## St. Agnes' School

## Fide et Amore

HIS School was founded that there might be a place, easily accessible to the people of Eastern Ontario, where girls could have a thorough education and a happy home life surrounded by refining influences, and where they could be trained morally, physically, and intellectually.

As the cost of living in Belleville is less than in Toronto it has been possible to make the fees more moderate than those of Toronto Schools, and there are, comparatively speaking, no outside expenses.

Miss Carroll, the Lady Principal, has had much experience in work of this kind, having been for many years Senior Mistress in the Bishop Strachan School and other Toronto schools.

The place chosen could not be more appropriate—a handsome and well-built building, situated upon the prettiest street in Belleville, and surrounded by beautiful grounds two and a half acres in extent.

To the original building a large three-storey addition has been made, which contains the chapel, art-room, dining-room, room for domestic science, infirmary, and sleeping apartments.

The rooms are large and well-ventilated, the class-rooms bright and airy.

Both gas and electric light are used in the lighting. The house is heated by hot water.

The recreation grounds are extensive: tennis, basket-ball, croquet, swings, all have their place, and out-door exercise is encouraged as much as possible.

There is a picturesque artificial lake in the grounds, shown in the picture.

There is also a fine orchard, a vegetable garden, and a poultry yard, thus combining the advantages of country with city life.

The work done during the year has been very satisfactory, and a decided improvement in the pupils is noticeable.

Universal satisfaction has been expressed by their parents.

It is our wish to create in them a love for their work, and to arouse an interest in learning which will not pass away with their school days.

A series of recitals have been given by the pupils of the musical staff, and they have been enjoyable as well as most helpful in overcoming the nervousness and self-consciousness of the pupils.

An excellent course of University Extension Lectures was held at the School during the winter, and more recently a most interesting and instructive course upon Practical Home Nursing.

Dr. Fisher personally conducted the first Conservatory Examinations held here, and expressed himself as being much pleased with the work done.

There were twenty-three Piano, four Violin, and thirteen Theory Examinations, showing the thorough appreciation of St. Agnes' School as a centre.



#### The School Terms

The School year is divided into four terms:—

Michaelmas Term begins on Thursday, September 8th.

Christmas " " November 14th.

Lent " February 8th.

Trinity " April 21st.

The Christmas Vacation is from December 22nd to January 9th.

The Easter Vacation lasts for ten days.

## The Course of Instruction

The course begins with the Primary Department and goes through all the grades to Matriculation, with Honors.

Arrangements will be made for those wishing to take special courses in Music or Art, but every pupil is expected to take part of the regular course.

Religious Instruction forms part of the course throughout, and consists of two lessons a week, given by the Chaplain, the Rev. G. R. Beamish, and one, upon Old Testament History, by the Rev. W. B. Heeney.

Pupils of all denominations are received, and at the special request of the parents or guardians may be excused from the doctrinal part of the teaching.

Form I.—Reading, Writing, Spelling, Church Catechism and Bible Stories, Arithmetic, Nature-Studies and Object-Lessons.

Form II.—Same as Form I, with Drawing and Needlework.


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VIEW FROM THE EAST.

Form III.—Reading, Writing, Spelling, Church Catechism, Scripture and Canadian History, English Grammar, English History, English Composition, English Literature, Arithmetic, Geography, Drawing, Needlework.

Form IV.—Same as Form III, with Latin and English History.

Form V.—Reading, Writing, Dictation, Religious Instruction, English Grammar and Rhetoric, English Literature, Composition, English and Roman History, Euclid, Algebra, Arithmetic and Latin.

Form VI.--A continuation of the work in Form V, and prepares for Matriculation, with Honors, if required.

N.B.—By special request a Kindergarten Class is to be formed.

A discount of ten per cent. upon the fees for board and class tuition is allowed for Sisters, and a discount of twenty per cent. for the daughters of clergymen.


Half a term's notice is required for the removal of a pupil, or half a term's fees will be charged.

VISITING DAY:—Saturday, from 11 a.m. to 9.30 p.m. Invitations to be given on Wednesdays or by note.







