the coroner at Campbellton Hospital, to which he is being removed. The railway manager is making special transportation arrangements and using his own automobile in this connection.

TERRIFYING ACCIDENT Details of the accident tell a terrifying story. It appears from information supplied by those who survived the serious injury that the car was proceeding along the picturesque roadway on the Bay Chaleur shore en route to St. John from Gaspe, Quebec, where the Menge family was visiting their former neighbors and close friends, Mr. and Mrs. J. Murray Holly, who removed from North End but a few months ago to the Quebec village because of Mr. Holly's business change. Miss Carrie Holly, nurse, was in the party. The car was making consistently good time, but not oversteering, as Mr. Menge is a careful driver.

DASHED OVER CLIFF In crossing a small culvert the car was jolted in a rut. Attempting to recover steering control the driver, an unexpected bump, the sedan whirled into a rut in the highway. This double difficulty seemed to disconcert the driver and the car jumped the ditch into a field and went through a rail fence. A heavy rail being dislodged, tripped the automobile, as it was and upset it. This was near the edge of a precipice and when overturned the car slid down a rocky slope fifty feet below on the black, rocky, seaweed-strewn shore of Bay Chaleur.

KILLED INSTANTLY The tide was out at the time, else the crushed car might have been submerged as well, endangering the lives of those who survived the fall. It was evident Mrs. Menge met her death instantly, her head being terribly bruised through the impact of the steel-clad car with the rocks. The daughter, Kathleen, suffered from general shock; other injuries which by comparison are considered minor. The boy, Harold, and Miss Holly miraculously escaped unhurt, though horrified at being in such close quarters with disaster and such an appalling plight as to tumble over a sheer cliff.

TAKEN TO VILLAGE STORE It was some time before aid reached the stricken party, as the hamlet nearby is but a few straggling houses. The injured folks were taken to country store and residence, where Dr. Theriault of the neighborhood and later Dr. Morrill of New Carlisle rendered medical and surgical aid. The remains of Mrs. Menge were eventually conveyed to New Carlisle. As the Menge family has no relatives in this part and their closest friends are the Hollys of Gaspe, it was quickly decided to give over the funeral arrangements to the morticians here.

FRIENDS TO THEIR AID It was thought the boy, Harold, would return to Gaspe with Mr. and Mrs. Murray Holly, who would arrive during the forenoon at the scene of the accident. Upon Miss Holly, the nurse,

BISHOP'S SERMON DRAWS CRITICISM. Attack by Rev. Dr. Barnes on Anglo-Catholic Doctrine Causes Stir.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—English church circles are greatly stirred by the publication of an appeal made by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of all England, to prevent a recurrence of a serious attack on the sacramental system and doctrine of the Church of England, which is alleged to have been made in a sermon preached by the Bishop of Birmingham in Westminster Abbey on June 14.

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AUTO TRAFFIC MAKES RECORD

U. S. Official Says 97,000 Cars Have Crossed St. Croix

F. Q. Twitchell, Immigration Inspector, Says Staff Had to be Enlarged.

Franklin Q. Twitchell, superintendent of immigration for the United States government in the Saint John-Vancouver district, arrived in the city today after a tour of Maine on duties connected with his position. He says that tourist traffic into New Brunswick via the Calais-St. Stephen bridge is this year enormously greater than ever before.

NOT ALL TOURISTS. While all of the 97,000 cars were not tourists, the vast majority were. Local bridge traffic between the two towns and vicinity was easily computed. Many of the cars simply went around the block, as it were, via Woodstock, Houlton and other up-province points. Others kept right on towards St. John and Fredericton.







Under all the circumstances the resumption of work was the only hopeful avenue, and conditions should now tend to improve rapidly.





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

MANY YEARS IN WELFARE WORK

S. Merritt Wetmore Passes Away in Hospital at Age of 74

Long Time Agent of Society for Prevention of Cruelty—Active in St. Jude's.

In the death of S. Merritt Wetmore, which occurred last night about 11.30 at the General Public Hospital, the community loses one of its best known and most highly respected citizens.

Mr. Wetmore was of United Empire Loyalist descent. He was a son of the late Stephen P. and Sarah Littlehale Wetmore and was the last survivor of a large family. He was born on the West Side and lived there all his life.

Formerly Surveyor. In his younger days he was a lumber surveyor. He always took a keen interest in welfare work and was especially interested in the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty.

On the death of his brother, James J. Wetmore, he accepted the office of secretary of that society and secretary of the Municipal Home Board and for 29 years he very efficiently carried out the duties of both offices.

In his work he visited all parts of the province and came in close touch with all classes of the community. His tact and kindly feeling won for him friends wherever he went and he did much to better conditions under which animals were kept and worked.

Last winter he complained of not feeling very well and five weeks ago he went to the hospital for an operation. For a time he seemed to rally and hopes were held out for his recovery.

MEMBER OF ST. JUDE'S.

Mr. Wetmore was a lifelong member of St. Jude's church, West Saint John. For more than 30 years he was vestryman and about eight years ago he was chosen as one of the wardens, a position which he held from that time until his death. He was one of the most active workers in the church.

He was an enthusiastic curler and one of the most active members of the Carleton Curling Club.

Mr. Wetmore was survived by his wife, formerly Miss Mayes, and by a large circle of nieces and nephews.

BAXTER AND POTTS DECLARED CHOSEN

Ballot Discloses Troubles of One Who Wanted to Split Vote.

Two peculiar ballots were found by the sheriff this morning when he was checking up the returns of the boys' election of Saint John in the recent election. Both were found in No. 10 booth, East Saint John. After checking up the returns Sheriff Wilson, returning the floor for the county, declared Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. and E. L. Potts elected. The vote stood as follows: Baxter, 801; Potts, 802; Current, 2291; Ross, 218.

This gave Mr. Baxter a majority of 890 and Mr. Potts a majority of 771, practically as first announced. On one of the ballots was written "God despise no man" and on another the following: "I realize the four candidates are good men. My choice has been Dr. Baxter and Dr. Current, but both have pleaded no split ballot. I cannot vote for party owing to the low moral state of both parties. I must accept the result prescribed by others and hope for the best."


Roxborough Lodge Meeting of Interest


TO CONSIDER RATES
