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IDLE MEN AND CARS

Great Strike of the Coal Miners Shows No Weakening.

Empty Cars on Heavily Loaded Railroad Tracks—Fitzgerald Operators Show No Hurry to Settle—West Virginia Dispatches Are Busy, and This is the Big Obstacle to the Success of the Men.

Pittsburg, July 11.—To-day marks the beginning of the second week of the coal miners' strike, and already it gives promise of being one of the most eventful in the history of this country.

Eight days ago the coal operators in this district and the miners themselves agreed to a general suspension of work, but the operators have since been brought to their senses by the bituminous mining industry.

Then the months of the coal mines together with the coal fields of the West Virginia, Allegheny and Peter's Creek valleys, and the valleys of Tom's and Miller's Run, were open and the coal fields were again producing coal.

Now the vast caverns are like so many graveyards, and an army of 18,000 unemployed, who are anxiously awaiting for work to be done, are waiting for the railroad tracks to be cleared.

On nearly every railroad track leading to the mines there stands a long line of empty cars, and it is estimated that the movement has been cleared in the past few days.

Every effort will be made to bring out the men in the mines that are still working. This will be a difficult task, but the strike leaders expect confidence in their ability to make a general suspension complete before the week is 48 hours old.

Arbitration Movement.
Columbus, July 11.—There will be a conference Friday morning at the Arbitration Board of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois to discuss the coal strike.

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MCLEAN AT LIBERTY.

With a Crowbar He Broke Out of His Cell.

Such an Instrument in the Hands of a Professional Crackman Made McLean's Escape a Matter of Easy Work.

McLean's Escape—A Man With a Notion of His Own—Was Hunted for His Escape.

Toronto, July 13.—Through the rank negligence of someone at Police Headquarters the most desperate criminal that ever got into the hands of the Toronto police made a daring and successful escape from the cells at No. 1 Station yesterday at about 1 o'clock.

The man is Albert W. or "Jack" McLean, a desperado character, who puts no value whatever upon human life, who is a murderer, an expert safe blower and burglar, and a member of a gang that has terrorized the central portion of the Province for the past couple of months.

McLean was arrested at Toronto Junction, by Detective Davis at 2 o'clock on Saturday morning, on a charge of attempting to murder Detective Beattie of Barrie last Wednesday night.

He was locked up at the jail and was yesterday brought to headquarters, handcuffed to a notoriety that had named Bob McFarland. He was arraigned and verbally remanded to the cells at No. 1 Station.

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

A GREAT CELEBRATION

The Anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne Loyally and Right Royally Observed—A Highly Successful Event.

Cool, cloudy, with occasional Scotch mists, describes the weather that prevailed on the 12th, and while interested Athenians flocked to these auspicious would militate against the attendance at the celebration here, it was clearly demonstrated before the noon hour that it requires more than an unfavorable weather to dampen the ardor and restrain the loyal Orangemen of Leeds County from honoring the anniversary of King William's great achievement. For the 12th was a great day in Athens, greater than was expected, and such a display of numerical strength, of banners, of music, and of uniforms and regalia was made as filled the members with enthusiasm, all feeling proud of their connection with an order having such high ideals and capable of making such a grand demonstration.

The decoration committee commenced their work at sunrise and had scarcely completed it before the merry music of the Citizens' Band opened the proceedings of the day. The B. & W. band, consisting of 14 members, under the leadership of their conductor, Mr. G. F. Blackwell, marched to their respective headquarters, each lodge having its own 5th and drum band. Other lodges to the number of 29, with banners waving on a drum beating, arrived from the west, and were comfortably quartered by the reception committee. THE VETERAN STATESMAN'S CHAIR OF HONOR AND REPUTATION WAS A REVELATION TO THEM—His Reminiscences of 63 Years Were of Supreme Interest—The Queen Met the United States Envoy—His Latest Work Concerning Turkey and the Great Powers—General News by Cable.

LONDON, July 12.—The visit Saturday to Haverdon of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. E. J. Seddon and Mr. George H. Reid, Prime Ministers respectively of Canada, New Zealand and New South Wales, was a great success. The Premier was much impressed with the Statesman's mental alertness and physical vigor, and also by his magnetic and charming manner. They declare it is no wonder that he exercised such influence over his countrymen.

The conversation was informal and familiar. The visitor was recalled by Mr. Gladstone's vigorous recital of his reminiscences and his knowledge of colonial affairs from the time 62 years ago when he was appointed Under Secretary of State for the Colonies. Several group photographs of Mr. Gladstone and his visitors were taken.

Government Station at Gays Landed. Treasurer Sacked and Officers Imprisoned. Labuan, Island of Labuan, northwest coast of Borneo, July 12.—Matsalle, the rebel leader, with 80 followers, attacked and sacked the Government station at Gays at daybreak yesterday. He looted the town, sacked the treasury, securing about £2000 on deposit. He improved the officers in charge and others, and killed a corporal of police. The British Resident here has gone to Gays with a detachment of 150 men. There are no Europeans at Gays, which is a small hamlet of one-half mile in charge of a Eurasian (half-breed) and a few police. Matsalle has since been proclaimed an outlaw, and it is believed that his followers, including the Dyaks and Sikhs who are being sent to hunt him out of the jungle will probably capture him easily.
