## INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

### SIXTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The Sixteenth Annual Meeting of the Infants' Home and Infirmary was held at the Home, on Saturday, October 31st. There was a large attendance of ladies and gentlemen interested in charitable work. Sir Wm. Howland being unable to attend Mr. W. B. McMurrich kindly presided. Letters of regret for non-attendance were read from Prof. Goldwin Smith, Mr. Kilgour and others. The meeting was opened with prayer by Dr. McTavish, and addresses in favour and praise of the work of the Home were delivered by Mr. George Mackenzie, Mr. Herbert Mason, Rev. H. Johnston, Mr. Hoyles, and other gentlemen in moving the adoption of the various reports presented. The meeting closed with prayer by the Rev. J. Pearson, after which refreshments were served to their visitors by the managers.

### MANAGERS' REPORT OCTOBER 31ST, 1891.

Year after year has gone by, and the managers of the Infants' Home feel that in offering the sixteenth report of this charity, it is indeed true that Hitherto the Lord has helped them, and the wants and needs of their large and helpless family have been by Him supplied.

In the report of a Home such as this, naturally the yearly story is much about the same, but just consider for one moment, the story may sound the same, but alas, it is of new sorrows for each year. We report the statistics of our

institution, but how impossible in the brief record to which you now listen, to recount a tithe of the wretchedness, and hardships which have caused the entrance to our Home of its present inmates.

The pity and compassion which sixteen years ago filled the hearts of a few devoted women, prompting the formation of a refuge for sick or destitute infants, must always continue with their successors in the management of such a Home, it requiring courage and zeal to persevere in a work the inward principles of which are so little understood and appreciated by a large proportion of Toronto people.

Beyond the routine work of the Home we have but little to report. Last year we spoke of the repairs and improvements we were enabled to make to our building owing to funds appropriated from the Kermess receipts, realized by us the preceding year. The comfort of our little ones has been much increased by extending their verandah accommodation, and owing to minor sanitary improvements the usual good health of our nursery children has been still further promoted.

The managers last year expressed the hope that the good work of this Home might be enlarged by the addition of a wing or annex, thus enabling us to retain our older children until five or six years of age. We continue to hope that such addition to our usefulness may yet be accomplished, the need exists and surely must be supplied, so we are content to patiently add small donations to a fund for this purpose, feeling sure that the money will be forthcoming in due time. So many people say "Do not the other Homes take in these older children? there can therefore be no real necessity for this extra outlay." Could such objectors see for themselves the many sad instances where deserted wives or widows refuse to come into the Home, with perhaps two small children, because there is nowhere that the four or five-year old boy or girl can be placed, they would realize how the constant pressure of this want is felt by our managers. Not only in cases such as these is this gap in our charities apparent, but in our own nursery. Many mothers know the difficulties in household management with three or four

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children nearly of an age; how much more must such difficulties be felt in an institution such as this, for as the children grow beyond their first babyhood, they need more space and more freedom to play, advantages which we cannot at present give them.

It is one thing to listen to, or read such words as these, but not so easy to stir oneself into active sympathy with a charity which must always need zealous and intelligent championship. Our large and fair Dominion as shown by the last census, cannot afford to lose in her population, and all organizations tending to preserve infant life, also to foster and develop the growth and intellect of our future citizens, should receive the most earnest care and encouragement from all classes of our community. To build the needed wing to our Home at a probable cost of \$4,000, and to provide for the expenditure incurred by doubling our verandah accommodation, are over and beyond our daily needs, our present great anxiety. \$380 will pay for the verandahs, \$4,000 for the new wing, the giving of such sums, to many of our citizens, would involve but slight self-denial, and the benefits derived from such gifts would be untold.

Our adoption of children during the past year has been most satisfactory. This feature of the work done by the Home, is in its results, sufficient encouragement to induce us to persevere against many difficulties in our always uphill work.

The following extracts from letters received by the Secretary will show the feeling the adopters have toward these children.

"The little girl is getting along, she is growing to be a fine girl; she can talk quite plain she is well and looks well. She says she loves her papa and mamma. We are going to get her picture taken and will send you one, that you will see how well she looks. We will be up to the exhibition and will be sure to fetch Florence along."

Again:

"We write a line to let you know how Emma is getting along. She can read the first book; she has not been to school. She is too young to walk so far, but she is going to be very smart to learn. Both my husband and myself are very proud of her; she has not been a day sick since we got her."

Another letter says :

"With regard to the little boy, I am well satisfied with him indeed, he is doing well, and we love him already."

Another letter shows that the managers of the Home do not lose sight of their children :

"DEAR MADAM,—Ten years have rolled away and each letter is but a copy of the first. Dear Ethel is healthy and happy, a very good learner—in the fourth book. She having a liking for music, we have bought her an organ; she has had a quarter's lessons and is well advanced \* \* \*"

In all these cases, two references are required, and a yearly report must be made to the Home, as to the condition of the child, with these precautions taken we entrust our children to their adopted parents feeling sure that they will become the means of bringing sunshine and happiness to many a childless or desolated home.

During the year just closed we have sheltered 162 children, and seventy-nine women, an increase of one infant and four women over the previous year. If you consider the cost of a nursery full of children in a private house, with the anxious question of ways and means, should the parents be not too well off in this world's goods, just try to realize the position of the managers of this Home. The milk bill, the grocer's bill, the baker's bill, with the numerous other bills, all these have to be met, just as in your own homes, and each manager when going her rounds for the yearly subscription to the Home has in her mind, the remembrance of our treasurer's monthly statement of finances, and the feeling that on her efforts the welfare and comfort of so many mothers and children depend.

Of this number 93 were boys, and 68 girls. We have had more children, and a much lower death rate; indeed the health of our children is most exceptionally good. Of the seventy-nine women in the Home during the corresponding period the record is as follows:

A large amount of needlework, also the housework is performed by the nurses; each woman when authorized to do so by the attending physician, taking charge of two infants: the health of the women has been satisfactory.

During the summer we parted with much regret from our matron, Mrs. Jordan, who after three years faithful work, found her health unequal to the constant strain.

The work and daily routine of the Home under the able supervision of our Lady Superintendent, Miss Boulton, continues to be well performed, we feel that to her unremitting care much of our success in this work is due.

"The Little Maids" and the Mulock cots have been kept up as usual during the year; these are as yet the only two cots supported in this manner. The "Maurice Mason" cot is our only one endowed. \$50 yearly will support a cradle, \$1,000 will endow a cot. What more beautiful way of keeping a loved and lost child in perpetual remembrance, than in thus providing a haven of rest for some motherless or deserted infant.

The Wellesley Street and Jessie Ketchum school have continued their useful work of making garments for our little ones, and for household use in the Home. No better work is done in our public schools, than this of teaching the girls needlework, and their sympathies are in this way enlisted on behalf of the special charity for which each school works.

The managers also in this report desire to express their most sincere thanks to those gentlemen friends of the Home who donated the proceeds of their third charity ball "Kermess Assembly" to the handsome amount of \$650, towards the funds of this institution.

The ladies of the workroom continue their never ceasing labours; 162 children need a great many clothes, so even with outside help a very large amount of steady work has to be accomplished every year.

By the death of Miss Jarvis in the early part of this year, a heavy loss was sustained by our inmates, and the friends of this Home. By the members of her Sunday evening Bible-class, her practical teaching and Christian sympathy will not readily be forgotten. This Bible-class is continued by the Misses Gillespie and Livingstone; a week-day class is conducted by Mrs. H. C. Dixon and others. The Sunday morning services are held by the clergy of St. Luke's Church. The Rev. Mr. Pearson, of Holy Trinity Church, is also most kind in his ministrations at the Home. To all of these and other kind friends who interest themselves in the spiritual welfare of the nurses, our heartfelt thanks are due.

By the removal of Dr. Covernton from the city, we lose one of our active medical staff. Dr. Covernton has for several years been untiring in his services to the Home, during his term of active duty, and at the time of the epidemic of measles, which three years ago visited our Home, his unwearied kindness and attention to our many sick and dying children were beyond all praise. To our physicians we owe a debt of gratitude for their constant watchfulness over the health of our nurses and children. Their time and skill are ever at the service of the tiniest of the little sufferers in our infirmary, many of whom come too late, to save their fragile lives.

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To friends who have patiently listened to this report, and to friends who may read it when printed, we would say that this Home aims at the protection and care of infant life, and the restoration of the moral nature, and spiritual life, of often cruelly tempted, and sorely tried young mothers; our record shows that to a great extent our efforts have been successful. True hearted men and women shrink from the too often heard expression "only a baby." God in his wisdom having created them the most helpless of all his creatures, they demand our tenderest care even when the giving of it involves much self denial and anxiety.

It is for you the public of Toronto to show sympathetic interest in this work by increasing your donations or by using your personal influence to aid in the extension and maintenance of a Home the inmates of which are among those of whom the Saviour said: "I say unto you, 'That in heaven their angels do always behold the face of My Father which is in heaven.'"

### PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—During the year now ending there have been admitted to the Home 162 children and seventy-nine nurses. For the year 1889-90 there were 161 children and seventy-five nurses, that is an excess for this year over last of one child and four nurses.

The number of deaths this year was forty-two; the previous year fifty-eight, a gain of sixteen.

The highest monthly death rate this year was December, 1890, eight deaths. The preceding year was February, ten deaths. The lowest monthly death rate this year was October, 1890, no deaths; previous year November, one death.

In looking over the record of deaths this year we find a very large percentage, in fact nearly all the deaths were those of ill-nourished foundlings or diseased children almost in a dying condition when admitted. Twelve of them were out-and-out foundlings. We have really lost none excepting the unhealthy when admitted.

We had during the months of March and April what might be called a mild epidemic of measles. A great many children were afflicted but none fatally. We have never seen a healthier looking lot of children in the Home than at present.

We regret very much Dr. T. S. Covernton, has resigned his position on the staff. He has the very best wishes of his confreres in his work in the far west.

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CONSTITUTION.

OF THE

TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary."

II.

The object of the Home shall be, to receive and tenderly care for destitute infants under two years of age.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money, their babies shall be admitted free.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Committee of thirty ladies, assisted by an Advisory Committee of three gentlemen, and the Committee shall elect annually their Presiding Officers and a Treasurer and Secretary out of their number.

V.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-laws of the Society, provided one month's notice shall be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten managers, including three officers shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the "Advisory Committee."

VI.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at the annual meeting to act as an Advisory Committee. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,—especially in the investment of funds.

VII.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, etc.

VIII.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the conditions, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a chartered bank in the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet-nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet-nurses as possible, each nurse to be intrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

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## II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or, in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

## III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her, before the meeting of the managers, to be signed by the President.

## IV.

A committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, consisting of the President (or Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the general committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each manager taking this duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the weekly committee.

## V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

## VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

### RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Applications for the admission of children must be made to the weekly committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary Street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

### RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services for at least six months to the Institution (or as much longer as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, to be determined by the Board) in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and child.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the lady managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the visiting physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, etc., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her firstborn.

### PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection.
