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Missionary and Benevolent Funds.

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The following are the purposes for which the General Assembly has appointed collections to be made annually in all the congregations:—

I. Home Missions:—The field is vast—stretching all the way from Newfoundland to Vancouver Island—and the work to be done is only limited by the means placed at the disposal of the committee. During last year *eleven hundred and sixty-eight* different places were supplied, for longer or shorter periods, with religious services by missionaries under the direction of the Home Mission Boards, East and West. The estimates for the current year call for \$78,000.

II. Augmentation of Stipends :— This is virtually Home Mission work, but it is under the care of a different committee, and the funds are separate. Last year there were 147 congregations in the Western section and 50 in the Eastern, receiving aid from this fund (nine fewer than in the previous year). The amount required for the current year is \$39,000. The object of the fund is to secure for the ministers in weaker congregations a *minimum* stipend of \$750 with a manse.

III. French Evangelization:—Including the schools and buildings at Pointe-aux-Trembles, the estimated requirement of the Board for the current year is \$56,000, for the three-fold purposes of education, colportage, and the preaching of the Gospel among our French-speaking people. Many of these, openly or privately, have given indications of a desire to know the truth—"at any cost"—and have manifested appreciation of the efforts that are being made through this agency to come to their help. There were 1500 pupils attending the schools of the Board last year; of these, 168 attended the well-known Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools, and 100 young women were enrolled in the Coligny College, Ottawa, now in its fifth year. Fourteen French students studied theology in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, two of whom have been licensed. The total number of labourers employed was *eighty-nine*.

IV. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund:—The number of annuitants is about one hundred and fifty, and the average annuity \$150, to meet which, the sum of \$10,000 is required from the congregations in addition to the interest derived from investments.

V. The Assembly Fund :- This is one of the schemes for which Dr. Reid sometimes says: "It is difficult to make an eloquent appeal." But it is an important one nevertheless. Besides the expenses connected with the Assembly, and the printing and distributing the minutes, there are a number of other charges on the fund calling for at least \$5,000 per annum.

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VI. The Colleges :-- None of the six Theological Colleges are fully endowed; in all, they ask some \$25,000 a year from the congregations of the Church. It is impossible to over-estimate the value of the work they are doing in sending forth from their halls upwards of sixty young men yearly to recruit the ranks of the ministry.

VII. Manitoba College:—Owing to its remote position and urgent need of pecuniary assistance, the Assembly has sanctioned a special contribution for this College, expecting that the whole Church will respond by giving not less than \$5,000.

VIII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund:—The number of annuitants on the roll last year was 96, the average annuity is less than \$200 to each; but even to mete out that miserable pittance, the Committee require \$18,000 a year from the congregations. The effort to create an Endowment Fund for this purpose is making haste slowly. It is worthy of consideration by those who are entrusted with wealth.

IX. Foreign Missions :--Elsewhere will be found a list of the names and addresses of the missionaries who are representing us in foreign fields, or who are working among heathen tribes in our own country. The total receipts last year for Foreign Missions were \$129,665; this year not less than \$135,000 will be needed to carry on the work in hand---not to speak of extending it.

X. Mission to the Jews in Palestine :— This new enterprise, referred to at some length below, is a good outlet for the practical sympathy of those among us who are interested in the spiritual welfare of God's ancient people, and are desirous that they should come to a knowledge of the Truth as it is in Christ Jesus. The expenses of the mission will be on a very moderate scale for the present at least.

The Boly Land.

Over whose acres walked those blessed feet, Which, eighteen centuries ago, were nailed For our advantage to the bitter cross.

PALESTINE is a small country—not half the size of Scotland measuring from Dan to Beersheba 180 miles, with an average width of about 50 miles; yet, what influences have gone forth from it ! Contrasted with its former beauty and fertility, it is now desolate and waste, a province of Syria, notoriously misruled by the Turkish Government and under the ban of Mohammedan intolerance and bigotry.

Strange that the cradle of Christianity should be called a "mission field"! yet, so it is, and one of the hardest mission fields in the world. The first resident Protestant missionaries were sent to Jerusalem by the American Board in 1820, and although the only monument of their labours in Palestine is a little graveyard on Mount Zion, near the tomb of David, the work survives and flourishes in the hands of the Presbyterian Church of the United States at Beirut and other parts of northern Syria. At Beirut, too, the Church of Scotland has long maintained, and with good success, a school for Jewish and Mahommedan girls. The Church Missionary Society began its mission to Jerusalem in 1851, and has now a number of other stations in Palestine. The Free Church of Scotland is working successfully at Tiberias and in the Lebanon district; the Irish Presbyterians in the region round about Antioch; the United Presbyterians and several other societies have missionaries in the Holy Land, and, to the number already in the field there has just been added THE MISSION OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA, with its headquarters at Haifa, in the Bay of Acre (marked with a red cross on the map.)

The history of this mission is quite a romantic one. It is just forty years since the idea of engaging in mission work among the Jews was first mooted in the old Synod of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland. In 1854 collections begar we be taken up for this purpose. In 1856, Rev. Dr. Aiton of Dolphinton, Scotland, . visited Canada and by his addresses in different places created additional interest in this work. He also collected in Canada a considerable sum of money for a mission to the Jews in Jerusalem. That mission was never entered upon; but the Kirk Synod in Canada, in 1858, sent the Rev. Ephraim M. Epstein to Salonica (the old Thessalonica). That was given up as a hopeless undertaking. The money collected by Dr. Aiton, together with a balance remaining of the defunct Salonica mission, was placed in the hands of the late Hon. Alexander Morris in trust, and so continued for five and twenty years, when, (in 1886) Mr. Morris divested himself of the trust by handing over the money (then amounting to \$5,400) to the General Assembly, who accepted it in trust, "for the establishment of a Presbyterian mission to the Jews in Palestine when a fitting time should come." Hence the appointment of the Rev. C. A. Webster, M.D., in 1892. Dr. Webster having visited nearly every town of any note in Palestine, has finally decided upon Haifa as the most eligible location for our mission. It is a town of some 6000 inhabitants, of whom 1500 are Jews, and being one of the termini of the railway now in course of construction from the Mediterranean to Damascus (eventually to be extended to Bagdad and through Persia to India), it is almost certain to become an important centre of commerce in the near future.

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Pastoral Letter.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Paul's Congregation :

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There is little in the history of the congregation during the past year calling for special comment. No new field of work has been entered on, and the old work has been done mainly on the old lines, and in uninterrupted harmony. There is great cause for gratitude and I heartily thank all who have in any way laboured with and helped me in the work of the Church. One or two things may be attended to with profit.

The services on Sunday have been largely attended, and all the different organizations in the Chnrch have been carried on with life and vigour, and we begin another year with hope and confidence. There are some, however, who are far from regular in their attendance on Sunday, and vacant places are always discouraging alike to minister and people. Some are irregular in their attendance at Communion, and there ought to be a much larger number at the service, preparatory for Communion. The same thing may be said of the weekly Prayer Meeting. A thoughtful consideration of responsibility and privilege would remedy this.

The Missionary work of the Church has not enlisted so widespread sympathy and support as it should. I have had frequent occasion to deprecate this, and must continue to express disappointment, so long as the names of any of our members, who have the ability to give, are absent from our contribution list. An effort will be made this year to increase the number of subscribers, and I hope it will prove abundantly successful. I would earnestly ask you all to remember your responsibility as members of a Christian congregation-we are all members one of another-helping or hinderingencouraging or discouraging.

Prayerful consideration of this fact would remove most causes of disappointment and discouragement. It would increase the attendance at all our services-it would increase the number of active workers in all our organizations-it would increase the number of contributors and of contributions to all our missionary and benevolent schemes-it would deepen our faith, enlarge our hope and increase our zeal.

I repeat the prayer I offered at the close of my first year amongst you, that the new year on which we have entered may be one of continued peace and prosperity, of health and happiness in your homes, of success in your callings, of integrity in your lives, of greater earnestness, greater prayerfulness, greater charity, of deepening love to Christ and growing love towards all. May we all grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

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Report of the Kirk-Session.

He was ordained to the eldership, 28th December, 1845, and was for many years Superintendent of the Sabbath-school, and Clerk of the Kirk-Session. It would be gratifying to the Kirk-Session to see a much larger number of the young men of the congregation taking a deeper interest in these meetings. The Association was organized with the special object of interesting the young men in church work, and the Session hope that more interest will be manifested in the future than has been in the past. It is not very encouraging to those gentlemen who take the time and trouble to prepare lectures, to see so small a number of the young men of the congregation avail themselves of them, as has too often been the case during the past year.

MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT FUNDS.—Notwithstanding the urgent appeals that have been made from time to time from the pulpit, it is a matter of great disappointment that so few comparatively of the members of the congregation, see it to be their duty and privilege to contribute to the missions of our church and its other benevolent work. Many among us contribute liberally, but the discouraging fact remains, that more than one-half of the families of the congregation hold their hand from giving to any of the objects named in our yearly schedule of contributions. The Kirk-Session would feel greatly encouraged if *all* would see their way this year, to become sharers in this good work.

VICTORIA MISSION.—The Session reported last year, that the Victoria Mission, established by St. Paul's as a Sunday-school in 1866, has now become a regularly organized congregation under the name of the "Victoria Church." At a meeting of the Presbytery of Montreal, held on the 1st of June, 1893, the Rev. W. D. Reid was ordained and inducted as pastor of the congregation. From a small Sunday-school, started in 1866, it has increased and prospered and bids fair to become a self-sustaining congregation in the near future.

Encouraged by the success which has attended this effort, could not the young men in our congregation to-day, search out some other outlying district in our rapidly growing city, where a Sunday-school is needed, and following the good example of the young men of St. Paul's Church in 1866, claim for themselves the honour of laying the foundation of another church and congregation? Might not some of the young men of St. Paul's Church give *themselves* for the work of the ministry ? and might not some of the young women, also, feel themselves constrained by the love of Christ to offer their services

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Memoranda.

Although the Kirk-Session report for 1893 is only the seventeenth annual report that has been published, it is now close on sixty years since the Session of St. Paul's Church was first constituted. It appears from the early minutes that this took place on the 24th of August, 1834-the day on which the St. Helen Street church was opened for worship. The congregation had been organized two years previous to that date by the Rev. Edward Black, D.D., who continued to be its minister till his death in 1845. The Rev. Dr. Robert McGill succeeded Dr. Black. He died in February, 1856, and in November, the same year, Rev. William Snodgrass of Charlottetown, P. E. I., was inducted, and continued his ministrations until his appointment to the principalship of Queen's University at Kingston, in October, 1864. Rev. John Jenkins, the next incumbent, was inducted June 27th, 1865. In 1881, after a pastorate of over sixteen years, Dr. Jenkins retired from the active duties of the ministry. Dr. Barclay, formerly of St. Cuthbert's Church, Edinburgh, began his ministry among us on October 11th, 1883. The present church was erected during the incumbency of Dr. Jenkins, and was opened for worship September 27th, 1868. Dr. Jenkins attained his jubilee in 1887, and though now over four-score years of age enjoys a fair measure of health and strength, residing at West Dulwich, near London, England.

The Annual Meeting.

Minutes of the adjourned Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church held within the school-room of the church on Monday, the 22nd day of January, 1894, at Eight o'elock, p.m.

The Rev. Dr. Barclay was called to the chair, and Mr. W. W. Watson was appointed Secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer.

The chairman read a letter from Mr. Andrew Allan expressing his regret that owing to indisposition he would be unable to attend the meeting.

The minutes of the last annual meeting, of the 9th January, 1893, having been printed and circulated among the congregation, were taken as read and confirmed.

The report of the Trustees and the Treasurer's financial statement for the year ending 30th ultimo, having been placed in the pews on the previous Sunday, were taken as read.

Mr. E. B. Greenshields in moving the adoption of the report emphasised the fact referred to in the same, that if the pew rents had been as promptly paid during 1893 as in previous years the receipts would have been sufficient to meet the expenditure. He also referred to the special subscriptions received from generous friends of the church.

He moved, seconded by Mr. Alex. Ewan.

That the report of the Trustees be approved and adopted, and that it with the Treasurer's statement and the minutes of the meeting, be printed for circulation among the members of the congregation.

The motion was carried.

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With regard to the report of the committee on the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church, the chairman regretted to have to report a diminution in the subscriptions towards this scheme —one of the most important connected with the church—and he hoped that special efforts would be made to enlist more subscribers. The present list showed only about 100 contributors—a number disappointingly small when the size of the congregation was considered.

That Sir Donald A. Smith, Mr. Jas Burnett, and Mr. Alex. Ewan, be reelected Trustees for the usual term.

Dr. Barclay desired to place on record his appreciation of the services which have been rendered to the congregation by Mr. E. B. Greenshields during the many years in which he has acted as Secretary of the Board of Trustees, and he therefore moved :

That the thanks of the congregation are due, and are hereby tendered, to Mr. Greenshields for services faithfully and actively performed, and for his devotion to the interests of the church during his long connection with the office recently resigned by him

That the annual meeting of the congregation of St. Paul's Church, be held on the third Monday of January instead of on the second as heretofore, and that Article II of the Rules, Regulations and By-laws be amended accordingly.

Mr. McFee in acknowledging the contribution of St. Paul's towards the funds of the Westminster Church reported the work of that congregation as progressing most satisfactorily.

Mr. Larmonth also gave a very encouraging account, financially and otherwise, of the Victoria Mission.

Mr. Greenshields referred to a sum remaining on hand and representing about \$400, of the funds raised towards the support of a missionary in India, since withdrawn, and it was moved by Mr. J. A. Cantlie, seconded by Mr. J. McDonald, and unanimously carried :

That the sum referred to, and now on deposit in the Savings Bank of the Bank of Montreal, be transmitted to Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of North-West Missions, by Dr. Barclay, with instructions to apply the same towards the alleviation of the distress now existing in some fields connected with the Presbyterian Church in the North-West.

Dr. Barclay considered the report presented by the Trustees an encouraging one. He expressed his gratitude for combined activity and effective service in the missionary and other organization connected with the church. He entered upon the duties of the current year hopeful and strengthened by the sympathy and assistance he had received in the past, and deeply thankful for the harmony which existed in the congregation. Report of the Trustees

for the year ending 30th December, 1893.

The Trustees have pleasure in submitting to the congregation their Annual Report together with the statement of the Treasurer for the year ending 30th December, 1893.

The life and work of the church has been vigorously carried on under the able ministration of the Rev. Dr. Barclay. The services have been largely attended, and the plan adopted at the last annual meeting of making the sittings free at the evening services to give greater facilities to strangers to attend, has been very successful, and many people have availed themselves of the privilege.

During the year some repairs were made to the church, and it was also found necessary to make some expenditure on the manse.

It will be seen from the statement of Treasurer—accompanying this report—that the amount received from the pew rents during the year is \$8585.00 as against. \$9274.92 for last year, or a decrease of \$689.92, and the ordinary collections, including the subscriptions through the envelope system and some special contributions, show the sum of \$4893.39 as against \$3990.45 for last year, or an increase of \$902.94. The balance due the Treasurer for the year ending 30th Dec. 1893, is \$4,693,31, or an increase in our indebtedness during the year of \$388.36.

The repairs to the church and manse cost \$580.61. It will thus be seen that the ordinary revenue of the church has been just sufficient to pay the ordinary expenditure.

If the pew rents had been as promptly paid as last year, the revenue would have been sufficient to pay for the repairs as well. The arrears of pew rents this year are about \$860, as compared with \$234 for last year. This was partly owing to the illness of the caretaker of the church who was not able to attend to the collection of the rents as usual. The Trustees are pleased to see him restored to health and able to resume his work. In this connection the Trustees would ask the congregation to remember that the pew rents are due and payable in January of each year in advance, and that it is absolutely necessary that they be promptly paid if the finances of the church are to be managed in a satisfactory manner.

It is gratifying to notice that the subscriptions towards the ordinary revenue of the church show an increase of \$902.04, being \$4893.39 this year as compared with \$3990.45 last year. The Trustees hope that there will be a steady increase in the revenue from this source to enable them to reduce the amount due to the Treasurer.

Last year the question was discussed of holding the annual meeting on the third Monday of January in place of the second Monday. The Trustees find that one week from the end of the year (as happened this year) is not sufficient time to allow of the preparation of the Treasurer's statement and their report, and that it would be more convenient to hold the annual meeting on the third Monday in January. They therefore propose to the congregation to change the By-law on the subject.

The Trustees who retire by rotation this year are Sir Donald A. Smith, Mr. Jas. Burnett, and Mr. Alex. Ewan, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

The number of teachers and officers at present on the roll is, male 11, female 19—total 30.

The number of scholars is, male 132, female 92-total 224.

A good many changes have taken place in the staff of teachers and in the roll of scholars during the year. Mrs. White, Mrs. Couper, Miss Lawder, Miss Cameron, Miss Monk, Mr. McFee, Mr. Jerdon, Mr. Doig and Dr. Gordon Campbell have resigned their positions as teachers. Some of these had been faithful workers for years. They all left with regret and their loss is greatly felt.

The following ladies have been admitted as teachers :-- Mrs. Mattice, Miss Lussier, Miss K. Logie, Miss Isa Monk, Miss Mills, Miss Jamieson, Miss Smith. All of these ladies have been scholars in the school. Mr. Dickson has taken the place of Mr. Doig, and Mr. E. Archibald, leaving his office of librarian, assumed the class left vacant by the resignation of Dr. Campbell.

About 30 scholars have left during the year. Of these five have taken classes, six have left town, and eleven have gone to other schools, some of them never having been connected with our church.

About 20 new scholars have been admitted.

The teachers have constantly endeavored to lead the scholars on to engage in missionary and benevolent work. They still contribute \$60 a year to the Montreal General Hospital for the maintenance of the "St. Paul's Sunday-school Cot." They sent \$50 of their money for Missions in China and have received an interesting letter from Miss Cameron, M.D., a Missionary in Honan, giving an account of the work in that place.

Special interest has been taken in our own Mission to the North-West Indians. Besides \$100 in money the scholars contributed clothing, books and toys. They were gratefully acknowledged in a kind letter by the Rev. Mr. Frew, formerly a member of this congregation.

The scholars also contribute \$30 a year for the support of an orphan girl in the Hervey Institute. Her name is Annie Macpherson, and it is satisfactory to know that she is well spoken of by the matron.

The teachers have been cheered by the constant presence of the Reverend Dr. Barclay who is always ready to encourage them in their work.

Regular visits have been made to the school by the elders, some of whom render valuable aid in supplying classes occasionally vacant by the absence of teachers, and Messrs. Croil and J. Murray Smith have given interesting and valuable missionary addresses.

It is noticed that many of the young people of the church do not attend the school. Parents are earnestly requested to send their children.

Dr. Barclay's Bible-class for young men meets in a separate room.

Mrs. Tasker has a class for young women, and little ones from the ages of four years are admitted to the infant class.

The amount contributed by the scholars for missionary and benevolent objects during the year was \$270.

In presenting our report for 1892, we then intimated that our congregation had fully decided to call a minister, and for this purpose a special meeting was held, at which commissioners were appointed to appear before the Presbytery in support of a petition requesting that we be allowed to moderate in a call.

The Presbytery granted the prayer of the petition, and at a later meeting, Mr. W. D. Reid, B.A., was declared the unanimous choice of the congregation for its pastor.

At a subsequent meeting of the congregation, Messrs. T. A. Silvester and John Larmonth were named as commissioners, and appeared at a special meeting of Presbytery, in support of the call. Mr. Reid having decided to accept of the charge, the stipend was fixed at \$850 per annum, but the Presbytery strongly recommended that the amount be augmented to \$1000 per annum whenever the congregation were in a position to do so.

Thursday, the first day of June, at 8 p.m., was the time appointed for the ordination and induction ceremonies. The service was most solemn and impressive throughout, and was largely attended.

The Rev. W. R. Cruikshank, B.A., Moderator, presided, and after devotional exercises, the Rev. Dr. Barclay of St. Paul's, preached the ordination sermon. The Rev. Mr. Reid was then received by the members of the Presbytery, by the laying on of hands. The Rev. F. M. Dewey, B.A., of Stanley Street Church then followed, addressing the newly ordained pastor, and the Rev. Dr. Warden the people.

The Moderator in a few well chosen words congratulated the congregation in the choice they had made, after which, the right hand of fellowship was given the newly inducted pastor by all present.

The following members of the Presbytery also assisted: Dr. Macvicar, Rev. Jas. Patterson, Presbytery Clerk, Revs. John Nichols, R. P. Duclos, and Murray Watson; and Messrs. Walter Paul, Wm. Drysdale, and John A. Stewart, Elders.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.—The Board of Management although only seven months in existence under the new pastor, beg to report as follows :— During the past seven months the work of this Board has been most harmonious and encouraging. At the date of our last report, our Treequrer had a good balance on hand, and this, added to the annual grant from St. Paul's Church, and the generous envelope and plate collections for the year, bring the total receipts up to \$2055.91. Against this amount is charged—for pastor's salary, caretaker's salary, interest on mortgage, and sundry items, \$1270.39, and for new settees \$386.40, leaving a balance of \$399.12 to carry forward.

We must here acknowledge the generous grant given by St. Paul's Church for so many years, enabling our Treasurer to meet all demands promptly, and stimulating our members to greater exertions among themselves to be self-supporting. It is our earnest desire that this grant may not be required after the expiration of the time it has been promised us, and that our Church may then be classed among the self-supporting congregations of our city and Presbytery.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL.—The Sunday-School still continues to increase in numbers, and is under the superintendence of Mr. John Larmonth, assisted by an able and efficient staff of officers and teachers. There are now 272 scholars on the roll, with an average of 208, and 32 teachers with an average of 26.

The Missionary contributions for the year amounted to \$144.07. The Treasurer reports a good balance on hand to carry forward.

At the close of the year, we transferred the sum of \$131.13 to the Board of Management, as a fund towards the liquidation of the mortgage debt, with a recommendation that they increase the amount to at least \$200 towards this worthy object.

The Church Choir under the leadership of Mr. George Wilson, assisted by Mr. T. A. Silvester, our organist, gave a series of cantatas, the object being to assist in purchasing a new organ. They were highly successful, and we have now a good Mason & Hamlin instrument, partly paid for. We hope before long to be able to present it to the managers free of debt.

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Wilson, antatas, ey were n instrupresent We regret to announce the removal from the district of an old and true friend of the School, Mr. Robert Staveley, Assistant Superintendent. Mr. Staveley had charge of the Young Men's Bible-class for many years, and exerted a powerful influence among the young men, many of whom will look back in the future to his earnest Christian life, and the good he did them. Our prayers follow him in his new sphere of usefulness, for few among us have led more consistent or holy lives, or followed our Divine Master with such faithfulness.

Our pastor has now charge of the Young Men's Bible-class, and has increased the roll to upwards of 40 members. The Scheme of Lessons is not followed, but a special series of subjects are prepared beforehand, and discussed by both teacher and scholars in the class. By this means our young men are retained in the school, and are being prepared for active Christian work as teachers, and in the church.

Mr. Geo. Wilson still conducts the Ladies' Bible-class, and has up to the present time prepared upwards of twenty of his scholars for the active duties of teachers.

Miss Buchanan, assisted by Miss Foster, has charge of the Infants' Class.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOUR SOCIETY.—This Society now numbers some 112 members in both the Seniors and Juniors Department, and has been of great assistance in doing the Master's work in all its branches during the year.

It has become an educator in our midst, and has taught its members to be cheerful, self-denying followers of Christ, ever on the watch to do His bidding, and to seek to bring hope and comfort to those in distress, or to those who may be upon beds of pain and suffering.

Surely in doing this, are we not following our Saviour's command "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto Me?"

Our year has been one of great success, and we pray that God may abundantly bless us in the year to come.

SCHEDULE COMMITTEE.—This Committee although in its first year of operation, has pleasure in announcing that the sum of \$100 was raised for the Schemes of the church, said amount to be apportioned at the annual meeting to be held in January.
KIRK-SESSION.—The work of the Session has been most encouraging since we have been organized as a church, and at every communion service we are pleased to see new names added to the roll of membership. The roll now numbers 143 members. Our pastor has been most zealous in his efforts to preach a pure Gospel, and to ever seek the advancement of his Master's kingdom on earth, believing that the church is God's appointed way of winning back lost and erring souls to better lives.

The services are well attended, the evening service especially, when every seat is occupied.

During the year, our session fund disbursed \$59.20 for charitable and other purposes, leaving a balance of \$1.74 in the treasurer's hands.

The thanks of our congregation are due to Mr. T. A. Silvester, our organist, for the good music we have enjoyed during the year, and to the members of the choir who have assisted him each Sabbath.

Our Building Committee have to report, that after having had plans made for addition to the church, and estimating the cost, they have decided to leave the matter in abeyance for the time being.

This report of work done by the Missionary Auxiliary is dated from March, 1892, as it has been thought best to bring it up to January, 1894, and not follow, as heretofore, the missionary year ending in March. The time to be covered therefore, is twenty-two months. In June, 1892, boxes of clothing were sent to Pincher Creek and Birtle, and work bags to the Sailors' Institute; in December, toys to Mr. Whyte's school at Kamsack. In June, 1893, bales of clothing to Birtle, and boxes of books to three missionaries in the North-West. Books and toys at Christmas to Mr. Frew's Indian School at Birtle. Clothing has also been made for the local poor, and distributed by Miss McSween, and by Madame Coté for the French Mission.

Meetings have been held monthly during the winter, and we are much indebted to Mrs. Carus-Wilson, Dr. Barclay, Mr. Frew, and one of the Donalda students, for papers and addresses.

Several new circles have been formed, and we feel that we have cause for encouragement and thankfulness for the help given to us in our work.
