Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

ADVICE TO TOURISTS When a motor car owner starts on a long tour he has so many things to look after that it is probably natural for him to forget some of the things which in the end are most im-

"No doubt the most trouble with batteries in touring is caused by ov-erheating. This may be due to lack of water in the cells or using the starter and lights too little to offset the continual charging.
"Before starting on a long trip,

car owner should have his batter ies tested to see that the specific gravity is up to the proper point and then he should see that every cell is filled with pure distilled water. If the use to which the car is put is far above normal, the battery may be likened to a man who eats heartily but gets little exercise. Illness follows and if the condition continues battery apoplexy is sure to result. An overfed battery heats up rapidly and if the driver does not give it sufficient exercise to balance mometer from time to time, particularly when making long runs on warm days or when doing a great deal of continuous day driving. 

Lesson VIII .- Third Quarter, For Aug. 20, 1916.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Acts xix, 29-41. Memory Verses, 29, 30-Golden Text, I Tim. vi. 10-Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

Paul is now on his third and last missionary tour. As he returned from his second tour he left at Ephesus his two fellow workers, Priscilla and Aquila, whom he had brought with him from Corinth. He then proceeded to Jerusalem and thence to Antioch, where he remained for some time before starting on this last tour (xviii, 18-23). We cannot think of him tarrying anywhere without seizing every opportunity to speak of Jesus Christ and His sufferings and glory Having passed through Galatia and Phrygia. purishing and strengthening the disiples with bread from heaven, he came again to Ephesus (xix, 1). During his absence Priscilla and Aquila had been busy at something more than tent making, for a Jew from Alexandria, eloquent and mighty in the Scriptures, had come to Ephesus, and because of the fire that was in him he spoke boldly in the synagogue and taught diligently the things of the Lord, but he did not know of the baptism of the Holy Spirit. These two faithful ones expounded the Scriptures more fully to him concerning some things, and then he felt led to go to Corinth and was commended to the disciples there, whom he was able to ROYAL CONNAVGHT help much, and he mightily convinced the Jews, from the Scriptures, that Jesus is the Christ (xviii, 24-28). There is many a Priscilla who is qualified to instruct more fully many an Apollos, but the latter are not always as teachable as this one seems to have been. The crown of glory is a special reward for those who feed others with living bread, and it is not eloquence that is needed, but just a willingness to receive the message from the Lord and

deliver it in His name, as the disciples received the bread from the Lord's hands when the 5,000 were fed and passed on to the people what they received from Him. They neither made it, nor bought it, nor increased it, nor in any way improved upon it, but were simply channels or messengers between Him and the people. Our Lord Himself only said what His Father told Him to say, as He has told us in John xii, 49, 50, and thus He honored

His Father, and the Father wrought through Him. This gives no opportunity to show

what we know or what we can do and is therefore very humiliating to the pride of man, and many will not submit to it. But there is no other way by which we can be true messen gers of God. If the message is ours He will not assume any responsibility concerning it, but if it is His message He will see that His purpose and pleasure are accomplished by it (Isa. v. 11). When Paul came to E Apollos had gone to Corinth, and Paul began to inquire as to what the believers knew of the Holy Spirit, and, seeing their ignorance in this matter, he taught them more perfectly and became God's channel to them of the gift of the Spirit, so that they spake Every true believer is a temple of the Holy Spirit, and when any one receives the Lord Jesus the Spirit takes up His abode in that person, but there is a difference between being induct. s a difference between being indwelt by the Spirit and filled with the Spirit (John xiv, 17; I Cor. vi, 19, 20; Acts ii, 4). The Spirit abides in the believer, and we cannot pray, as David did, "Take not Thy Holy Spirit from me" (Ps. li, 11), but we may be filled and refilled as the need arises for special

For three months Paul spake in the synagogue at Ephesus, boldly disputing and persuading concerning the Lord Jesus and the kingdom of God, to be out and out 'rish. and when opposition drove him out he continued in the school of Tyrannus for two years or more until all in the province of Asia (where he was forbidden to speak on his second tour, as in xvi, 6) heard the word of the Lord Jesus. Some very special miracles were also wrought by the Lord through Paul (xix, 8-12). Wicked men tried to do wonders, even some in high religious standing, using the name of the Lord Jesus as they heard Paul do, but they fared badly indeed, while through Paul the word of God grew mightily and prevailed (xix, 13-20). Having sent Timothy and Erastus into Macedonia, where he hoped to follow them, he continued in Asia, completing three years there (xix, 21, 22; xx, 31), as we shall see in our next lesson. Why he was forbidden to go to Asia on his second journey and now permitted to

spend three years there we may perhaps learn some day. The rest of our lesson chapter is occupied with the record of the riot of the silversmiths, whose craft was suffering because of the exaltation by Paul of the Lord Jesus. Their cry in verse 27 concerning Diana, "whom all Asia and the world worshipeth," makes us think of the coming antihrist, whom all that dwell on the earth shall wor ip (Rev. xii, 8), but the kingdom shall be the Lord's (Dan. vii, 14, 27; Obad. 21). Until then we must expect that opposition to the truth will steadily increase and people give heed to lies and doctrines of demons (II Tim. iii, 1-5; iv, 3, 4; II Thess, il, 8-12). But the Lamb will overcome Rev. xvii, 14).

## THE CONTEST OF THE WEED!

Habits of Species Should Be Observed Carefully by Cultivators.

We must study weeds in order successfully combat them. A know ledge of their habits, growth an distribution is essential before muc progress can be made in their eradi-

Annuals are those which spring up and mature their seed in one season such as wild mustard. If this weed can be prevented from maturing so that no seeds will be formed it is evident that it must soon be exterminated. As the roots do not live over winter a supply of seed is necessary that it should persist.

However the seeds of many of the most noxious annuals are encased in an oily covering. This enables them to resist decay for years. They only need sunshine, rain and moisture to enable them to germinate. There are many forces at work fight-ing for the life of the weeds, each of which must be understood and overcome before victory can be attained.

Biennials require two years to complete their growth and produce seed. Of this class the burdock is an

Most of these weeds have a strong tap root growing deep into the soil. During the first year the plant stores up large quantities of starch in this root, which is utilized the second year in producing seed. Being productive from the seed only any cultivation that will prevent maturity will be effective. This, however, is not so easy as these weeds often take possession of fence corners and places where ordinary implements of tillage do not reach. The only satisfactory way to deal with them is to cut the tap root off below the rown, say three inches, with

sharp spade or spud. Perennials live and produce seed for many years. They are of two classes, the ordinary perennial that reproduces itself only from seed and the creeping or running perennial which in addition to producing seeds also sends up new plants from

the parent stem.

An example of the first class i the ox-eyed daisy, of the second, the Canadian thistle and couch grass. The roots of the latter contain a large number of latent buds, and whenever the soil is stirred in moist weather they spring into life. If a root is broken or cut during a warm



## HOW TO KEEP WELL

BY JOHN W. S. McCULLOUGH, M.D., D.P.H., CHIEF OFFICER OF THE PROVINCIAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

THERE are two great obstacles to preventive medicine which is the real medicine, and these are poverty and ignorance. The greatest cause of poverty—that is, real downright need—is sickness. Sickness causes at least one-third of the world's poverty. Several other things, including alcohol, account for the other two-thirds. Money in the form of higher wages helps in a large measure to obviate poverty and the sickness which oftentimes lies at its door. Perhaps the most noted health man in America at the present time is Colonel (Dr.) Gorgas, the man whose energies succeeded in making the

OF DISEASE and Yellow Fever—drove the white man from the easy living tropics to the inclement north. His enterprise is allowing him to return there. He asserts further (for, like all public health men, his assertions are marked by personal modesty) that the Panama Canal project was made feasible by the fact that the workingmen there were paid the highest wages of any place in America. Money may be an evil. It sometimes is; but it has its good uses. The other great foe of public health advancement is ignorance; that is, want of knowledge of what is good for one's health. A .- The hair should be washed with soap and warm water, dried, and then soakedlin gasoline or coal oil with a towel tied about the head over night. Next morning the hair should be carefully ANSWERS TO combed with a fine-tooth comb dipped in acetic acid or vinegar to remove the nits. One, or at most two treatments like this will usually clean the matter up.

Q .- How much Antitoxin is safe to give to a child seven years old? A.—The quantity of Diphtheria Antitoxin required for any case depends upon the severity of the case. There is practically no danger from any quantity from 5,000 to 30,000 units. Don't hesitate to use plenty of it. It is supplied free by the Provincial Board of Health.





## SWEDEN CLAIMS AN ADVANTAGE

Diplomatic and Exporting Circles in London Think They Scored on Britain

By Special Wire to the Courier.

London, Aug. 19 .- Swedish diplomatic and exporting circles here re gard as a victory for Sweden in her opposition to British blockade meas ures the promulgation of the new British order covering exports to Sweden, under which a Swedish trade commission guarantee against re-export of the goods and their pro ducts is required.

According to these authorities Sweden informed Great Britain early in the negotiations on the subject that she was quite willing to give government backed guarantees in regard to anything shipped from the United Kingdom in recognition of the right of Great Britain to regulate the destination of her own products, but at the same time positively declined to give officially or permit her citizens to give any undertaking covering imports from other nations.

The Swedish law against Swedes giving such guarantees individually was so strictly enforced that British exporters appealed to their government which instituted the negotiations which have been concluded by recognition of the Swedish contention through recognition of the Swedish trade commission guarantees.
