

100 P. C. USE OF VEGETABLES. The more general use of vegetables as substitutes cannot be too often reiterated. Their worth is not half appreciated and with the war gardens flour-ishing apace there is a tendency to be wasteful when such an abundance of

wasteful when such an abundance of garden truck is available.

As a matter of fact, their uses are not exhausted when they have been served as fresh greens, made into salads or boiled according to custom. Much of the sugar and mineral content, so valuable and pleasant to the taste, is generally lost in cooking because women do not study ways and means to conserve it. study ways and means to conserve it.

None of the elements should be wasted.

For instance, carrots, corn, peas, beets, are rich in sugar and the water in which they are cooked should be saved for soup. Spinach should always be cooked in its own juice and every spoonful saved. Onion water may be used for

potatoes "diced" with skins left on, peas, onions and seasonings. A thick puree which is combined with a thin cream sauce is made of this composition. Peapods and the cobs from which un-cooked corn has been cut may be used to advantage in making soup.





### SUMMARY

(By the Associated Press.)

The British troops in Flanders and the French forces further south apparently have asticipated the pro-

apparently have atticipated the proposed German drive toward the English channel ports or Paris and struck first.

Although slight details of the manouvres thus far have been revealed, the Allied troops caught the enemy unawares at salient points, and, driving swiftly forward, took terrain which would have been of considerable value as the starting points of enemy attacks. In addition, a comparatively large number of prisoners and machine guns were left in the hands of the Allied troops.

of prisoners and machine guns were left in the hands of the Allied troops.

The attack of the British was delivered about midway between Hazebrouck and Bethune on a front of nearly three and a half miles over teritory which the Germans recently have been deluging with shells. Altogether the attack was productive of an average gain of ground to nearly a mile and included the taking of several small hamiets. It is not improbable that the Germans in a proposed offensive in this region had set their hearts on the capture of St. Omer and the raifway line ranning then to Calais and Denkirk.

The stroke of the French troops was over a still greater front—four and a half miles—and they at points also penetrated enemy positions to a good depth, at some points a mile and a quarter.

The evident intention was further to block the gateway to Paris through the Villers-Cotterets region. Although the points of attack were separated by about 100 miles, the manoeucvres stemingly had been well considered by General Foch, the Allied commander-in-chief, where they were arried out synchronously. The stratesy of the double stroke is apparent when it is realized that a successful German thrust where the British struck would have menaced the channel ports or a similar movement in the

thrust where the British struck would have menaced the channel ports or a similar movement in the south would have placed the French capital in jeopardy.

The Berlin official communication issued Friday evening takes note of the Allied thrusts by declaring that the Germans were busily engaged in attempts to repulse them.

That the Allied forces are not to be caught napping by the Germans is indicated by the intensive aerial operations that are in progress and behind the battle line. A British official communication says that in air lighting Thursday twenty-nine enemy airplanes were accounted for, twenty of them having been destroyed and others forced to descend out of the control of their pilots. Fourteen machines of the British failed to return to their posts.

There is considerable fighting between the Austrians and the Italians in the mountain regions of the Italian theatre, but quiet prevails on the Playe river, across which the enemy was driven by the Italians early in the week.

The duty rests upon the parents of newly born infants to report the birth to the registrar immediately. In cases of death, the obligation rests upon those attending the person in their last illness. The physicians and undertakers are familiar with the law and usually observe it, but there is more difficulty with parents, especially in the case of the first addition to the family, as this requirement frequently is overlooked.

R. W. L. Tibbets, deputy registrar general, in a communication to Mr. Jones, encloses a copy of a regulation of the Canada Registration Board, calling his attention to section 26 of the regulation, which reads as follows:—




