GERMAN CABINET ASKS RUSSIAN GOVT. NOT TO SEND BOLSHEVIK DELEGATES TO BERLIN MEETING

Invitation Was Given to the Russian Representatives by the Executive Committee of Soldiers' and Workmen's Council, But Cabinet Objects.

Berlin, Monday, Dec. 9.-The German cabinet has sent a wireless message to the Russian Government, asking it not to send a delegation to Berlin for a conference planned for December 16. The reason given was "the present situation in Germany."

The Russian Boishevik delegates were invited by the executive committee of the Soldlers' and Workmen's Council against the wishes of the cabinet. The opposition of the cabinet has been strengthened, beyond doubt, by accusations made by Adolph Joffe, the Bolshevist ambassador to Germany, who has made a statement, saying that Ministers Haase, Barth and others were friendly toward him and actively seconded his plan to introduce Russian methods into Germany. In spite of their denials, M. Joffe's accusations have created a painful impression in many quarters.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Dec. 11.—Plans for the lation of Canada's permanent ill be undertaken al permanent force as distinct from the militia of about 3,000 men. After the war a permanent force of 8,000 is planned, the force to be distributed at various points of the Dominion to assist the civil power. The permanent force will, of course, be formed of volunteers who will join up for a stipulated period. It is anticipated that little trouble will be encountered in securing the full complement required from the returning men.

Already the depleted ranks of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police are being filled by returned men, most of those now joining up having been in the police when war broke out. The force will be brought up to strength.



Great Quantities of Goods Are Needed in Devastated Areas.

CANADA HAS SUPPLIES

Government May Be Required To Advance Certain Credits.

London, Dec. 11.—(Special Cable from John W. Dafoe).—The largest immediate opening for Canadian trade and industry is in relation to the reconstruction of devastated areas in Belgium, France and Serbla. This is in the general charge of the committee internationale de revitaillement, which is a reconstitution of the international war purchasing committee. Canada is to be represented on this by Lloyd Harris.

A preliminary survey shows that for Belgium and France there will be urgent need for large quantities of these goods: outer garments, all kinds of cheap, durable material, denim or duck, boots and shoes, stoves to burn soft coal, simple cooking utensils, cheap household furniture, especially iron beds and readymade houses, knocked-down. Apart from clothing, a part of which can be supplied by Great Britain, these supplies can only be obtained in available time from Canada and the United States.

To Advance Credits.

The reconstruction committee will have to determine the extent of supplies needed and finance their purchase wherever they can be obtained, arrange for the shipping and provide for their distribution. The methods are not worked out, but it is expected that whatever proportion of what total supplies is allotted to Canada will be purchased on the order of the international commission by the Canadian war trade board, through the war purchasing commission.

It will be necessary for the Canadian Government to advance the credits to cover a proportion of these purchases, perhaps 50 per cent.
