A great strike of miners, iron workers and others prevails in the Petrikan district of Poland and serious riots have occurred. In the fights that have occurred sixteen strikers have been killed and a large number wounded. The soldiers have been obliged to fire into the mobs repeatedly. The prison at Sosnowica is filled with rioters.

The Czarewitch's Wedding.

BERLIN, April 24.-Emperor William promised the Czarewitch that he would be present at his marriage to Princess Alice of Hesse, which will be celebrated in the palace at Peterhof, near St. Petersburg. The announced date of marriage, Aug. 3, is premature, as the celebration of the ceremony depends entirely upon the condition of the Grand Duke George, the next younger brother of the Czarewitch, who is now ill. Grand Duke George insists upon taking part in the wedding festivities and the date of marriage may on that account be changed.

Attempt to Blow Up a Labor Leader-Lucky Accident.

The explosives were concealed between the sides of a folded pamphlet, while a match and piece of sandpaper were so arranged that the drawing of the wrapper would ignite the match. The string to which the match was attached broke when the package was opened, and there was no explosion. It bears no postmark. The package was turned over to the police.

NINETY THOUSAND DOLLARS.

The Amount to be Saved to the Country

by the Fees Bill, The Globe, referring to Hon. G. W. Ross'

bill to reduce fees, says: "He explained the clauses of the bill, showing that by it division court clerks should retain all the fees accruing from their effice up to \$1,000, porportions varying from 10 to 50 per cent of the excess being taken for the Provincial treasury. This, Mr. Ross explained, was a reduction from \$1,500, the former exemption, Local registrars of the high court, clerks and deputy clerks of the crown, county court clerks and surrogate registrars should retain all their fees up to \$1,500, a reduction from \$2,000, the Provincial treasury absorbing the excess in proportions varying from 10 to 50 per cent. The fees of registrars were by the bill similarly reduced, \$1,500 instead of \$2,500 being the margin, and a similar scale of appropriation for municipal purposes of the excess being provided as for the high court officials, sheriffs, county crown attorneys and clerks of the peace are to be allowed to retain all their fees up to \$2,000, a reduction from \$3,000. Mr. Ross then gave some figures as to the saving which would be effected by this change. There were 28 registrars who would be affected by the bill, and the additional amount which would be received by the municipalities would be from \$30,000 to \$35,000. From sheriffs and other officers similarly treated there would be a saving of nearly \$50,000, and from the division court clerks a saving of some \$6,000 or \$7,000, so that in all a very considerable saving would be

Bloodshed!

The Coxey Movement Attended by Serious Consequences.

A Train-Stealing Contingent Overtaken By U. S. Marshals.

Shots Exchanged and Several Persons Injured-The United States Military Authorities Take Action.

BILLINGS, Montana, April 25 .- The first bloodshed resulting from the clashes between the law and the industrial army movement was witnessed here to-day. About 11 o'clock this morning the announcement was made that the train-stealing contingent of the Coxey army was rushing into the city on a Northern Pacific train from the west at a high rate of speed, closely followed by a train load of United States deputy marshals. This was verified a few minutes before noon when the train of box cars ran into town.

The Coxevites were overtaken by a special train of marshals just as they entered the limits of the city. After their arrival the marshals' train evertook the Hogan contingent just as they were pulling away from Columbus, and attempted to arrest the progress of the train, but the leaders would not yield to the demands of the marshals, and instructed their men to go ahead. The two trains came on until presents. this city was reached, when a stop was ordered, the conflict between the two bodies resulting.

SHOTS EXCHANGED. As near as can be learned Marshal Mc-Dermott ordered the leaders of the captured train to surrender, and when they refused to do so a few of the marshals, before receiving command to do so, fired upon the crowd of industrials. The shots were quickly returned. A number of shots were exchanged before Marshal McDermott could regain control of his men. During the firing one of the deputies was seriously wounded, and one of the men on the rear platform car was shot in the groin.

TOO MANY FOR THE MARSHALS. McDermott decided that his men were not equal to the odds against them, and ordered his men to cease firing, which they did. The captured train soon after pulled out, and McDermott notified the authorities that his force was inadequate to capture the 500 men, who were determined to retain possession of the train.



Jug-Handled Justice.

The Ottawa Free Press Incurs the Formal Censure of the House.

But the Libelers of Liberal Leaders Go Unrebuked.

Mir C. H. Tupper in the Role of Davy Crockett's Coon-Debate on the School Question Resumed.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.) OTTAWA, April 25 .- On the opening of the House this afternoon an unusual and interesting subject was brought to the attention of the House by the First Minister. On Monday in discussing Mr. Charlton's speech, in which he argued that the Government was not sincerely desirous as they assert of obtaining a treaty of reciprocity with the United States, Mr. Kenny used the argument in reply that Mr. Laurier and Sir Richard Cartwright were annexationists, even going so far as o hold Mr. Laurier responsible for Senator Sherman's speech in favor of extending the sway of the Stars and Stripes northward to the Arctic Sea. This attempt to stigmatize members of the House as disloval and false to their oath of office was clearly out of order, but Mr. Speaker did not stop Mr. Kenny, and so Dr. Landerkin, in replying to Mr. Wallace, retorted by asserting that Mr. Wallace had uttered disloyal sentiments in the House, and that Mr. Kenny had made a speech defending Mr. Wallace's utterances. The Speaker called Dr. Landerkin to order, and although the doctor protested, prevented him from continuing his remarks. Sir Richard Cartwright then said that the ruling was unfair and that different treatment was meted out to the Opposition than to the Ministerialists. Mr. Mulock also protested and talked about appealing against the Speaker to the House. The matter went no further. Next day the Ottawa Free Press came out with an article characterizing Mr. Speaker's conduct as "partisan." The article also declared that Mr. White was a subservient presiding officer.

To-day Sir John Thompson directed attention to the article and made a long speech. He referred to the occasion described above, and held that Mr. Speaker was right in his ruling. But aside from that point, it was forbidden to assail the motives of the Speaker, or attribute to him anything but strict impartiality in the chair. Otherwise the chair would lose that implicit respect necessary for the preservation of order. Mr. Speaker was not infallible, and to err was human; but if they thought the Speaker wrong they had a right to appeal to the House and decide the question themseives. He described the language in the article as diabolical when applied to the head of the House, who could not defend himself consistently with

his dignity and position. The article having been read at the table, Sir John Thompson moved: "That the article published in the Ottawa Free Press on April 24, and read at the table, is a scandalous, false and malicious libel upon | papers was carried. the honor, character and integrity of the

Speaker of this House, and in contempt o the privileges and constitutional authority of the House." This was seconded by Sir Adoinhe Caron.

He was not ready to subscribe, however, to the whole of the resolution. Part of the article had been given as an illustration of the partisanship of Mr. Speaker-the fact that he had attended a Conservative meeting the other day at Pembroke to nominate a candidate for the Legislature and made a speech. In this connection the article called Mr. White a "Tory heeler." Mr. Laurier said that this was a reference not to Mr. White as Speaker, but to Peter White as a private member of the Conservative party attending a Conservative meeting, and the resolution could not therefore apply to that portion of the article. He believed that the House would not have had to listen to such a motion if in the past it had taken more care of its own dignity. He quoted several occasions where offenders had been

whitewashed by the majority of the House. The Hon. 





THE SINGLE TAX.

The Interesting Debate at Labor Hall Continued

By Messis, Ashplant, Johnston and Others, Pro and Con-Some Ideas Worth Thinking About,

The single tax debate at Labor Hall was continued before a large audience last night. Messrs. John Johnston and H. Ashplant again entered the lists as the respective champions of single tax and antisingle tax.

Mr. Johnston resumed his line of argu-

ment towards the conclusion that single tax was not only the best method of taxation but the remedy for social poverty. The application of the system, he said, would cause property owners to either throw their vacant land, held for speculation, into the market or to build houses on it. The throwing of so much land on the market would lower its price and thus lower rents, and then small purchasers of land would reap the advantage. This would cheapen the laborer's cost of living. The capitalist, knowing this, would seek to cut his empleyes' wages down. There were only two ways for the laborer to prevent the reduction and keep the "vantage of cheaper living. They were by sending members to Parliament willing to legislate in his interest, and by trade unions - by combining and compelling the capitalist to maintain the wage standard. Mr. Johnston condemned the present apprentice system. Apprentices did onefourth of the work of the country, which legitimate workmen should do. 

The Production Shows a Decrease-The Respective Output.


OTTAWA, April 26.-The value of the mineral production of Canada in 1893 was \$19,250,000, or \$250,000 less than that of 1892. Nickel heads the list of metals produced, the output having been 3,992,982 tons, valued at \$2,076,351. The value of gold was \$927,244; copper, \$875,864; silver, \$321,423. Three million seven hundred tons of coal were raised, valued at \$8,422 .-259. The producion quantity of iron ore mined is placed at 124,702 tons, valued at \$298,018. Of this quantity 124,053 tons were converted into pig iron, producing 500,947 tons, valued at the furnaces at \$790,283. The production of petroleum is placed at 798,406 barrels, valued at \$834,-334.

AN OBJECTIONABLE MEASURE.

Busines Men Protest Against the Insolvency Bill.

Deputations at Ottawa-London Represented-Resolution Drafted.

[Special to the ADVERTISER.] OTTAWA, Ont., April 26 .- The Senate committee on insolvency met this morning and elected Mr. Bowell chairman. Delegations from the Boards of Trade in Toronto, Montreal, Quebec and Ottawa were present. The matter was threshed out by selected speakers. Hugh Blain and D. E. Thompson, Toronto, are largely responsible for the draft bill, and their remarks were therefore not so critical as those of others. Judge Irvine, Quebec, remarked that if a decision was arrived at that the bill should be proceeded with they could then discuss details. Mr. Bowell said the bill would be pushed through the Senate. Mr. Irvine objected strongly to the official receivers named in the bill and thought a Government efficial would be preferable, though still objectionable. He did not want a

whole estate eaten up by expenses. Mr. H. A. Walker, of Canadian Bank of Commerce, president of the Canadian Bankers' Association, explained the views of the Bankers' Association. It was desirable that creditors should appoint their own liquidator at the earliest possible moment. They differed with merchants in holding that the official receiver should have duties to perform. Manufacturing concerns might need to be carried on, and there should be some provision for the receiver exercising some discretion without going to the courts. They objected to the minimum of 33 cents as a basis of composition. The dishonest creditor would never pay more. Some bankers were strong against allowing any composition at all. Trading companies should be included in the bill and not permit of small joint stock companies being wound up under the Winding-up Act. He warned them not to pass a law which would encourage insolvency and fraud and crime. Bankers would like to have a public officer whose duty it would be to approve of every discharge, and that he should be paid by levying a

mall tax on every bankrupt estate. Senator Smith-What value would you place on securities of bankrupts held by a Mr. Walker-We do not quarrel with these provisions of the bill. He also op-

posed placing farmers and graziers on different footing in the bill from others. He opposed applying the act at all to farmers because it would destroy their free borrowing power. George Hague, general manager of the Bank of Montreal, said that the provisions that a majority of creditors and three-

fourths in value should control, and that 33 cents should be the minimum of composition and provisions for discharge, comprised the whole bill. All the rest were details. He contended they should make discharge difficult and make insolvents pay for it. The delegates from the Board of Trade met together and adopted the following resolution: "That no insolvency legis-

lation will be acceptable that does not

substantially secure to creditors the right to say who shall be liquidator or assignee of estate in all cases. The London Board of Trade was represented by John Bland, president, and Geo. C. Gibbons, Q.C. The committee adjourned till to-morrow. E. B. Greenshields, Geo. Sumner, James Johnstone, Jas. A. Cantlie. C. A. Small, S. O. Shorr and Wm. 



Sumner, Hutcheson, Grieve, McDougal and Laidlaw, who represented the very strong section of the audience favorable to Patron principles generally, but opposed to any attempt to overthrow the Mowat Administration. Then someone in the audience threw a bombshell into the camp, for he asked Mr. Shore to then and there set at rest the question whether or not the candidate was a member of the P. P. A. organization. Mr. Shore hemmed and hawed, but declined to answer, and the audience ng an advertisement; style and emphasis reached the conclusion that he is allied with it. The meeting closed with cheers for the Queen and for Sir Oliver.
