A mind more gifted, a temperament more sensitive, and a heart more woefully tried by all that could blind the crown of thorns which brighter in heaven, never passed from the earth, may well believe, than in the death of her, whose name (by which she is known to the world) we have here written. Of the two lives that she lived successively, while a tenant of the fragile frame whose pulses are now still—the first, a brilliant and brief one of literary success, and the last a slow and painful martyrdom of sacrifice and sorrow—genius and an almost unparalleled constancy deepened, a thousand-fold, the varied experiences. Few will have ever gone to the right hand of God, we recently feel, with more about which the angels will gather, to read the record of heavenly spirit, and self-sacrificing and humble goodness, which, it is the mystery of an inscrutable Providence should be selected for such trial on earth. To those who knew her she was, in every sense, sainted; yet none who knew her well, and what she so changeably suffered, would believe there was ever another let so apparently deepened but to be filled with bitterness. Before saying the few words by which we would recall the points of her varied life to our readers, let us give one of the drops of agony which fell from this heaven-child while here on trial—a poem written for her mother's eye only, and certainly the most beautiful first breath of a soul's utterance that we have ever seen in human language. It was sent to us some years ago, by one of her friends, under a seal of privacy which we presume is removed by her death. She wrote it while at Malmain, the missionary station in India at which she had been left by her husband Mr. Judson, when he embarked on a nearly hopeless voyage for health. At the date of this poem he had been four months dead, although it was ten days before the sad news was communicated to her.

CHARACTER OF THE TURKS.

The books recently published upon this subject are very contradictory. Some of them represent the Turks as worthy of the highest eulogy; others give an opposite opinion. Travellers judge the Turks after their own passions and prejudices, and after a thorough acquaintance with the people. They go to pass a few months at Constantinople, and the other large Eastern cities, without having learned the language. They are not admitted into the families of Mohammedans. Their domestic life consequently escapes their observation. They meet with adventurers, exceptionable persons, with whom they converse for a short time, and then return to the West, with a partial, with foolish confidence, their superficial impressions. How, then, can they furnish us with correct information.

OLD TURK IS ALSO EXCEEDINGLY APATHETIC.

He will pass whole days in majestic or rather stupid silence, thinking that slaves or Christians are made to work for him, while he has nothing to do for them. The old Turk believes with all his heart, in Mahomet and the Koran. He admits the most extravagant prodigies, without the shadow of a doubt. He even believes that the Ottoman Empire would be yet capable of resisting Russia, and all its enemies. He is a great mixture of ignorance, pride, superstition and intolerance. But, at the same time, the old Turk is temperate, honest in his work, sincere in his say, open in his proceedings. He is occasionally capable of heroic devotion; he will sacrifice his property and life for what he considers a just and holy cause. In a word, he has uncommon morality and integrity; he promises little and rarely; but you may trust in his promise.

WHICH OF THE TWO TYPES IS THE BEST?

Which of the two types is the best? I shall not decide; but, taken altogether, the old Turk, having defects which the other has not, still shows a respectable side; he has a kind of conscience, while the new Turk presents only egotism and passion, under the mask of deceitful civility.

AN EFFICIENT METHOD OF DESTROYING ROGS.

It is not a very uncommon idea, that where bugs once are, there they must and will be; as if they were some indestructible spirits, that laugh and evade all endeavors to destroy them. This however, is quite a fallacy, and one successful mode of getting rid of them, is to mix a pint of turpentine and half an ounce of camphor. The camphor should be broken into small bits and shaken in a bottle with the spirits, it will soon dissolve, and the mixture be fit for use. The bed furniture or hangings should be taken off, and, if of materials best washing, it should be washed; and the parts that have been near the wood should be sponged with the mixture, which will not injure. The bedstead should be uncrowded and the mixture, thoroughly applied to all the joints and cracks, by which means, not only the bugs, but the eggs will be destroyed. It will be well at the same time to scour the floor of the room with strong lime-water, and wash any other piece of furniture which have any cracks where bugs might secrete themselves, with the camphor and spirits. Although it is by no means always a proof of dirtiness when bugs appear, it certainly will be the part of cleanliness to speedily take means to destroy them.

IRON HOUSES. We attended recently an informal meeting of business men, at the American Rooms of M. N. Croft, West Street, Brooklyn, New York, at which Mr. Sexton, the inventor of a new plan of iron buildings, explained his system. He constructs the frame work of his buildings entirely of cast iron, in sections, which are made to interlock by very close fitting and ingenious joints, secured by keys. This method of building avoids the labour of drilling and bolting, which has been a great inconvenience in iron buildings. It also allows the house to be taken down in sections, and removed at very little expense. The covers of the frame work on the outside with plates of iron, by a similar system of interlocking, without any bolts or other fastenings, the joints being packed with gutta-percha, so as to exclude water under hydraulic pressure. To finish the dove-tailings of the joints, he has invented a machine that can perform the work of forty men. The walls are made hollow, and the enclosed space is filled in with a non-conducting composition of beach sand and other substances, so that, as Mr. Sexton observed, his houses become, when finished, a perfect fire-proof safe. The roofs and floors are made of cast iron frames, resembling heavy window sashes, the interstices being occupied, as in the case of windows, with plates of glass, of any required thickness and transparency. The glass used is not our common glass, but is in itself a new and valuable invention, being called malleable glass, from its wonderful property of toughness allowing it to bend freely without breaking. It can be drawn out into threads of any fineness, and so strong and flexible that they are said to be commencing the manufacture of piano and violin strings from this material. Mr. Sexton handed round a piece of this glass string for inspection. It was as small as the E string of a violin, and could be bent around the finger, or tied in a knot apparently like a string. Plates of this glass being let into the frame work of the floors, the whole is then covered over with a peculiar transparent cement of Mr. Sexton's invention, which makes the whole floor look like one solid plate of glass. The cost of roofing with this material is seventy-five cents per square foot. The walls inside can be covered with plaster, or finished with iron or glass, at the option of the builder. All the interior ornamentation, such as mantelpieces, panels, &c., may be of malleable glass. The advantages claimed for this style of building are, first, its great cheapness, and the rapidity with which it allows of construction. It effects a saving of one-third the cost, and three-fourths in labour, over every other method. Mr. Sexton stated that he could complete an ordinary dwelling house in thirty days. Second, the variety of style and finish that can be obtained at small cost, by different combinations of the same pattern. The inventor remarked that in the construction of the whole Crystal Palace, but six different patterns were required. Third, the facility with which such a building can be taken down and removed. Fourth, its security from damage by fire or lightning—thus saving all the expenses of insurance. Other incidental advantages are its durability, freedom from vermin, &c.—New York Leader.

SEASONABLE ADVICE.—Use the chloride of lime freely if the premises or vicinity of your house is impure. If bed-bugs annoy you destroy them with corrosive sublimate, beaten up in the white of an egg, and paste it on the wood-work infested. If rats or mice be the pests, use good traps. In poisoning them you may poison greater folk, and if you do destroy them in this way, you create bad odors in the house.
