STIFF FIGHT NEAR BELFAST

The Rioting Was Renewed Last Night

Burning of Nationalist Property in Lisburn Kept Up Till After Midnight

Belfast, Aug. 24.—Rioting was renewed here last night. The most menacing disorder was a collision between Unionists and Sinn Feiners in Ballymacarrett on the east side of the River Lagan.

Police forces, later reinforced by soldiers, also dispersed crowds which attacked two shops in Montrose street.

Many of the rioters were seen in the streets of Lisburn, where the burning of Nationalist property was continuing until after last midnight.

Lucerne, Switzerland, Aug. 24.—An official statement regarding the conference yesterday between Premier Lloyd George and Giolitti says that they agreed as to the vital need of the re-establishment of the peace of the world at the earliest possible moment and that the first guarantee of such a peace was to be found in the various treaties already concluded.

It is added that until peace is fully established between Russia and the rest of the world an atmosphere of disturbance and unsettlement will continue to menace the world.

Therefore, the British and Italian governments have been taking steps, in the face of much misrepresentation, to place the world in a position of peace and order.

The Yankees pitcher passed three men to first, but failed to strike out a Detroit batter.

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



**RECENT DEATHS**

The death of Miss M. Louise Stewart, only sister of J. L. Stewart, proprietor of the Chatham Hotel, occurred at Calais on Saturday last, where Miss Stewart had been visiting her niece, Mrs. Fred S. Groves. Miss Stewart became suddenly ill on Wednesday of last week and sank rapidly. Mr. Stewart, who was summoned from Chatham, went to Calais on Friday and was with his sister at the end.

Miss Stewart, who was sixty-three years of age, was born at Upper Mills, St. Stephen. She lived in St. John for a time as a girl, attending the high school here, and afterwards removing to Chatham, where she had since lived with her brother. She was a very talented woman and at times practically took charge of the Chatham World during Mr. Stewart's absence on business. Many friends in St. John and in other parts of the province will hear of her death with keen regret and will extend sincere sympathy.

The funeral will take place in Chatham today.

The death took place Sunday night of Mrs. W. J. O'Leary, 234 Grosvenor avenue, Westmount, Quebec. The sad news came to St. John in a telegram addressed to her brother-in-law, A. E. O'Leary, St. John. The late Mrs. O'Leary, who was formerly Miss Marguerite McIntyre, of Chatham, leaves four children, besides her husband, an electrician, carrying on an extensive business at Montreal. Bishop Henry J. O'Leary, of Charlottetown, and Bishop I. J. O'Leary, of Chatham, are brothers of the bereaved husband.

The death occurred on Saturday morning at the Parker Hospital, Dartmouth (N. S.), of Daniel McCarthy, aged 39 years. Mr. McCarthy resided in Halifax for several years since removing from St. John.


## IRON, STEEL, METAL AND MACHINERY.

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for week ended Aug. 19, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:


In the local market conditions are very much the same as they were last week. There have been no changes in prices of machine tools, or in stock handled by the steel warehousemen. The same causes are operating, viz., summer vacations, tight money, and crop expectations. It is probable that if any change of prices occurs it will be in an upward direction, rather than downward. In the United States there has been a general advance on all grades of pig iron, while steel products have shown a tendency to decline. The coke situation which has been very acute, through car shortages, now is expected to show an improvement, and this in turn may affect the pig iron.

At the present time, makers of pig iron and very loath to take on business for 1921, as they have no idea of what costs are going to be. There has been considerable curtailment of production among automobile manufacturers, though some of the principal firms are still working at full capacity. The falling off in these trades is expected to be made up by large buying by the railroads once the new freight rates come into force. In the case of the Illinois Central Railroad, which has an enquiry out for over fifty machine tools, it is thought that the purchase of these was decided on before the freight rate increase. One effect of the falling off in the automobile trades, and the cancellations occasioned thereby, has been a speeding up of delivery in the machine tool market. The old material market has shown a strong upward tendency in practically all grades, heavy melting steel being particularly strong.

This, of course, refers to the U. S. market, the local market being outside.

The Manchester Division, Furness, Withy Company, which was in a collision on Aug. 15 with the C. P. O. S. liner 'Union', arrived at Montreal from Quebec last night after temporary repairs. She is expected to sail from Montreal on Friday for Manchester, where she will probably dry-dock.

### SUGAR PRICES ARE WEAKENING

Retail merchants in the city dropped the price of sugar two cents a pound yesterday and were offering that precious commodity at twenty-five and twenty-four cents per pound. Retail grocers have not generally been regarded as philanthropists and yet some of them must belong to that class. The wholesale grocers quoted sugar at unchanged rates yesterday. They were offering sugar for \$24.10 per hundred pounds. The refineries gave their rates as twenty-four cents per pound for sugar in wholesale quantities. All this notwithstanding, there was at least one grocer who offered to sell a 100 pound bag of sugar at 82¢. Another grocer fixed his price for the same sized bag at \$24.00. The grocers are preparing for a drop in prices and are more anxious about the situation than the wholesalers and refineries appear to be.

### FIGHTING IN EAST

Constantinople, Aug. 24.—British and Greek columns are advancing in the direction of Eskishehr, seventy-seven miles northeast of Bursa, from the Ismid area to put down a new nationalist offensive which last Saturday resulted in twenty persons killed, including one British officer and sixty wounded. The offensive against the Allies in that sector began on Saturday with a surprise attack on the Greeks, bivouacking at Baghchidagi fifty miles east of Bursa.

French troops are advancing from Amatah, sixty miles northeast of Aleppo, to the Marsh, ninety-five miles northwest of Aleppo. Hard fighting is reported.

### MUST GO TO BED AT 6.30 P. M. FOR 30 DAYS

West Orange, N. J. Aug. 23.—Six boys, ranging in age from 10 to 15 years, found guilty of robbing neighbors' fruit trees, faced a court sentence to go to bed at 6.30 o'clock each evening for 30 days.

The parents who were ordered to accompany their children to the court, were given the punishment of casting oil on the coals.

### HALIFAX'S DEATH RATE

Under the heading, "Halifax is Not a Healthy City," the Halifax Herald says: "The above is a serious statement to make, but its fact, and existing conditions are due largely to the lethargy of the people. Do you realize that the infant mortality rate in Halifax last year was 171.1 per thousand births, as compared with \$6.70 for Toronto; \$6.8 for Vancouver and \$8.9 for St. John and that the death rate for Halifax per thousand of estimated population was 24.2 as compared with 11.4 for Toronto; 14.0 for Vancouver; 15.2 for St. John."

### BIG ORDER FOR BIBLES

Helmingfors, Finland, Aug. 24.—Negotiations between the British Bible Society and the Home Mission Society of the Finnish Church have resulted in an agreement by which the former has ordered 80,000 Russian New Testaments, 120,000 parts of Russian New Testaments and 200,000 Russian New Testaments.

### TWO MOTORISTS KILLED

Montreal, Aug. 23.—Louis O'Brien and Albert Shaw, both of Pittsfield (Mass.), whose automobile turned turtle on the King Edward highway near St. Jean Le Mineur, last night, and both of whom suffered internal injuries, died tonight in the Notre Dame Hospital, this city.

### TWO LOSE LIVES

Toledo, O., Aug. 23.—Two men are known to be dead, another is missing and two city firemen are in hospitals following a fire and explosion in the plant of the Toledo Seed and Oil Company, here late tonight. One of the dead is William Jensen, engineer.





### CARPENTIER TO BOX LEVINSKY OCT. 12

Bout to Be Held in New York Under Auspices of International Sporting Club.

(New York Times)  
Georges Carpentier, European heavyweight champion, Jack Dempsey, will make his first American ring appearance at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, on the afternoon of Columbus Day, October 12. The French hero, Europe's leading boxer, will on that day engage Battling Levinsky, veteran light-heavyweight, in a fifteen-round bout to a decision under the auspices of the International Sporting Club and promoter Jack Curley virtually has been selected as Carpentier's American manager for the bouts in which the Frenchman will participate in this country. For this specific bout the International Sporting Club, according to Managing Director William A. Gavin, has assumed Curley's end of the contract with Carpentier. Curley will retain his connection with the enterprise through assistance in its promotion.

The bout will determine the world's light-heavyweight championship title. Under the terms of the contract divulged yesterday by the International Sporting Club, both principals must weigh in at 175 pounds, the legitimate cruiserweight or light-heavyweight poundage, three hours before the bout. Carpentier holds the European light-heavyweight title, as well as the heavyweight and Levinsky has for years held the American title in the light-heavyweight division. Complete details of the contract signed by principals and promoters were not divulged. For this reason no definite information was forthcoming on the financial end of the match. Director Gavin, however, announced that both boxers will be working a percentage basis, although he declined to state the proportions of this arrangement.

Because of the fact that the bout will be held on a holiday it has been decided to start hostilities at three o'clock in the afternoon. Several reasons were advanced for the selection of the afternoon in preference to the evening for the bout. It was pointed out that dictating one being the comparative ease with which large crowds can be properly and satisfactorily handled in the afternoon. Eagerness to avoid a repetition of the dissatisfaction and general unpleasantness attending the recent Fulton-Wills bout at Newark was reflected by Director Gavin and Matchmaker Tex O'Rourke, who personally announced the arrangement of the bout. Director Gavin made the following significant reference to this phase of the forthcoming match: "I would rather lose my right hand than have a repetition of the events which occurred at Newark. Every possible precaution will be taken to prevent another such experience and I am sure of success in this regard."

Contract Not Interfered With.  
The coming bout will not interfere with the contract said to be held by Charles A. Cochran, British boxing promoter, governing the ring activities of Carpentier. There is no possibility of conflict, according to promoter Curley, who in discussing this end of the match, said that Cochran's contract with Carpentier provides only for a bout between the European idol and Champion Dempsey. Carpentier, according to Curley, is free to arrange any other matches he may think advisable.

Columbus Day has been definitely selected for the bout, but nevertheless the outcome of the struggle for the National League baseball championship. Director Gavin said that should Brooklyn win the pennant and participate in the world's series, the bout would be deferred, probably until October 30.
