## Editorial Notes.

Sir Charles Tupper still holds the reins of power and is expected to continue to do so until the question of accounts has been concluded and the total on both sides has been summed up.

The Liberals, hungry for office, are growing at the Government's delay in tendering their resignation but the present Government is not following the precedent established by the Liberal Government when the people voted them out of power and so they must as patiently as we wait until the Government is ready to give up their positions and make way for a new Liberal Government.

In the meantime accounts are being proceeded with, with varying success and in a short time will have been declared, and the final step taken, then the fun will commence.

Owing to the prospective resignation of Hon. A. G. Blair as a member of the Local Government and house the members of the Local Government have been in session to prepare for the future course to be laid out. This is said to mean that there is a fight as to who is to be the new leader, and will put an end to the one man government prevailing of late years. Various changes are spoken of and it is possible, although hardly probable, that it will not be long before we have another general election for the local. Anticipated changes in the personnel of the executive will make necessary a bye election or two and then Northumberland demand that a writ be issued for an election to fill the vacancy in her representation caused by the resignation of Mr. James Robinson. It is now just that the vacancy has remained unfilled for so long a time and the county representation thereby illegally reduced.

## Cabinet Making.

Cabinet making appears to be the order of the day and newspapers on both sides of politics have been publishing probable composition of new cabinets. In New Brunswick the elect, and not elect too, it appears, are anxious of one another's chances for office as stated. Col. Denville is reported to be kicking for all he is worth because he is not put down as Minister of Militia, to which he has undoubted claims, not only for his services in the militia, but also for his services in the Liberal interest but also because he has some knowledge of what the duties of the office require. Then Mr. John V. Ellis, of the St. John Globe rightly thinks he is deserving of the office of a portfolio, although perhaps doubtful of reelection. But to enable him to win such an election it might again be advisable to nominate an independent in case the Conservatives placed a man in opposition, so as to ensure his election which would be doubtful with only a conservative opposing him. But outside of these matters the preposterous statement is made that the Hon. A. G. Blair, who is not a member of the Dominion Parliament, has the inside track of Mr. Ellis and will find a constituency in this Province to elect him to a seat and a portfolio. Mr. Blair's record is against him as an honest and economical administrator of public affairs, and in our opinion he is one of the kind of politicians the Liberal leader should keep as far off as possible from a share in managing Dominion finances. With such men as he in the cabinet, veritable Jonahs, it will be impossible to economically administer the affairs of the country, and in a few years if the Liberals remain in power that long, which is very doubtful, the finances would become as intricately mixed up as has those of New Brunswick. As between these two men whose names are mentioned as probable office bearers in the Dominion Cabinet there seems to be but one opinion. For honesty of purpose and faithful support of the Liberal party the universal opinion is in favor of Mr. Blair. Mr. Blair would have accepted a judgeship or anything else the conservative Government would give him to keep out of the fight against them. They did not consider he was worth buying and the appointment Mr. Blair craved was given to another and he at once went into the fight as a Liberal, when a few weeks before it was hard to tell by his public utterances and political indifference on what side he was. Such an appointment would have been a most preposterous one and would have done many Conservatives from their allegiance to their party, and the Government were favorably commented upon by their action in not appointing Mr. Blair.

## Assault and Shooting Affair.

Early on Monday morning there was much excitement in this town owing to the fact that N. R. Mackenzie, one of its business men, had been seriously wounded by a shot from a revolver, and another, John McKane, slightly wounded in the scalp.

The following so far as we can learn are the facts of the lamentable case.

Dr. John H. Beynon, an American traveler for the Magnolia Metal Co., of 74 Courtland St., New York, arrived here from Montreal on Saturday. Owing to poor health he had been advised to travel North for his health and was combining business with his trip. He put up at the Waverley Hotel. He retired to his room and went to bed about 10 o'clock on Sunday night leaving orders to be called at 6 o'clock on Monday morning.

He was awakened about 3 o'clock by loud singing and shouting and pounding on the partition between his room and the next. After hearing it for a while Mr. Beynon sang out to them to make less noise as he wanted to sleep. The noise continued and hearing some one in the hall he got up and opened the door opposite his also and found a man in the hall who was shouting and shouting at him. He was in his night clothes and with bare feet.

The persons were in the hall and they asked him who he was and what right he had to interfere with them. He replied he had paid for his room and he wanted to sleep, and it was very unfair for them to carry on the way they were doing. Hot words passed between them when all of a sudden a chair standing near them and a scuffle ensued over the possession of it, and it was pulled to pieces in their hands.

During the scuffle they had worked their way into another room, the three, (the one being a man named Hall, of Truro, N. S.), attacking him and Beynon defending himself as best he could. They got him in a corner where he dropped down and crawled out between their legs and made for his own room. McKane followed him, Hall being too drunk to be at all active in following the others. When Beynon got to his own room he seized a revolver which was lying on the table and drew it and fired three shots. One of the two first ploughed a furrow along the scalp at the top of McKane's head, the third striking McKane in the arm and entering high up on the left breast, glancing off a bone and supposed to have gone round the shoulder and has not yet been located. McKane sang out "I am killed," when McKane let go the hold of Beynon and ran out of the room. Beynon then went to a room where he knew Mr. Peterson, of Philadelphia, slept, roused him up and told him of the trouble he was in, and that he was going to give himself up. Deputy Sheriff Irvine was sent for and Beynon was escorted to jail. In the meantime the inmates of the Waverley had become alarmed. McKane was carried to his room and Drs. Desmond and Pedelin summoned.

The revolver from which the shot was fired was a cheap self cocking one of .38 calibre, which Beynon had purchased in Montreal and loaded there. He intended to travel a good deal by bicycle and wanted to get a frighten away dogs if they attacked him. It was lying on the table in his room just as he had left it after showing it to a friend the evening before. It had never been fired before the shooting took place.

There is an old adage that "every bullet has its billet," but the universal opinion is that the bullet which ought to have been struck was John McKane, as he has been the ringleader in such orgies for some time past and a serious wound would perhaps have brought him to his senses; for him there would have been no pity and "serve him right" the general verdict. Such men are a menace to the peace and happiness of a town by the evil example and influence of their evil. "Left the country for the country's good," would be the best news respectable law abiding people could hear of.

A death-like stillness came over the court room and every one was moved, but the prisoner never flinched, his face only becoming a little pallid.

Mr. Harrington then moved for sentence. The clerk asked the condemned man: 'Have you anything to say why sentence of death should not be passed upon you?' 'No, your honor.'
