





**WORK WHAT SHOULD COUNT** 

Lectures Should Be Reduced and There Should Be No Written Papers at Final Examination—Study Made Intolerable Burden

London, Oct. 4-Sir William Osler. rofessor of medicine at Oxford University, in an address at the re-opening of the Medical School of St. George's Hospital, denounced the existing system of training medical students, especially the lecture and examination features. Sir William contended that the work of the students from the day they enter the school ought to count for more qualification and that the students ought not to be under the continual fear of examination. He said the Chinese system of education which is directed to a single end, the passing of examinations.

single end, the passing of examinations shows perfectly the blighting influence of examinations and how they sterilize the imagination.

the imagination.

"The great chasm between education and examination is," he continued, "shown by the statistics of aspirants to the Royal College of Surgeons. Half of the entrants fail, yet these are the very pick of the students. The lectures ought to be reduced. The day of the lecture is past. It ought to be an offence on the part of a senior student to attend a lecture.

"In the case of inefficient students parents ought to be told after a year or two they would never make decent doctors. There ought to be no written papers at the final examination. Watch the man handle a patient. Fifteen minutes at the bedside is worth three hours at the examination table. The student needs that the incubus of examination needs that the incubus of examination should be lifted from his soul. 
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

New York, Oct. Dr. Simon Flexner, director of the Rockefeller institute 
for medical research, and Dr. Hideyo 
Noguchi, one of his distinguished fellow 
workers in that institution, have succeeded at last in cultivating artificially 
the germ that is responsible for epidemic pollomycitits, commonly known 
as infantile paralysis. After describing 
intherto unsuccessful attempts to demonstrate the micro-organism under the 
microscope and develop it in artifical 
cultures, the writer says:

"During the several years that epidemic pollomycitits has prevailed in the 
castern United States, we have collected 
many specimens from affected human 
beings and monkeys. Portions of nerveus and other organs were regularly 
set aside in 50 per cent. sterile glycerine in the refrigerator. Hence there were 
available for the cultivation tests both 
fresh specimens yielded by recent autopates upon human beings and monkeys 
and material preserved for periods ranging from a few days to many months.

"The new experiments in cultivation 
were begun in the summer of 1912, when 
many acute cases of pollomycitis were 
being cared for in the hospitals of the 
Rockefeller Institute. Autopsies were 
performed upon fatal cases. Thus the 
cultivation was carried out simultaneously upon fresh, sterile or practically 
sterile (for ordinary bacteria) specimens 
derived from human beings and from 
monkeys' experimentally inoculated, and 
upon glycerinated specimens from both 
sources.
