REPORT,

IN presenting the THIRD REPORT of the WESLEYAN MIS-SIONARY AUXILIARY SOCIETY of the NEW-BRUNSWICK District, the Committee feel much satisfaction in meeting the friends of this good cause in a tone of congratulation on the efficiency of their past exertions, and with the most lively sentiments of gratitude to Almighty God, for the encouraging success which has attended the parent Institution in the widely extended field of its operations.

The progress of Christian Missions in the arduous but merciful enterprize, to enlighten and bless the world, cannot be contemplated by a pious mind without feelings of the deepest interest : every year adds to the number of their victories ; and by hastening the period of their universal triamph over the polluting superstitions which have so long debased and afflicted mankind, strengthens the confidence and invigorates the efforts of their benevolent supporters. We are warranted by the faithful word of prophecy, connect-

ed with the signs of the times, in believing that the sublime and glorious object to which the united prayers and energies of the whole Christian Church are directed, will be certainly, and perhaps speedily realized. The Protestant Church, which has been for some time increasingly Catholic in its spirit, is already, in no small degree, Catholic also in its extent; and encircles in its pale people of many nations, and kindreds, and tongues. It is true, the aggregate number of converts made by all Missionary Societies taken collectively, is comparatively small; but then they are the first fruits of nations :-- they prove, by actual experiment, that universal man may be evangelized. If our dove of peace has returned with but one olive branch in its mouth, we have satisfactory assurance that the wasting waters of that deluge, by which the earth has for so many ages been made desolate, are beginning to retire; and that the soil is prepared to receive and supply the labours of the husbandman ;-peace, joy, and righteousness have already visited the shores of many Continents and Islands, over which a dark and dreary winter has long held its desolating reign; and they are the harbingers of a universal spring. The time of the singing of birds is come, and the earth shall soon yield her increase, and God, even our own God, shall give it his blessing.

Many obstacles may oppose themselves to the spread of the Gospel and the conversion of sinners, but God has promised that his knowledge shall cover the earth as the waters cover the channels of the great deep; and for this purpose he has given his only begotten Son, "for a light to the Gentiles, that he may be his salvation unto the ends of the earth." The Redeemer and Saviour of man shall not labour in vain, nor spend his strength for nought; for he shall be glorious in the eyes of the Lord, and God shall be his strength. Kings shall see and arise, Princes also shall worship him, because of the Lord that is faithful. Your Committee entertain no doubt whatever of the fulfilment of God's faithful word, and are therefore encouraged to proceed in humble dependence upon the influence of the Holy Spirit, knowing assuredly, "the Lord will make bare his arm, in the eyes of all the nations; and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of God." "And the loftiness of man shall be bowed down, and the haughtiness of men shall be made low : and the Lord alone shall be exalted in that day. And the idols he will utterly abolish." The signs of the times bear witness to the dawn of these glorious events. The awakened zeal of all true Christians is a coincidence that should not be overlooked-the powerful Auxiliary of a Bible Societythe promptitude and Christian ardour of promising young men -the talents of eloquent Preachers to plead the cause of missions-the eagerness of the Heathen world to receive missionaries-the piety of humble Christians to pray down surgess, and the liberality of opulent persons to afford support, show that we are not going before, but following after the divine purpose.

The number of Missionary Stations at present occupied by the Wesleyan Missionary Society, is 138, and the number of Missionaries regularly employed is 190, exclusive of Catechists, Schoolmasters, &c. The number of members in our Foreign Societies amounts to 36,917, being an increase for this year of 2025. Of these 22,590 are *Slaves*, and 6470 Free Negroes and persons of Colour, in the West Indian Colonies. The returns of the numbers of Children in the Mission Schools, so far as received are 17,033.

The income of the Society for the year ending \$1st December, 1828, was $\pounds 59,005$ 19s. 4d.; being an advance on the preceding year of $\pounds 6770$ 11s. 7d., and considerably exceeding that of any other year since the formation of the Society. That the friends of this institution may be furnished with every information as to those scenes of labour in which the Wesleyan Missionaries are employed, and the prospects which present themselves to them, your Committe now proceed to give such a view thereof as the limits of this report will allow.

THE IRISH MISSION.

"The accounts from the Missions in IRELAND, to which the Committee first direct their attention, continue to be of a favourable description. Thirteen Districts are still occupied in that country by twenty-one Missionaries, who are unwearied in their zeal, successful in their exertions, and specially cheered by that brighter dawning of the spiritual day with which the sister country is at present favoured. The Schools also, which are established for the instruction of children, and to which the youth of every denomination are admitted, are widely disseminating the uncorrupted principles of Scriptural truth among large masses of the youthful population."

MISSIONS ON THE CONTINENT OF EUROPE, AND IN THE MEDITERRANEAN.

"The reports from FRANCE are cheering. Many of the Protestant churches, in the southern parts of the country, continue to manifest a prompt and willing disposition to receive the doctrines which their fathers and founders advocated. A new station has been formed at Niort, and a pious young graduate of the College of Montauban has been called out into the Missionary field. In Paris, a strong desire is expressed for regular and frequent instruction: and if a more convenient and eligible place of worship could be obtained, there is a probability of success, especially among the French inhabitants."

-"From GIBRALTAR, interesting information has been received, relative to the success of the work of God on that station. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been administered in the Spanish language; several Spaniards have received it from the hands of the Missionaries, and have made a public profession of the Protestant faith; while a late communication affords the pleasing intelligence, that, in the very bosom of Spain, there are persons who sigh over its religious desolations, and fervently desire to obtain Scriptural instruction."

"Peace, and some evidences of prosperity continue to attend the labours of Mr. KÆELING and Dr. NAUDI, at MALTA. This station, and the one at ALEXANDRIA, in Egypt, derive additional interest from their contiguity to the strong holds of Papal and Mohammedau darkness, acircumstance which may ultimately farnish facilities for conveying the "truth as it is in Jesus," into the very centre of those regions where Antichrist reigns with daring impiety and superstition, or where the Crescent has maintained almost undisputed sway; and where the votaries of the Mosque, in violation of every principle of truth, have persisted to regard a compound of ambition and impurity as the great prophet of God."

"At STOCKHOLM considerable interest is produced by the presence and labours of our Missionary, and many encouraging tokens of success have already appeared."

"The IONIAN ISLES, to which a Missionary has but recently been appointed, the Committe regard as affording a valuable post of observation, from which suitable preparations may be made for the communication of Scriptural influence to different parts of Greece. At present, Mr. CROGGON is principally occupied in private instruction, the opportunities of exercising his public ministry being only occasional. Recently Dr. BIAL- LOBLOTZK Gottingen, brace the Palestine."

MISSIONS IN CEYLON AND CONTINENTAL INDIA.

" In this quarter of the world, the Missionaries have had to encounter the most formidable systems of Pagan idolatry; systems consecrated by immemorial antiquity, wrapped in all the subtilties of metaphysical sophistry; imbodied in books of poetry and philosophy, venerable in the eyes of the people for talent and age; inculcated by a numerous and learned priesthood, and intimately associated with every circumstance of civil and domestic life: systems too, which avowedly encourage the vilest passions of the human heart, promote an utter dereliction of sacred principle, and reduce the glorious privilege of immortality to an imaginary state of unimpassioned repose, in which no joy shall gladden and no pain afflict, no activity arouse, and no desire ruffle : but in which the human mind of "large discourse" and lofty presage, shall sink into eternal quiescence and annihilation. Yet Truth is prevailing even over these forms of error. Several of the priests have become "obedient. to the faith," and many of the people have joyfully renounced the boasted advantages of their former worship for the "unsearchable riches of Christ."

SOUTH SEA MISSIONS.

"In New South-WALES and VAN DIEMAN'S LAND the Missions continue to present occurrences, interesting to both the Christian Philanthropist and the friend of social order. During the year, instances have taken place of true conversion, even among the more vicious and abandoned of the inhabitants; and facilities have been providentially afforded for the more unrestrained and general diffusion of light and mercy. Considerable hopes are indulged of the happy results which may arise from the appointment of a Missionary to the Convict Settlements in Van Dieman's Land; while fresh proofs are con-

tinually given of the importance of the labours of Missionaries. in the Circuits already formed in New South Wales, extending over the greater, as well as more populous, part of the settlements. The charity which "seeks" that it may "save" these outcasts of men is eminently Christian, and is recommended by every consideration that can sway the motives of Christian action. These men are our brethren,—banished, indeed, from their native land for their crimes, and justly exposed to the privations of a foreign dwelling,—yet still claimants on our pity. Happy, when, amid the scenes of their merited banishment, they hear the inviting sounds of Evangelical mercy, and afe assisted to secure those inestimable blessings of spiritual rest which, in more favourable circumstances, they had been habituated to despise !"

NEW ZEALAND AND TONGATABOO MISSIONS.

"The Report of last year stated that, by the mysterious permission of Divine Providence, the Missionaries had been compelled to withdraw from New Zealand, their lives having been endangered, and the Mission premises totally destroyed; but that they had retired, indulging a strong persuasion that the seed which they had scattered was not utterly lost, and that, ere long, they would have an opportunity of resuming their beloved though perilous enterprise in that savage land. Their expectations have not been disappointed. Mr. STACK and Mr. and Mrs. Hobbs, with their assistants, have returned to New Zealand, and renewed the Mission in the district of 'Hokianga, agreeably to an invitation from one of the Chiefs. 'HOKIANGA is situated on the western coast, about 40 miles from Wangaroa Bay, the former station, and about 50 miles over land from the Bay of Islands, a station belonging to the Church Missionaries. The population of the neighbourhood is stated at 4000; and the different tribes having their villages upon the banks of a fine navigable river, can be easily and expeditiously visited by a boat. The Missionaries proposed at first to remain at Waihou, the place where they landed, near the resi-dence of PATU-ONE, a friendly Chief, of great influence and considerable talent, about thirty-two miles from the mouth of the river; but afterwards they found it necessary to remove about six miles down the river to a place called MANGUNGU, where their design is to erect suitable dwellings, and form a regular establishment, and from thence to visit all the neigh-

MISSIONS IN SOUTHERN AFRICA.

"Of the Missions in SOUTHERN AFRICA, considering the peculiar difficulties with which they have had to struggle, the Committee are still enabled to speak with great pleasure and satisfaction. 'In almost every place the work advances with multiplied tokens of prosperity and effect. Among the Little Namacquas, who, until of late, ranked among the most untutored and degraded of the human species, many are now rejoicing in the prospects which the Christian Revelation expands to the eye of faith and hope, while they are diligently cultivating the habits, and largely partaking of the comforts of civilized life.

"The cordial reception which the Missionaries have obtained from 'the Chief HINTSA,—the high authorities with which they are invested,—the ardent desire which they have found among the people of the *Mambookie* tribes to receive Christian Missionaries,—and the extraordinary influence of a preparatory nature which seems to rest on all the tribes with which they have any intercourse, encourage the belief that a "great and effectual door" is opened among a willing, though deeply benighted population, and that a course of Christian operation is happily commenced, which promises, through that agency which gives life to the dead, to raise some of the most abject of the human race into civilized men, adorned with Christian virtues, and elevated by heavenly hope."

MISSIONS IN WESTERN AFRICA.

"The Missions in WESTERN AFRICA have been prosecuted by the brethren under various discouragements; but with cheering prospects of success. The following extract from a letter, from Messrs. COURTIES and MAY, dated *Sierra Leone*, will be read with pleasure.

"With respect to the work on this station, it has been, and still continues to be, attended with a slow, but gradual revival. Our numbers continue to increase, and the members, in general, are regular in their attendance at the Classes, and the other means of grace; and of some of them, we believe, it may be said, that they are growing in grace, and in the knowledge of our our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

"Our number of members in this quarter is 146, making an increase of seventeen, besides 10 on trial."

WEST INDIAN MISSIONS.

"From the copious documents which the Committee have received relating to the progress of the WEST INDIAN Missions, they might select much pleasing and important intelligence. Nearly all the stations are favoured with great and growing prosperity. The schools are established on a regular and efficient system, and the effects which they are producing on the negro-children are most encouraging.

"To urge the importance of Missionary exertions among the Negro population of the West Indies, is almost superfluous. The claims of those islands on Christian philanthropy are now generally understood and acknowledged. Our Missions there are the oldest, the most extensive, and, it may be added, rapid as is the prevalence of truth in some other sections of the globe, the most successsful of all that have yet engaged our attention. They are established among a much-injured race; they are hallowed to our best feelings by the toils, the sufferings, and premature deaths of many excellent Missionaries; they have been the means of diffusing innumerable blessings, temporal and spiritual, among those for whom Christian sympathy was slow to awake; they have been honoured by the holy triumph of thousands in the hour of sickness and dissolution : and, amid the victories which they have achieved, and the animating prospects by which they are brightened, they will not now be forgotten in the prayers, and compassions, and liberalities of Christian beneficence.

"JAMAICA.—A spirit of determined hostility, to the exertions of the Missionaries, has again been manifested at the station of St. Ann's Bay. Under pretence of the right of local authorities, to require licenses to be obtained from the Magistrates of every place in which the Missionaries preach, Messrs. WHITEHOUSE and ORTON were imprisoned in the Common Jail. Common femoved is Honour the Chief Justice, (WILLIAM ANGLING SCAMETT, Esq.), who pronounced the imprisonment illegal, and ordered the prisoners to be immediately discharged. His Excellency, Sir JOHN KEANE, K. C. B., Lieutenant-Governor, afterwards dismissed the magistrates from office, who had signed the warrant for imprisonment; thus affording another instance of that just and enlightened policy, which is so eminently calculated to impress the minds of British subjects with gratitude to God and loyalty to the King; and to bind them cordially and strongly to the liberal and impartial Government, under which it is their happines's to live."

MISSIONS IN BRITISH AMERICA.

"The Missions in BRITISH AMERICA, extending over the Districts of CANADA, NOVA SCOTIA, NEW BRUNSWICK, and NEWFOUNDLAND, are in a state of progressive improvement; and several of them have acquired the stability and consistency of English Circuits."

"The LABRADOR MISSION is, for the present, suspended; principally, in consequence of the removal of the Esquimaux tribes from the coast into the interior of the country, and their general dispersion."

Soldiers of Christ may fall as they urge their glorious warfare ; but others are prepared to occupy their vacant ranks, to prosecute their growing conquests, and to share in their eternal recompense.
