
Corn Yield Greates in History-Wheat Crop Exceeds that of Last Year

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8—Despite es-timated loss of 37,000,000 bushes dur-ing September the U. S. corn crop still will be the greatest in the History of the country. 



LONDON, October 8-Strong German naval forces have been observed off the Island of Borholm and off the coast of Sweden, apparently-confirming ramors of an intended German offensive against Helsingfors and Petrograd. It is learned from a trastworthy source that considerable German forces are soon to be assembled in the Baltie including mine sweepers, seaplance and Aransports. The German plan is believed to include an attack on Helsingfors by land and sea.



twelve months will require no less than 577 000 000 bushels of wheat, even with the exercise of most rigorous economy in its consumption. Canada and the United States have a wheat deficit of 400,000,000 bushels in the amount re-quired from North America for the Al-bes and for Euroneen neutrals

quired from North America for the Al-hes and for European neutrals. The responsibility of cusucing the food supply of Great Britain and our Allies reists peculiarily upon Canada and the United States. Because of the short-age of ships only a small part of the grain required can be carried from Aus-tralia and other more distant countries. Three trips from Canadian or American Atlantic ports can be made in the time Atlantic ports can be made in the time required for one round trip between Australia. The shipping cannot be div-erted if the Allies are to be fed. Here erted if the Allies are to be fed. Here then is the situation; The people of North Americ must share their food supplies with the armies and the civil-ian population of the allies. Moreover, such supplies must be spared for export in the form which is most suitable for transportation across the ocean. The greatest need is for wheat, beef and bacon. We must aske these foods by substituting perishable products in sea-son and other foods which are not re-quired for export.
