

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



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THE OUTLOOK.

Labor trouble is at present the all important topic in building circles. Although a number of strikes were declared throughout the country, they have in most cases been settled. What promises to be the most serious tie-up-if it comes to that-is the probable strike of the plumbers in Toronto. The employers have definitely stated that they will grant no increases and will sign no agreement with the Union, believing that with the 300 independent workmen at present in the city and the large quantity of immigrant labor available, they can hold out against the demands of organized labor.

The plasterers at Winnipeg are on strike and the carpenters will probably make their demands on June 1st, when their agreement expires. However, labor conditions in that city are not as bad as they might be and it is thought satisfactory arrangements will be made with all the trades.

The strike of the bricklayers and stonecutters at Ottawa is now in its third week and prospects for an immediate settlement are not very

promising. The stone supply firms have closed down their shops and refuse to deliver stone as long as the strike is on. It has been intimated that the brick manufacturers will follow the example of the stone supply firms and refuse to deliver till an agreement between the employers and the men is reached.

The building statistics of the different cities for April have been issued and show the effect of the late spring and in some cases labor

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disturbances. Especially is this noticeable in Western Canada, but it is fully expected, now that the warmer weather is approaching, that construction work will go along with a rush. Such is the opinions of the architects, who have



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
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A wonderful increase in building is apparent in Toronto, where for the month of April the 607 permits issued amounted to \$2,044,870, against 498, valued at \$1,427,930, for the same month last year. For the first four months of this year the permits issued total \$5,116,701, as compared with \$3,346,168 for the same period of 1906.

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Hamilton is also experiencing the largest building boom in its history. The month of April saw \$378,050 worth of building authorized, against \$111,075 for the same month last year. The total amount this year up to April 30th is \$1,-

257,310, while the figures for the whole of last year, which was considered a very good one, were only \$1,984,690.

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No. 2 at \$4.25, with indications that the price will drop still lower. This decrease is somewhat due to the large supply of spruce lath which threatens to displace pine to a considerable extent. The price of lumber in the West is very likely to take another advance. The advances which are reported will be made shortly are: Dimension timber and boards, \$2 per thousand, and ship-lap \$1 to \$2 per thousand.

The scarcity of iron pipe in Toronto continues and during the pastweek several houses have made advances of two per cent. Owing to the recent bad weather brick manufacturers at Hamilton have been unable to replenish their stocks and a shortage of this material will likely be experienced. It is not expected that prices will rise to any extent owing to arrangements which are being made with outside dealers.

At Toronto Junction the brick manufacturers have recently suffered a serious loss, several days' output having been destroyed by the cold weather. One manufacturer estimated that 40,000 brick in his yard had been rendered useless.

In Toronto the brick industry is very brisk. The demand is excellent for all classes of the material and some manufacturers have been forced to make additions to their plant. Prices are firm and remain about the same as they were this time last year.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
