Patriarch of British Peasage About to Celebrate Golden Wedding--The Son Who Redeemed Himself

Lord Feversham, who is about to celebrate his golden wedding, is one of the patriarchs of the British peasage, and, I may add, of the most ornamental portion thereof, for his daughters have been celebrated for their beauty, and his sons for their good looks.

Another son of Lord Feversham, who still survives, and who represented Cumberland for a number of years in parliament, besides holding an honorary colonelcy in the army, spent a number of years in the United States, where he may be said to have sown his wild oats.

The family of Duncombe, of which Lord Feversham is the chief, first came to the fore in the reign of Henry V., when the name occurs as lord of the manor of Ivington, in the records of the herald's visitations of the County of Buckingham.

The ruins are situated on a plateau of high ground, at the foot of a steep hill, in the narrow valley of the Rye, and while the west side of the transept is Norman, all the rest of the ancient pile is very fine early English.

Duncombe Park contains a wonderful collection of paintings and some superb statuary, including a marble reproduction of Lord Byron's celebrated dog. The saloon is ninety feet long, and all the staircases, broad enough to allow a coach-and-four to pass up or down, are of superb mahogany. There is also a fine private chapel, while the park surrounding the hall extends over an area of some 5,000 acres.

San Francisco, July 4.—British and American flags fluttered from opposite corners of the ring this afternoon when Ad. Wolgast and Owen Moran climbed through the ropes for a 20 round battle for the lightweight championship. Hours before the going changed for the first round thousands gathered about the arena gazing and struggling for a position of advantage in the rub for the bleacher seats, while small boys exploded firecrackers and torpedoes beneath their feet.
The holders of reserved followed close on the heels of the bleacherites and when Referee Welch called the fighters to the centre of the ring the arena was jammed by a close packed mob of cheering spectators. It would be hard to find a more closely matched pair than the champion and the challenger. Moran's blond head overtopped Wolgast's black hair by less than half an inch, as they listened to their difference in weight. Neither had the slightest trouble in making the weight 113 pounds just before they entered the ring. There was little change in the betting before the battle. Wolgast remained a top heavy favorite at 10 to 8 with plenty of Moran supporters in evidence when they did not take place. Small wagers were made at 10 to 8 that Moran would be on his feet at the end of the twenty rounds.

KING REVIEWS BOY SCOUTS
A Great Sight at Windsor Park Today—Thousands of Youths of Empire in Review Before His Majesty
(Continued from page 1)
Windsor, July 4.—King George accompanied by Queen Mary and surrounded by a brilliant staff of distinguished officers of the army and with other members of the Royal Family reviewed, in Windsor Park today, an army of 38,000 boy scouts gathered from all parts of the United Kingdom and from some of the colonies. The weather was beautiful.
Drews up in a semi-circle in front of the royal stand the king, dressed in the scout's uniform of blue khaki or grey, with flat brimmed khaki hats and brilliant neckties of various hues, formed the picturesque parade.
They were formed in eight divisions; the place of honor being occupied by 2,000 king's scouts, selected from the various troops as the most efficient, made a guard of honor for the king. Just behind these were posted 120 life savers, all of whom were decorated for life-saving.
As His Majesty came on to the parade ground, a band struck up the national anthem and the boy scouts stood at attention with their staves, while they sang the first verse of "God Save the King."
Then the king rode along the lines closely inspecting the boys. Lieut-General Sir Robert Baden-Powell, the chief scout, was in command, and at his order the patrols of the selected king's scouts, gave an exhibition of fire-lighting and ambulance work.
The king expressed his gratification at the success of the movement to its originator, General Baden-Powell, who called for three cheers for His Majesty, which were given with great spirit, followed by the singing of the national anthem, which brought the ceremony to a close.

ST. JOHN COOL WHILE OTHERS ARE SWELTERING
Death And Suffering in Many Places And Here the Temperature is 64
The heat wave which has been so prevalent for the last few days in the New England States and in upper Canada, is not evidently coming down this way for a while for the highest temperature registered here up till noon today was 64 and the lowest 56. Yesterday the thermometer registered 60 as its highest, and reports from Boston, New York, Montreal and other cities are to the effect that the heat is almost unbearable.
The incoming trains and boats from the States are carrying large crowds of tourists coming east to escape the heat, and after the holiday there today larger crowds are expected. Several of the hotels have rooms engaged for large tourist parties and the tourist travel this season promises to exceed all former years. The probabilities are for continued fine weather, but even if it is a little warmer St. John ought to still be thankful.
The conditions in many places yesterday were not so good as many years. The weather office of Toronto reported 103, which is two degrees higher even than Sunday's level. The records at Montreal show a maximum of 103, which is two degrees higher than the temperature at 102, Newark's official records were 103 and 104 on the public square. At 103, Pittsburgh mills were closed with the temperature 97. At Cleveland there was a register of 104 on the public square. In one way or another many deaths have been caused by the hot wave.
Toronto, July 4.—The thermometer at 10 o'clock had risen six degrees since eight a.m., standing at 90. It is not expected 95 will be reached today in Toronto. Even this reduced heat is tempered by a breeze delightfully cool, compared with the hot days of yesterday.

BOTTOMLEY MUST PAY \$250,000

Verdict is Against British M. P., Editor and Promoter "A HUMAN ENIGMA"

On Trial Before and Cheered Each Day as he Entered The Courtroom—Once Made His Word Good at the Expense of \$1,200,000

London, July 4.—Horatio W. Bottomley, member of parliament, editor and party promoter, who has won so many legal battles single-handed against the most brilliant lawyers of the crown, has at last lost a case. He was condemned by Lord Chief Justice Alverstone to pay \$250,000 damages to the estate of the late R. E. Master, from whom, it was charged, he obtained \$285,000 through misrepresentation of worthless shares in his many enterprises.

Bottomley is undoubtedly the greatest human enigma in England. He has made friends as fast as he has made enemies. His undertakings, conceived on a gigantic scale, have fallen through time and again, swallowing up the resources of thousands of small investors, but Bottomley has still held a high position in the popular esteem.

Then Bottomley dropped out of public notice for four years. What he did in that time no one seemed to know. But in the spring of 1897 a public notice was given out to the effect that Mr. Bottomley, managing director of the defendant publishing union, was now prepared to make good his word and repay the losses of the shareholders.


