



Sherbrooke.—Three years in the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary was the sentence on Joseph Couture, of the township of Lingwick, for placing a bolt and a spike on the Canadian Pacific Railway track. The case was heard before Judge J. H. Lemay, in the District Magistrate's Court, when the accused was charged with placing obstacles on the railway track with intention to destroy valuable property and endanger human life. The accused immediately pleaded guilty and, after receiving the usual warning from the court, was committed for trial. He asked for a speedy trial before Judge Lemay. Counsel for the plaintiff advised the court that the accused had a rather bad record and claimed that he had previously served one term of two years and two sears and tw


