FATAL STRIKE RIOTS AT BUCKINGHAM, P. Q.; TWO DEAD; SEVERAL MORTALLY INJURED

Detectives Fire Point Blank Into Charging Mob Killing Two of the Leaders-Militia With Machine Guns Rushed from the Capital.

Buckingham, Que., Oct. 8.-A terrible tween 200 former employes of the James Maclaren Company's mill and 22 policemen, who were guarding a band of 17 strikebreakers. 





SUCCEEDS WELL

Imperial Commission Appointed to Investigate Reports on Settlements.

report of the commissioners appointed to carry out a scneme of colonization in Canada of crofters from Scotland has been presented to the Imperial Parliament. The commission was appointed in 1888. Funds were furnished by the Imperial Parliament. Two parties were sent out, 30 families of 183 persons, to Killarney, Man., in 1888, and 49 families, of 282 persons, to Saltcoats, Sask., in 1889. The total number of farms in Killarney included in the settlement scheme is 56 and in Saltcoats 72. The report says: "In the early years of the settlement in Killarney the sums advanced were not repaid in accordance with the agreements entered into by the settlers. Difficulties occurred, arising from inexperience on the part of the crufters and their want of knowledge of agriculture, and of the climate of the country. These difficulties passed away, and the settlers became more contented and prosperous and they have repaid the entire bal-"And now," said the young man who ance remaining to their debt. The

The majority of the Saltcoats settlers have been able to make comfortable homes for themselves and their families in other parts of the country. 




