## PHONE CABLE UNDER RIVER

Now Possible for 600 Conversations at Once Between Windsor and Detroit.

Windsor, Ont., July 12—With promment officials of the Bed Telephone Company of Canada and the Michigan State Telephone Company present, the largest submarine cable in the world was laid today on the bed of the Detroit River between Detroit and Windsor. The cable carries 408 pairs of wires and will make it possible to enduct 600 conversations simultane ously between the two cites.

Half an hour was newled to compete the actual work of laying the cable, the work being directly was towed across by the tug Sammed J. Davk.
When the boats reached mid-stream Judge F. C. The cable weights 50,870 pounds, is 2,000 feet in length and 10½ inches thick.

### Express Wages Down Six Cents Per Hour But Rates Stay Up

Eight Million Dollars Will be Saved by Cut Affecting About 75,000 Employees.

Chicago, July 12—The United States Railroad labor bard today ordered wages of employees of the American Railway Express Company reduced six cents on hour beginning August 1st.

No reduction of express rates is contemplated at this time as a result of the wage cut, express company officials said. It is intimated that approximately eight million dollars will be sliced off the annual labor bill of the company by the reduction. The company employs between 70,000 and 75,000 workers.

### France Will Stay On The Rhine Until **Hun Trial Proper**

Paris, July 12—France has informed Germany she will continue the occupation of the Rhine region until Germany has complied with the conditions of the treaty of Versailles relative to the punishment of those who vibated the rules of civilized warfare in the world war, Premier Briand told the Senate today. Replying to a question, he characterized the findings of the Lepsic court as "scandalous."





Cooling Drinks For Hot Weather

Harmless but refreshing home-brewed drinks for hot weather are always in demand, but especially while we have to boil the water. The fol

we have to boil the water. The following suggestion for cooling drinks may be acceptable.

Vichy or sparking water of some sort is a necessary adjunct for several of the best drinks.

As sugar does not melt readily in iced drinks it is a good idea to make a syrup. Two cupfuls of sugar melted in a cupful of boiling water, then allowed to cool, is excellent for this purpose.

Fresh fruit syrups are easily made and can be kept in bottles in the ice box. Sweetening may be added to suit individual tastes.

One pint of berries, a cupful and a half of sugar melted togetner boiled up once then put through a strainer, will yield aimost a pint of rich juice. When cool it is ready for use.

Served in tall, thin glasses with long-handied spoons, plenty of cracked ice and a few straws, these drinks are a delight to all partakers.


