Ottawa, April 12—(Canadian Press)—Since the coming into effect of the Calder act, for the superannuation and retirement of aged members of the civil service, on July 1 of last year, 1,599 employes of sixty-five years and over have been reported upon by the various department heads. Of this number, 650 were recommended for retirement, either from ill health, advanced age, by personal request or otherwise. Seventy-two of this number were contributors to the civil service superannuation and retirement fund.

EUROPEAN TRIP

Among the passengers who arrived here yesterday afternoon on the C. P. O. S. liner Victorian was J. J. McGowan of this city, who has been in England, France and Belgium in connection with the C. P. O. S. work of educating their officials there to issue through tickets to any place in Canada or the United States.

Mr. McGowan left here early this winter, accompanied by three other C. P. O. S. representatives. These officials visited the company's offices in Glasgow London, Liverpool, Birmingham, Manchester, Southampton, Antwerp, Brussels, Paris and Havre, and changed the old form of issuing to a passenger a ticket to his or her port of disembarkation and a voucher for a railway ticket to the final destination. Officials in these offices will now issue the entire ticket to all passengers, thus doing away with a delay at the port of disembarkation. G. E. Caruso's illness has caused him to lose a great deal of weight, but neither he nor his physicians know how much he weights. But he is rapidly approaching the desired weight, and his strength is returning. It is probable that he will attempt to remain under the 200-pound mark.






