

THE KURDISH REVOLT.

The recent very serious disturbance in the north-west of Persia; according to a Constantinople despatch did not in the first place arise from an invasion by Turkish Kurds. After these had taken the field, some of the Turkish Kurds crossed the frontier and joined them. The most influential of the Turkish Kurdish chiefs, Abdallah, who is regarded as a sort of national saint, much as the late Akouud of Swat was by the tribes on the Peshawar frontier—did not himself cross the border; but his two sons were with the rebels. The number of the Kurds who took part in the insurrection is variously estimated at 10,000, and 15,000. They are armed with rifles obtained during the Turco-Russian war. The majority are cavalry, admirably mounted. During their raid they pillaged and destroyed over one hundred villages.

A FOURTH ATTEMPT TO KILL THE CZAR.

The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says:—According to the St. Petersburg Vedomosti of this week, a fourth attempt against the life of the Czar was made last year in addition to the three which took place between April, 1879, and April of this year, and which becomes universally known. This fourth attempt, it appears, has been kept secret up to a very short time ago. The Vedomosti stated that last year, presumably during the Czar's stay at Livadia, about three ponds of dynamite were laid beneath the Lazovaya-Sebastopol line of railway, not far from the village of Alexandrofsk, by means of a subterranean passage bored beneath the railway bank from a ravine which effectually concealed the operation from the guards of passing trains. Two small chambers were dug out about twenty feet apart, and in each was placed a packet of dynamite, the whole being connected by an electric wire. When the Imperial train passed by this spot the guard now remembers that he noticed a carriage with three horses going along the high road, that it stood for a second or two and then was driven away at a great speed. It is supposed the electric battery was in this carriage. The minecrem appeared, however, to have over-reached themselves, for no explosion took place, and by the subsequent investigations carried out it was found that the wire in being forced under the turf had in one place been cut or broken.

THE EXPULSION OF THE JESUITS.

The expulsion of the Jesuit unrecognized orders continues. In process of executing the decrees upon the house of a Jesuit in Paris on Friday, the suspension hook and ladder men of the fire department in connection with the police, broke down the doors and entered the building by force. Many persons crowded in, in evident sympathy with the Jesuits, and obstructed the officers, and several arrests were made. The refusal of the Tribunal of Justice disqualified from presiding at its sittings argues unfavorably for actions brought by Jesuits before that tribunal for the restoration of their property.

THE APPROACHING MARRIAGE OF THE AUSTRIAN CROWN PRINCE.

The time fixed for the marriage of the Crown Prince Rudolph of Austria and the Princess Stephanie of Belgium is rapidly approaching, and in the Palace of Schonbrunn preparations for the reception of the royal parents of the bride and other distinguished guests who are to be present on the occasion have already been commenced. The marriage ceremony itself will be performed in Vienna. The King and Queen of the Belgians will leave Brussels on the 9th February, and will be received by their future son-in-law on the following day at Salzburg, whence they will go on to Schonbrunn on the 11th. On that day a series of festivities will commence, which will include Court balls, grand representations at the Imperial opera and the theatres, a concert of the celebrated Vienna Manner Gossangverein, and many other rejoicings, culminating on the 14th in the entry of the bride into Vienna. The marriage ceremony will be performed on the evening of the 15th, the Cardinal Archbishop of Vienna officiating. It is reported that Prince William, heir presumptive to the German Imperial Crown, will represent his family at the wedding.

A Meteor Shower.
Thousands of people all over the
world stayed up last night to see the
meteor shower which is usually seen in
some part of the world about the 12th
of November in each year. About the
12th, the Earth passes in a region
occupied by the meteoric train of one
of the known comets, and as those bodies
move through space with wonderful
velocity, they ignite by friction with the
atmosphere of our earth, sometimes
falling into the farmer's field, a mass
of molten metal. What we call a shooting
star are meteors, or aerolites,
which get out of their life-time, having
strayed away from the main body,
coming as a tail for some comet, and
come to grief by getting into our lower
atmosphere. So far as we can learn
there were no meteors seen last night,
though they may be seen tonight.

The Exodus.
A number of young people, male and
female, have gone from Chatham to
Boston and elsewhere, by late trains. We
may say these are people who have gone in
consequence of the peculiar employment
of the mills, for when winter comes there
is never anything for them to do and
they go away till spring comes round,
and the mills begin to run again.
Next spring, therefore, these people with
the exception of the women, will return
in the same numbers as they have gone
out this fall.

OUR YOUNG WOMEN.
We have before pointed out what a
pity it is to have so many young women
leaving us for the New England towns,
when our men of means here, if they
only would, might be able to give em-
ployment to them all the year round
at occupation suitable to the women,
and profitable to the employer. In
more ways than one we are menaced by
this going out. We are all acquainted
with the story of the ancient Romans,
who had to steal the Sabine women for
wives. Our young men want to follow
the women away if the exodus
can't be stopped, or they will have
to raid the County of Carleton, or some-
where else—and put-up with wives not
having very small feet.

London, Paris and Havre; and to
Ontario and Manitoba. The names of

band and children at their own homes.

**The Story of our Easter in a
Far off Land.**

GREAT DESERT, Nov. 9.
A St. Petersburg paper tells of a Rus-
sian traveller who was recently wander-
ing in the Great Desert of Gok, when
he was thus addressed by a Tartar chief:
"Have you the secret how to live with-
out eating? Give me the talisman and I
will become subject to the Czar and will
give to you ten fat sheep, a camel, a
brood-mare and fifty pounds of brick tea.
Tell me how to go empty and live and
you shall dwell in my tents and have my
daughter without dowry. The story of
the man who lives on nothing has come
to us through China; it happened in a far
off land."

CABLE BRIEFS.

The Channel squadron has been order-
ed to Ireland.

The Government of the Isle of Man
has decided to extend the franchise to
qualified unmarried women.

Sticks and stones were freely used. Sev-
eral heads were broken, and the obnox-
ious Guys destroyed, and their bearers
put to flight.

is to be laid by the Japanese Government
between Nagasaki, Japan, and Fusaco,
Corca.

Irish News.

At a conference of the Roman Catholic
bishop and clergy of the diocese of
Cork, the bishop dwelt upon the neces-
sity of a change in the land system, and
urged that efforts be made to bring about
such a change must be guided by reason and
good sense. The greatest hindrance to
success would be the commission of
crimes against person or property. Some
murders had been committed which ex-
cited the horror of the whole nation.
Every good man who heard expressions
approving of such crimes shouted at
random at public meetings should en-
deavor to have them repressed. He
encouraged the people to give assistance
to the Royal Commission, and looked
forward to a future created by sound
public opinion as one in which the spirit
of industry would be stimulated through-
out the country. Resolutions were
passed that the real evil of rack-renting
could be remedied by a valuation made
by a competent, independent, impartial
and legally-constituted authority; that
the landlord should be deprived of the
power of eviction so long as the rent
thus fixed was paid; that tenants should
not be allowed to contract themselves
out of such rent; that Government
should remove legal obstacles to the
sale of land, as contemplated by the
British clauses, with a view of creating a
peasant proprietary. The resolution was
unanimously agreed to.—"That whilst
advocating a settlement of the land
question, and declaring readiness to co-
operate with our British in constitutional
efforts to secure its accomplishment, we
would fall in with as ministers of religion
if we did not proclaim in the most
emphatic manner our uncompromising
hostility to all who propound doctrines
destructive of the rights of property, or
who, by violent language, seem to sug-
gest to our excitable people that crimes
may help the advancement of the tenant
farmers."

The Land commission, Dublin, con-
tinues to receive important evidence,
principally favoring the principle of long
leases at fair rents, the tenant's right of
sale, and the creation of a peasant prop-
rietary. The evidence of several land-
lords has strengthened the tenants case
very much.

The Aurora, the organ of the Pope,
publishes an article favorable to the Irish
Land League, in which it says: In con-
sequence of the insupportable state of
the Irish peasantry, the people must
shake off their oppression. The crimes
committed in Ireland are not attributable
to the Land League. Radical reforms
are indispensable; otherwise Ireland will
be compelled to choose between anarchy
and starvation.

The Orangemen of every part of Ire-
land oppose the Land League move-
ment, but this stirring and growing body
pay no attention to this insignificant
band.
