Fruit dealers who make a practice of GOVERNMENT NITRATE their stores no longer may do so unless they wish to receive a summons to grace the witness stand in the police court. Even now they may not place their baskets of fruit in the way of pedestrians, but this latest order, which was passed by the board of health and Major Portion of Damage Was which the police intend to enforce to the limit, prohibits the fruits in any way.

Sometimes a person who has a tubercular throat, may expectorate on the street, and if the fruit is nearby it may be polluted.

BEING LAUNCHED FOR **GOVERNMENT LINES**

C. N. R. Officials Visit Halifax To In vestigate Shipping Possibilities.

Hallfax, Sept. 16.-C. A. Hayes, vice president, in charge of traffic Canadian National Railways; D. O. Wood, traffic manager, export and import department, Canadian National Railways; A. T. 





OVER 1,500 VOTERS DISFRANCHISED FOR NOT APPEARING AT **HEARING OF APPEAL**

Many Unable To Do So in Work Hours.

UNNECESSARY TROUBLES

Great Inconvenience Caused by Present Method of Preparing Lists.

More than 1.500 London voters have been disfranchised because of their inability to appear before the court of revision which has been in session since September 2.

This fact has caused further indig-nation against the expensive and un-satisfactory way which the Government chose: for compiling the voters' lists. Only by exercising the utmost vigilance was it possible to make sure that one Only by exercising the utmost vigilance was it possible to make sure that one was permitted to exercise his lawful rights. The list compiled by the enumerators could not be regarded as complete, but had to be examined by each voter to make certain that his name had been included.

Lots of Trouble.

Lots of Trouble.

If the name were not entered it was necessary for him to make an appeal. This was trouble enough in itself, but in order to insure his name being recorded he had to make a personal appearance before a court of revision or make arrangements for an attorney to appear for him.

According to the official figures re-According to the official figures re-lating to the sittings of the court, given out today, it was impossible for 794 voters in wards one and two; 719 vot-ers in wards three and four, and 16 voters in the annex district, to make such an appearance, although they had appealed to have their names placed on the list.

As the sessions of the court were held during the working hours of the day it is pointed out that it was impossible for many voters to get away from work to attend.

DETROIT IS ALMOST DRY, DECLARES HEAD OF POLICE FORCE

Commissioner Inches Declares His "Clean Up" Campaign Has Been Successful.

WRECKING IS EFFECTIVE

Drastic Methods of Police Have Wiped Out "Blind Pigs."

Detroit, Sept. 16.—"Detroit is as dry as a desert today as compared with what it was one month ago," said Dr. James W. Inches, police commissioner, James W. Inches, police commissioner, Monday afternoon, in summing up the results of his clean-up campaign.

"Of course liquor is still being sold. But whereas a month ago you could get it anywhere by simply purchasing it openly, now you must be known and trusted by everyone in the place. You must get it secretly, and only through underground channels. In other words, the situation has changed from one of open deflance and violation of the law to one of underground smuggling. of underground smuggling. Wrecking Most Effective.

Wrecking Most Effective.

"We do not like the system of wrecking and confiscating bars, and we have employed it only where the law violation was open and defiant. But there is nothing else in the world that could have cleaned up the situation. Fines, arrests and booze confiscations were absolutely ineffective to curb the traffic. Now our clean-up squad reports that only the wise and careful ones are able to get liquor. We are going to con-tinue the wrecking system wherever we find the law openly violated." find the law openly violated."

'AUTHORIZED' DENIAL NOT END OF AFFAIR, SAYS BRITISH PRESS

London Newspapers Express British, American and French **Opinion That Explanations** Imperatively Needed.

POST CRITICIZES BOTH

American Attache to the Peace Conference.

London, Sept. 16.—An "authorized" denial of statements made by William C. Bullett, formerly attached to the American peace delegation, before the foreign relations committee of the United States, which is printed in the London newspapers this morning, is attracting more notice here than Mr. Bullitt's evidence before the committee. "Somebdy is lying—who is it?" summarizes the widely expressed comment, and the opinion is general that explanations are imperatively needed. tions are imperatively needed. London morning papers express in helr editorials views which are colored their political predilections, some riticising what they regard as Mr. allitt's "breach of confidence.

Bullitt's "breach of confidence."

The Chronicle, a strong champion of Premier Lloyd George, says that Mr. Bullitt's evidence was directed against President Wilson, Secretary of State Lansing and Col. E. M. House.

"He does not possess the least sense of honor or responsibility," the newspaper says. "and the British cannot be expected to prefer the word of such an accuser to that of the premier."

Post Scores Both.

The Post, in a satirical editorial bearing the caption "The Explosive Bullit," scores both Premier Lloyd George and Mr. Bullitt. Regarding the latter, it Mr. Bullitt. Regarding the latter, it

says:
"President Wilson seems to have picked the wrong person when he took this explosive journalist into the employ of the American peace mission. A journalist who is treated in this way has no business to explode. It is against the first laws of the game." The Post also expresses the opinion that if the Senate indorses Mr. Bullitt's statements regarding the secretary's views, "It will be all over with the treaty, as far as the United States is concerned".

The Daily News maintains the officia denial does not dispose of Mr. Bullitt's assertions, and urges a suspension of judgment until the implication contained in it are put beyond a reasonable doubt." Declaring the denial itself "untrue" and worthless, the Herald, the Labor organ, claims to be able to confirm Mr.

Bullitt's statements. Some newspapers raise the question as to who authorized the denial, as neither Premier Lloyd George nor his secretary, Philip Kerr, attaches his name to it, and, according to Paris
