town like wild fire and in the second
innings when Ingram for the I.C.R.
and Clyde Lutz for the Vics went
to bat the glad hand was extended

WILLIAM ALLEN KILLED BY TRAIN

**Was Alone on Track Near
Chapel Hill Crossing
When Struck**

INQUEST HELD

At an early hour. Sunday morn-
ing the body of a man was found
lying near the I.C.R. track in the
vicinity of the oil tanks at the lower
end of the town. Policeman Mann
was notified, who sent for Dr.
Pinault, but the man had been dead
for some time.

The body was removed to Gra-
ham's undertaking rooms, and on
Monday an inquest was held.

The following jurymen were sum-
moned C. T. Cool, Jas. D. Murray,
Alex. Canty, Andrew Nash, James
Devine, Finley McRae and Scott
Moffat.

After viewing the body the in-
quest adjourned until 3 o'clock Tue-
day to allow Dr. Pinault to hold a
postmortem examination.

Tuesday afternoon a number of
witnesses were examined. These
had all been with Allen on Saturday
evening when considerable liquor
had been dispensed with, until all
became intoxicated. Some remem-
bered part of the proceedings of the
night while others did not. They
all stated that there had been no
quarrelling. Allen had left the
others to go home, going up the
track towards the Campbellton de-
pot.

Dr. Pinault's evidence showed
that deceased had met with a severe
accident, such as being struck by a
train. His neck was dislocated,
several ribs were broken, lung pier-
ced and kidneys torn.

After patiently listening to the
evidence of all these witnesses in
the police court, the jury brought
in the following verdict.

That the said William Allen came
to his death on the morning of the
20th day of July, A. D., 1913, by
accident, apparently being struck
by a train within the limits of the
said town of Campbellton.

Deceased was about 35 years of
age and leaves a wife and child who
have the sympathy of all in their
sad bereavement.

I.C.R. Ingram hit through short
stop and scored on Davies two bag-
er to centre field. Lavoie got to
3rd on McLean's overthrow to Love
to catch Ingram and scored on
Shirleys out at first after 3 strikes.
Davies out at first, Fairley out at
first after three strikes.]

Vics. McLean struck out, Dickie
struck out, Lutz safe at 1st after
three strikes, stole 2nd and 3rd and
dies when Roy struck out.

KILLING MOOSE OUT OF SEASON

On July 4th, C. A. Trafton,
Warden of Five Fingers, Interna-
tional Railway, reported Edouard
Pelletier for setting snares for
moose on Lot 99, Range 14, Hazen
Settlement.

On June 17, Warden James T.
Masten, of Campbell Settlement,
York County, laid a complaint be-
fore F. C. Brown, J. P., of Middle
Southampton, against Bertrand
Dunham and Amos Brooks for
killing two bull moose on June 16.
The defendants pleaded guilty and
alleged, as extenuation, that moose
were destroying crops. The case
is not yet finished.

On July 5th Warden C. A. Traf-
ton of Five Fingers, International
Railway, had Herbert Bouchard
fined \$10 for carrying a gun in the
forest in close season contrary to
law.

Warden Cowan, of Island River,
Gloucester County, laid informa-
tion before Justice M. M. Dugas,
of Caraquet, against Amede Chias-
son and Joes Chiasson for killing
a cow moose in close season.
Joes Chiasson was found guilty
and sentenced to one month im-
prisonment. Amede Chiasson was
dismissed. Joes Chiasson is now
serving out his sentence in Bath-
urst jail.

MRS. ROBERTS ON LONG WHEEL TRIP

Mrs. Evelyn V. Roberts, who left
Amherst on the 5th of July for Van-
couver, on a bicycle, reached Camp-
bellton on Monday afternoon. She
is supporting herself en route by
taking subscriptions for a couple of
periodicals, selling her photographs,
and writing letters to the Boston
Post and London Mail. She has
taken on a coat of genuine gypsy
tan, and is frequently mistaken for
one of the wandering tribe.

Mrs. Roberts talks very interest-
ingly of her trip. She was loud in
her criticisms of the road makers
who dumped broken stone on the
road for two miles between here and
Richardsville. The road, she says
is impassable for a person on a
wheel and very hard on motors.

Mrs. Roberts is using her own
English bicycle now two years, old
and English tyres, one of which is
also two years old.

CAPITAL TO BE MADE \$500,000

**More Progressive Operations
of Quebec Oriental Line
is Expected**

Inquiry has been received con-
cerning the identification of the
Quebec & Oriental Railway Com-
pany, the five per. cent. first mort-
gage (Metapedia section) bond-
holders of which meet at the Royal
Trust Company on Aug. 13, to in-
crease the bond issue from \$50,000
to \$500,000.

The Quebec Oriental Railway
Company owns and operates a line
running from the Metapedia Junc-
tion of the Intercolonial railway to
New Carlisle, in the Gaspé peninsula.
At that point it connects with the
Atlantic, Quebec & Western railway,
which operates a line of steamships
touching at all important points on
the northern shore of the Bay of
Chaleur and the Gaspé peninsula,
and having Gaspé basin as its north-
ern terminus. The Quebec Oriental
railway is 98 miles in length, and it
is operated from New Carlisle.

It is understood that the greater
part of the bonds are held by a firm
of Spanish bankers, with an import-
ant office in London. The Atlantic,
Quebec & Western railway is owned
and operated by the same interest,
T. C. Casgrain, K. C., of Montreal
represents the English bondholders.

BLAMES THE BANKS FOR THE STRINGENCY

Moose Jaw Times Says That City Cannot Pay Employees

Moose Jaw, Sask., July 21.—The Moose Jaw Times, in a front-page editorial, declares that the west has never seen such a financial stringency since the eighties, and blames the banks. It declares that the city cannot get a cent from the Bank of Commerce to even pay the wages of the employees.

It states that scores of men are being discharged, and wages are unpaid everywhere, and the folly of the whole matter is that a few millions would relieve the situation if circulated, allowing everybody to meet his obligations.

The Times declares that it is the duty of the Dominion Government to come to the aid of the country to prevent thousands of firms from failure in the next six weeks, and that it can do this if it chooses, and that the Government of Canada ought to be in a position to put in circulation fifteen million dollars in additional currency if it can afford to advance such huge cash sums to the railways.

WELL ENTERTAINED AT DALHOUSIE

Geological Congress Pay Visit to Bay Chaleur Places of Interest

Dalhousie, N. B., July 19.—After an enjoyable trip this week to the eastern extremity of the Gaspé Peninsula, the eighty members composing excursion No. 1 of the Geological International Congress, arrived here by special train at 7 o'clock Friday evening. Interviewed as to their Bay Chaleur trip, they said that they had examined on Wednesday the Paleozoic Strata and Appalachian structure displayed below Gaspé. On Thursday at Percé, they sailed around the famous Percé Rock and Bonaventure Island and pronounced Percé as a most interesting section for geologists and artists. At Black Cape they made a partial examination of the silurian 7,000 feet thick. On Friday evening at 9 o'clock the visitors were entertained by the citizens of Dalhousie in the new Star Theatre, which was decorated for the occasion. Following an address of welcome, which was read by Mayor Montgomery, and the replies of the guests who spoke of the kindness and hospitality they had so far met with on Canadian soil, there was carried out a most enjoyable programme of music, readings, dancing and refreshments. About 150 of the ladies and gentlemen of Dalhousie were present to help the different committees in entertaining. This forenoon was spent by the geologists, who very early in the morning crossed the Restigouche river in gasoline boats and examined the upper Devonian beds and volcanic intrusives of Dalhousie.

On their return to Dalhousie automobiles and carriages were in waiting and the eighty members were conveyed to Stewart's Point near the Inch Arran Hotel to examine the Devonian beds and volcanic intrusives of Dalhousie. Several geologists stated that the formation at this point was perhaps the most interesting that they had ever seen, the different periods being easily distinguishable, being well defined and fossils and specimens easily obtainable. One of the party discovered on the beach a particularly fine specimen which elicited several remarks from his fellow geologists.

During the stay of the distinguished guests in this quaint little town they were favored with favorable weather and the flying of bunting from the residences and stores of leading citizens and from the vessels in the harbor, including the magnificent steam yacht Glencairn owned by Mr. James Ross, of Montreal, gave the place a regular holiday appearance and made a splendid impression upon the strangers.

Seventeen nations of the world are represented upon the geologists forming part of this excursion, which is to tour the maritime provinces. Every country in Europe is represented but one. There are also representatives of the United States, Mexico, Japan, China, etc. At noon the special train of eight cars left for Bathurst.

CANADIAN PILGRIMS RECEIVED BY POPE

Rome, July 23.—A group of Canadian pilgrims were received in private audience today by the Pope. They were conducted by Right Rev. Michael F. Fallon, Bishop of London, Ontario, who presented Peter's Pence amounting to \$2,000. Bishop Fallon delivered an address expressing the loyalty of Canadian Catholics to the Holy See. The Pope then imparted the apostolic benediction. The pilgrims afterwards visited Cardinal Merry Del Val, papal secretary of state.

THE TAXES

The lieges will soon be receiving a billet doux which at best is not very welcome to many. The tax notices are now being issued which call for an assessment of \$1.50 per cent. This is five cents higher than last year, yet is not exorbitant compared with other towns round about. Chatham has a rate of \$2.50 per cent with \$6.50 of a poll tax while Newcastle is something over \$3.00. So we may take heart of grace and hope that sometime in the near future the rate will start to come down instead of ascend.

There is only one little point which might be better arranged. The date of the public notice with regard to the discount of 5 per cent is given as July 22nd which means that the first of August is the last day for paying the taxes in order to receive this benefit. As the whole of the notices have not yet been delivered and in all probability will not be in all of the ratepayers hands for a few days yet, the ten days grace ought to date from the day the notice is delivered. This could be done by having a batch of notices or all of them for that matter, being stamped for a certain date and delivered on or before that date. This would give the people the full ten days grace and allow those who pay heavy taxes time to make preparation. As it is the people not having received notices are called on to pay within 10 days an assessment the amount of which they do not know unless they call at the treasurer's office.

Further it would be more satisfactory to employ three or four people to distribute the tax notices which could be done by them in one day, than to have them delivered as at present by the constables and chief of police, who can not spare all the time that is required for this service.

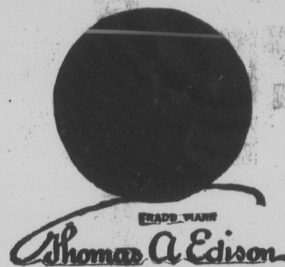

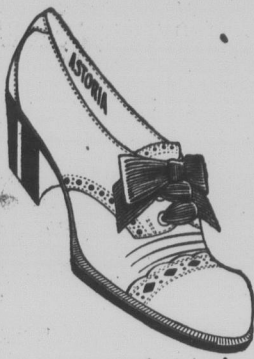

BLINDED IN BATTLE

France Provides for a German Who Fought in Morocco

A German who was for years a member of the French Foreign Legion, and who lost the sight of both eyes when fighting in Morocco, has been provided for for the rest of his life by the French Government, in somewhat peculiar circumstances.

When the man, whose name is Harberth, received his wound in Morocco he was sent back to France and was decorated with the Legion of Honor. A bullet had passed across his face blinding both eyes. His case became known in Germany, and an effort was made to induce him to leave France and to return to his own country, to be used in an agitation against the French Foreign Legion.

Harberth was offered a sum of \$10,000 if he consented. As he was very poor and blind, this offer was very tempting. But he declined the offer. As a reward, the French Government gave him a concession for a tobacco store, which will ensure him an easy livelihood for the rest of his days.

Fought 2,000 Years Ago

There was discovered, near the port of Talmone in Italy a large ossuary, or place for the deposit of the bones of the dead.

The discovery is one on the scene of the battle of Talmone, fought in the year 216 B.C., during the invasion of Italy by the Gauls, when the invading hordes were defeated by the Romans.

The ruins of a Temple of Thanksgiving, erected by the Romans in memory of this victory, were unearthed in 1898.
