Another correspondent says the recent success of the allies at Tracy-Le-Val resulted from the desecration of French graves by Prussians. He says—
"Our troops had taken the village, but the enemy returned and began digging trenches in the cemetery, which so infuriated the Moroccan contingent that the commander decided on an assault. The Moroccans charged with the knife and exterminated 1,200 Germans occupying the trenches. Immediately 120 others, entrenched near, also surrendered, stating that they were the last of





CANADA TO RAISE

Orders will be issued at once in Otawa to bring the number of war reruits up to 50,000, according to a deow doing guard duty, etc., but will include the 10,000 who have been taken on already for the second contingent. The new levy will include four mounted regiments of 600 men each. When the number is complete, it will give Canada a total of 94,000 men under arms, ina total of 94,000 men under arms, including the first overseas contingent, the recruits training for foreign service and the guards on defence duty in Canada. One purpose of the order is to alleviate distress arising from unemployment, and, as this is more acute in the west, the greater proportion will be taken from that part of Canada. The men will all be needed eventually, and this will merely give them a longer period of training.

During the last two years over three hundred girls have registered their names and addresses with our club.

The teachers of the various classes have performed their duties faithfully. The classes have been selected to suit the different tastes of the girls and to give them the studies in which they are interested. We have tried to make our club room as cosy and cheerful as possible, and on social evenings have endeavored to give the girls a thoroughly good time. For the past two summers we have had numerous pichics and excursions. Two most enjoyable weekends through the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Bullock were spent at Brown's Flats. We also thank them for the use of their private grounds for basket ball during the summer.

These games were played under the supervision of Miss Heffer, our physical director. I cannot speak too highly of the assistance she has been to me in my work, not only as physical director, for waich she was engaged by the association, but in many other useful departments. I especially mention the Literary Circle which she has conducted during the four seasons. This circle has been beneficial and interesting to a large number of our girls.

Through her untiring efforts many plays and entertainments have been presented. The proceeds of two of these amounted to \$200 clear of expenses, which sum was handed over to our treasurer. Other minor efforts brought in from \$10 to \$80 a piece. These sums were retained by the girls towards camp fire and incidental expenses.

Individual help through the association has been given to our girls, as in the case of one of our number, who contracted tuberculosis. She was a stranger here with no one to help her. The association, assisted by others, who became interested, sent her to the sanitarium at River Glade for six months.
