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PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

FRIDAY, April 29.
Mr. Hanington moved the House into committee on a bill to incorporate the St. John Bridge and Railway Extension Co. Mr. Whiten in the chair.
The mover described the vast expense and labor attending the transshipment of perishable goods at St. John; though it was a great mistake to suppose that the trade and commerce of St. John would be injured. With the advantage in favor of St. John, of being a hundred miles further west than Halifax, the merchants of St. John need not fear competition. He claimed that the commercial prosperity of St. John could be greatly aided by taking advantage of the increased facilities proposed. The raising of surplus produce would be greatly encouraged by lessening in time and distance between the points of shipment and markets in the west. The only objection, that the limit should be reduced to \$125,000, that debentures might stand higher in the market, to provide sinking fund and enable them in five years to call in the debentures.
Mr. Ellis stated that he understood that the whole property was to pass into the hands of the Dominion Government and he did not see that there would then be anything that the debenture holders could proceed against or secure except by permission of the Government of Canada. He claimed that the bridge would be no more to the city than the railway, and \$400,000 granted for railway remains on the west side would remain for ever a tax on the people and bring in no return. By the original bill the debenture holders were to have the first lien on the property. After further discussion the bill was agreed to.

MONDAY, April 23.
Mr. Barthele brought up his motion for returns in correspondence on riparian rights since 1880.
Hon. Mr. Blair said he was not aware that there had been any correspondence.
Mr. Barthele delivered a vigorous speech, accusing the late Local Government of playing into the hands of the Dominion, claiming that the falling off in the North Shore salmon catch was due to the river being leased to sportsmen for purpose of amusement when sportsmen are closed to net fishermen. He thought the Dominion Government should refund to the Provincial Government the proceeds of license issued. In consequence of the statement of the Attorney General he said he would not press the resolution.
