

# BRITISH CASUALTIES IN BATTLE OF LOOS LAST SEPTEMBER NEARLY 60,000

London, Jan. 5.—The British casualties in the battle of Loos, France, last September, totalled 2,378 officers and 57,288 men, according to an announcement made in the House of Commons this afternoon by Harold J. Tennant, parliamentary under secretary for war.

Killed—Officers, 773; other ranks, 10,345.
Wounded—Officers, 1,288; other ranks, 38,095.
Missing—Officers, 317; other ranks, 8,848.



The proposal of Commissioner Potts to raise the amount required for patriotic and other grants during the present year by a superfax of ten percent. on all property was discussed in the absence of the commissioner, who is unwell, by the other members of the city council at the meeting held at noon yesterday, but no action was taken. His Worship the Mayor pointed out that at least \$71,000 would have to be raised over last year's assessment for fixed charges without any increase in the appropriations. That could only be done, he considered, by raising the assessment by a couple of million dollars or by knocking out the restriction of \$1.98 on the rate of taxation, and to do that would require legislation.




