Fast and Well Armed

The Bristols, upon which the Canadian cruisers will be modelled, are the most recent type of scout adopted by the admiralty. They displace 4,800 tons, and have a speed of 25 knots an hour, to provide which turbine engines develop 22,-000 horsepower. They are armed with two six-inch and ten four-inch quick-firers, as well as smaller weapons.

The destroyers are small and very speedy crafts, intended to war against torpedo boats. They also carry torpedoes, to be used if opportunity serves in attacking larger craft.

Premier Whitney's Reply to the Delegation Which Asked for Sunday Cars.

MATTER IS STILL OPEN





CANADA'S NEW NAVY.

The naval plans of the Dominion Government, formulated at the imperlal desence conference, are now before the public.

Briefly, the Government is committed to a capital outlay for warships 543,000,000 bushels, or 6.34 per head. of \$7,255,500—not \$22,000,000, as the country has been told by opponents of the project.

The annual cost of the proposed service will be \$1.538,000, which will cover interest and depreciation, maintenance, and personnel. In addition there will be the maintenance of dockvards at Halifax and Esquimault, and a wireless telegraph service, which will bring the total annual outlay up to nearly

These plans provide for two cruisers of the Bristol class on the Pacific coast and one Bristol cruiser and four deplement of 1.408 officers and men. Pending the completion of these ships Canada may borrow two cruisers from Great Britain for the training of the new naval personnel. These would be manned from the royal navy until qualified Canadian officers and men







Wardens, Inspectors, Chaplains Not Bothered Over the Retaliatory Will Discuss Betterment of Inmates.

Ottawa, Nov. 17. - Mr. F. D. Monk today asked for the appointment of a inquiring into the question of propor-

tionate representation. called for "a judicious classification and segregation of the convicts in our penal institutions and reformatories.' Mr. Monk declared that it had been proved by experience and testimony that the placing together of all classes of convicts in our penal institutions was highly detrimental to the improvement and reclamation of the younger offenders; and asserted that classification and segregation of convicts undergoing punishment had been profuctive of most beneficial results. He asked for the appointment of a special commission to obtain reports upon the

subjects from wardens and inspectors. Replying, the Minister of Justice said that hardened criminals were those they mostly had to deal with in the six Dominion penitentiaries. The younger and newer offenders were sent to jail, reformatories and provincial prisons. There, more than in the penitentiaries, would be room for better method. From the point of view of segregation it was not supposed that there should be any communication between convicts in the penitentiaries. He pointed out that the juvenile offenders act, which was passed last year, had been only put into force in one place in Canada, namely, in Winnipeg, while they were enjoying the enefits of this measure. He thought the best way was to have a meeting of wardens and inspectors from the penitentiaries at which they could have an be probably better than a commission could obtain.

The convolvulus did well in the house. The cornflower, mignonette, stocks, Virginia stocks nasturtium, sweet peas, verbenas and geraniums are good. 


