



### School Established For Girl Farmers

LONDON, Jan. 8—To add to the inducements that the English colonies are holding out to prospective colonists it is now proposed to establish a school for girl farmers.

While the boys are being trained on one farm in the art of plowing and handling stock, the girls are to be trained in a school nearby in the art of becoming farmers' wives.

The first party will consist of 12 girls. They will sail for New Zealand early in February and will receive their training on a fine estate near Palmerston. The expenses of the experiment are being furnished from a fund established by the sheep farmers of New Zealand, a good many of whom, it is said, are minus wives.







SKIDDED TO SIDEWALK

Declares Some of the Crew Threatened to Cut Him to Pieces

Waiter on Italian Vessel Here is Assured Safety by

Giovanni Pasutti, an articled seaman employed as a waiter on board the Italian steamship Valleyscura, was charged in the Police Court this morn ing by the captain, Batolomeo Doll-becco with absenting himself at divers times between Dec. 28 and Jan. 7 from the ship, and with refusing duty on the ship, and with refusing duty on board the ship. 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
