Naturalized Germans, as well as those who retain the allegiance of their birth are included in the general cloud of suspicion.

derstanding among themselves, they are remaining away from Westminister during the war sessions. None of them has yet resigned. A few days ago several newspapers started an agitation to have all male Germans and Austrians confined in concentration camps, and a general round up was under way. "A general cabinet meeting will be called to pass an order-in-council to secure the closing of all places where intoxicating liquors is retailed at 7 o'clock p.m.; to prevent the sale of liquor in social clubs after that hour and to close all wholesale places at 6 p.m. These measures are expected to be aided by the license holders agreeing to close at the hours stated, in the absence of a law to that effect. At the next session of the egislature, a bill will be introduced amending the license act to permit the governor-in-council in times of stress or nacesisty to vary the hours during which liquor may be sold and to give municipalities the right to regulate by popular vote the number of licenses to be granted."



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may he made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A labitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good tanding may pre-empt a quarter-section long-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead pat-ant; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to re-luction in case of rough, scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.




