

Report of the Central Council of Toronto

FOR THE YEAR 1899.

During the past year one new Conference was organized and aggregated to the Society—St. Peter-in-Chains of Trenton, in the Diocese of Kingston (aggregated 4th December, 1899). At the close of the year the number of Conferences was 29, and of these, all have reported except three. Two Conferences that were in abeyance the previous year have revived, and two are still in abeyance. One of the non-reporting Conferences—Our Lady of Brantford—has been interrupted in its work by the long and serious illness of the President and other changes in the officers, but succeeded in reorganizing towards the close of the year, and it is hoped that it will not be missing from the next Annual Report. The following pages, therefore, contain reports from three Councils and twenty-six Conferences.

The number of active members at the end of 1899 was 486, and the average attendance at meetings 245. The number of families relieved was 596, and the total number of persons relieved, 2,155.

The receipts for the year, exclusive of the balances from previous year, amounted to \$6,727.47, and of this amount \$1,139.78 was contributed by the members at their weekly meetings. The expenditure for the year amounted to \$6,190.95, and the balances on hand on the 31st December, 1899, were \$2,512.78—only one Conference showing a deficit.

In order to secure uniformity in the Annual Reports, the Central Council has, since its institution, sent blank forms to the Councils and Conferences of the circumscription, and it is expected that they will be used, and two at least promptly returned to the Council, properly filled up. The form used for the last report has been adapted from

one kindly sent to this Council by the President of the Particular Council of New York, and contains a number of questions on the works of the Conference which the Presidents are requested to answer. Several have replied to the questions, and have given the details of the works carried on by the Conferences, which are very interesting and edifying, but the greater number have either omitted to answer altogether, or have given but few particulars. A circular letter addressed to the Councils and Conferences of France by the President-General a short time ago bears particularly on this point. He presses upon their attention the necessity of preparing and sending in complete and carefully made up reports containing the statistics of the Conference, and asks "what would become of a merchant if he neglected to make out his balance sheet every year, and to ascertain the profit and loss made by his business? In the same way it may be asserted that an. association which does not try to make a serious examination of conscience, at least once a year, is exposing itself to the danger of decay. The statistics ought to be discussed in Conference, and all the questions put by the Council ought to be answered, as each has its special object, and in order to have the report full and complete the greater part of one of the meetings of the month of January in each year should be set apart for the work.

From the replies received with the last report, it appears that the principal and fundamental work of the Society—visiting the poor in their homes—has been fairly well carried out by the conferences; but a few evidently neglect this important duty altogether or perform it very carelessly. They seem to imagine that, as the members know the circumstances of the families applying for relief, it is not necessary to visit them regularly. This is a mis-

take that Presidents should not allow to prevail.

With regard to the observance of the Festivals of the Society, the replies received indicate that the isolated Conferences—those outside the cities where there are Particular Councils—do not keep the feasts very regularly. The same remark applies to the article of the Rule which requires a spiritual reading at the meetings after the opening prayer. This, it is recommended, should be short, interesting and practical and each member should be called upon to perform the duty in turn. It is also

observed that several of the Conferences do not subscribe for the Bulletin of the Society, which contains so much information on the operations of the Society in generalnecessary for members to know if they, wish to keep in touch with the spirit of the Society. The English Bulletin of the Society has been the subject of a communication addressed to this Council by the President-General during the year, in which he states that he cannot understand the want of support shown by the Canadian Conferences where the English language is in use. This is no doubt, in most cases, the result of carelessness; but it has, nevertheless, been the occasion of some embarrassment to the Council of Ireland who publish the English Bulletin, and during the past year the Council-General were obliged to come to its assistance. The President-General hopes that the Conferences within the circumscription of the Council of Toronto will at once recognize the claims of the Bulletin, subscribe for at least one copy of it, and that Presidents will encourage the reading of it by members. The yearly subscription is only about 65 cents, and it may be ordered either through this Council, or direct from the office of publication, 50 Upper Sackville street, Dublin.

(TRANSLATION.)

Paris, 9th February, '99:

SIR AND DEAR BROTHER,—We were very much pleased to receive the Annual Report of the Central Council of Toronto—the first published since the institution of the Council.

The good results already apparent prove how much this organization was needed, and how much we may expect it to contribute to the propagation of our work in Canada. Three new conferences have already been added to the 23 which were originally attached to the Council, and we have great hopes that the year 1899 will not be less fruitful in happy results.

The Council General was happy to notice the increase in works, apart from that of visiting the poor in their homes, which have been taken up by our brothers. To the work of visiting the hospitals, etc., and that of managing parochial libraries you have added the night school in St. Nicholas' Home. No good work meets more fully the wants of the present day than that which interests itself specially in the care of youth and aims at providing for our working classes of the future, heads of families who will be thoroughly Christian. We would like to indulge the hope of seeing some day in Toronto a patronage for young apprentices and working men organized on the models of the one which has been working so beneficially in Quebec formany years.

We are deeply affected by the interest taken in your works by your Venerable Archbishop, and it was well that you were in a position to show gratitude by immediately complying with his request and welcoming to your chapel of St. Vincent's Hall, the Greek Catholics, who have sought a refuge in Canada. They are persecuted and unfortunate brothers who are entitled to the charity of the society.

At the general meeting of the society held on the 23rd July, 1899-the first that occurred after the elevation of His Grace the Most Reverend Dr. O'Connor to the Archepiscopal See of Toronto-he kindly consented to be present, and received the respectful congratulations of the society. His Grace was informed of the position and standing of the society in the city of Toronto and in the archdiocese, and also of the honor conferred upon it by his predecessor who had been pleased to accept the position of patron, and he was solicited to honor the society by accepting a similar position. This request was graciously acceded to, and His Grace assured the meeting that he took a deep interest in the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, hoped that it would increase in membership and promised that he would endeavor to assist them every way he could in carrying on the good works they had undertaken.

The Central Council is under obligations to our brothers of the Particular Councils of Hamilton and London and of the conferences of Our Lady of Guelph, Our Lady of Lindsy and St. Joseph of Chatham for contributions towards the expenses connected with the work of the Council.

The conference of St. Patrick reports on two special works which have been managed by the conference for some years—the Parish Library which now contains over one thousand volumes. It is kept open every Sunday afternoon by two of the members.

The Conference has charge of a building which is used as a house of refuge for five or six aged and destitute widows. They have apartments therein, rent free, and the Conference keeps the house in repair and pays the mater rates besides granting relief to such of the inmates as are in need.

The Conference of Our Lady of Lourdes has assisted in placing three children in the Orphanage, and has also collected a quantity of clothing which has been distributed amongst the poor families.

The Conference of St. Basil has a library in the church porch which is open every Sunday and managed by two of the members. It now contains 1,552 volumes. The Conference also supplies the children of the Sunday school with a semi-monthly paper.

The Hospital Board, composed of representatives from five of the Conferences, visits the General Hospital every Sunday afternoon. During the year it expended \$49.08 in providing prayer books and interesting reading matter for the patients in the General and St. Michael's Hospitals, for the boys in St. Nicholas' Institute and in the St. John's Industrial School, and also for the children in the Sacred

Heart Orphanage at Sunnyside. The night school for the working boys in St. Nicholas', which was unavoidably delayed until January, was attended by thirty-two boys, and according to the report of the teacher, during the period it was open-three months-they were punctual and attentive to the work assigned to them and gave every evidence of appreciation of the advantages offered. With the approval of His Grace the Archbishop, the Reverend Mother Superior of St. Joseph's Convent placed one of the sisters, an experienced teacher, in charge of the night school.

The Council of London reports, that they have been very fortunate in receiving from a lady benefactor a bequest of a piece of property which has been disposed of, and the funds used in carrying on the works of the Conferences-The Council has appointed a committee to meet peri cdically with a similar body belonging to the Children of Mary, for conference and exchange of notes relative to the poor families helped by both Societies. They have found these conferences very beneficial, as they are supplied with valuable information not otherwise obtainable. Council has also representatives on the Children's Aid Society of London and the Associated Charities, a city organization, whose object is to prevent imposture, to provide work for those in need, and procure plots of land and a supply of seed for those who are willing to cultivate and raise vegetables. During the last summer 49 persons' secured plots for raising potatoes, and their efforts were very successful, as their harvest averaged over 25 bushels each. This appears to be a work similar to one referred to in the last General Report of the Society in France called "Gardens for Workmen." It has already been taken up by several of the French Conferences.

The Conference of St. Patrick visits the hospitals every Sunday and distributes reading. This Conference also purchased a quantity of materials for a basket-maker, enabling him to carry on his business and earn a living.

The Conference of St. Joseph had a case of great hardship to attend to during the year. An aged couple were discovered in an outhouse where their poverty had compelled them to take refuge, and the misery and squallor of which cannot be described. A room was secured by the Conference and partly furnished, and the old couple removed to it. They are now in comparative comfort, as the place they had left was not fit for cattle, and has since been torn down.

ISOLATED CONFERENCES.

The Conference of Our Lady of Guelph mentions two special cases. The first was that of a poor family who arrived in the city entirely destitute, and with a sick father. They were supplied with a stove, furniture and bedding, and were visited weekly and assisted until the father recovered and was able to work. The children also were comfortably clad, and enabled to attend school regularly.

Several years ago a poor family was assisted by the Conference, and loaned a sum of money to enable them to tide over a crisis. Having attained to better circumstances, the money was all paid back during the past year.

The Conference is very vigilant in looking after neglected children. Several have been placed in comfortable homes, and others in the Orphans' Home at Dundas. In this good work they are encouraged and assisted by the parish priest and the solicitor. So far as known, this is the only Conference within the circumscription that has adopted the beautiful devotion of the nocturnal adoration. The members supply the guard of honor in the parish church from Holy Thursday evening to Good Friday morning.

ORILIA—The Conference of the Angel Guardian reports having sent a poor woman to St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto; while there, they paid half of the expenses, and had the satisfaction of learning that it was the means of saving her life.

Kingston.—The Conference of St. Mary Immaculate reports that the members visit the poor families regularly, and endeavor to get parents to send their children to school, and also to induce both parents and children to attend Mass regularly. They also look after neglected children who are taken in charge by the Children's Aid Society. During the year they secured the baptism of three children between 1 and 4 years of age, who had been neglected by their parents.

Chatham.—The Conference of St. Joseph assisted a poor family whose head was a patient in St. Joseph's Hospital; the members visited him there until he died.

Another patient in the General Hospital was visited by some of the members who were the means of securing for him the consolations of religion before he died. The mother of a family of four children, who was in delicate health, was also placed in St. Joseph's Hospital until she recovered.

Lindsay.—The Conference of Our Lady reports that a Home for the Aged has been established in the town, and several persons formerly relieved by the Society have found refuge there. Three of the members are on the Management Committee of this Home. One old lady refuses to become an inmate, although she would be more comfortable there than living alone, and the Conference assists her.

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY.

This society has been in existence for over five years, having been organized by the Particular Council of Toronto at the request of His Grace the late Archbishop Walsh in the Fall of 1894, and shortly afterwards incorporated as an independent society under the Children's Protection Act of Ontario. It may, therefore, be considered as one of our special works, and the great success that has crowned its efforts in the work of child-saving must be a source of gratification to the members of our society.

The last annual report (the fifth) shows that during the year 295 cases were brought to the notice of the Children's Aid Society, affecting the interests of 418 children. Of these 155 were cases in the children's court, and the remainder, 140, were cases of various kinds reported at the agent's office. The cases in the Children's Court were

The private cases are a most important part of the work—parents are visited and warned, their attention drawn to the provisions of the law, and advice is given and mediation used between parents and children where the latter are inclined to be wayward. This course of action generally succeeds in producing a reformation of conduct, but when it failed the agent was obliged to bring the offenders before the court, where the children have in many cases been committed to the care of the society. During the year ten children were made wards of the

society, and eight of these were placed out in foster homes and two others are on probation. The most satisfactory reports have been received from nearly all of the children

placed out.

It is also shown that since the society was organized 1278 cases affecting the interests of 2136 children have had its best consideration and assistance. Forty boys have been sent to St. John's Industrial School, which is under the management of the Christian Brothers, and 48 children have been made wards of the society, and good foster homes found for the majority of them.

The society recieves an annual grant of \$500 from the Toronto City Council, and this is supplemented by the fees of the members—one dollar a year—and donations from benevolent friends. As a salaried agent, who attends the Police Court daily, and looks after the cases in which the society is interested, is necessary, and the maintenance of the children in the temporary shelters has to be provided for, an increase of revenue is very much needed. It is hoped, therefore, that those who take an interest in this deserving work will assist it with their donations, which, no matter how small, will be thankfully received. Applications for children for adoption or for information relative to the society and its work should be made at the agent's office, St. Vincent's Hall, corner of Shuter and Victoria streets.

At the last annual meeting of the Children's Aid-Society it was stated that authority had been received for the establishment of an Industrial School for Catholic Girls, at West Lodge, where the Sisters of the Good Shepherd have set apart one of their buildings for the purpose. This long desired school is therefore now open. As the two schools referred to—St. John's Industrial School, East Toronto, for boys, and St. Mary's Industrial School, Parkdale, Toronto, for girls—are now properly certified by the Provincial Government, and authorized to receive children from any part of the Province, a few extracts from the Act under which they are working may be of use to officers of Conferences who occasionally have cases of neglected or wayward children to deal with:

11.—(1) Any person may, at a special sitting, bring before the Police Magistrate, or before the Judge of the County Court, and, except in cities, where there is a Police Magisan

trate, before any Justice of the Peace, any child apparently under the age of fourteen years, who comes within any of the following descriptions:

- (a) Who is found begging or receiving alms, or being in any street or public place for the purpose of begging or receiving alms:
- (b) Who so found wandering, and not having any home or settled place of abode or proper guardianship, or not having any lawful occupation or business, or visible means of subsistence:
- (c) Who is found destitute, either being an orphan or hava surviving parent, who is undergoing penal servitude or imprisonment:
- (d) Whose parent, step parent or guardian, represents to the Judge or Magistrate that he is unable to control the child, and that he desires the child to be sent to an Industrial School, under this Act;
- (e) Who, by reason of the neglect, drunkenness or other vices of the parents, is suffered to be growing up without salutary parental control and education, or in circumstances exposing him to lead an idle and dissplute life;
- (f) Who has been found guilty of petty crime, and who, in the opinion of the Judge or Magistrate, before whom he has been convicted, should be sent to an Industrial School instead of to a Gaol or Reformatory;
- (g). Who (being a child between eight and fourteen years of age) has been expelled from school for vicious and immoral conduct.
- 12. If the Judge or Magistrate is satisfied on enquiry that it is expedient to deal with the child under this Act, he may order him to be sent to a certified industrial school: which order shall be in writing and shall specify the name of the school, and the time for which the child is to be detained in the school, being such time as to the Judge or Magistrate seems proper for the teaching and training of the child, but not in any case extending beyond the time when the child will attain the age of sixteen years.
- 17. In case an industrial school is established by the Roman Catholic Separate School trustees in any city, the Judge or Magistrate shall endeavour to ascertain the religious persuasion to which every child to be sent by him to an industrial school belongs, and shall, as far as practicable, send Roman Catholic children to the Roman Catholic industrial school, and other children to the other industrial school; and if a parent or guardian, or in case there is no parent or guardian, then if the nearest adult relative of a child in a Roman Catholic Separate School claims that the child should be sent to the industrial school under the said board of trustees, or

claims that a child in an industrial school established by the latter should be sent to the Roman Catholic Separate School, the minister, on being satisfied of the justness of such claim, shall order a transfer of the child accordingly, provided that the managers of the school to which the transfer is to be made are willing to receive the child.
