IN CHINA!

SHANGHAI, July 27 .- A letter ju ceived here from Sir Claude MacD dated Pekin, July 5th, is as follows "We are receiving no assistance from the authorities. Three legations are still standing, including the British. We also hold part of the city walls. The Chinese hold part of the city wails. In Canese are shelling us from the city with a three-inch gun, and some smaller ones, and are sniping us. We may be annihilated any day. Our ammunition and food are short. We would have perished by this time only the Chinese have no organized plan of attack. If we are not pressed we may hold out a forteight longer; otherwise only slight resistance to the relief force."

The letter concludes by advising the elief force to approach by the eastern rate or by way of the river. The losses of the foreigners in Pekin up to July 6th, were forty killed and eighty wounded. It is reported from Tien Tain that th

Chinese forces are concentrating at the rillage of Getsang, ten miles north of Tien Tein, where it is said large quantities of rice are stored. The Rassian and Japanese cavalry are keeping in close touch with the enemy. The river is still low, and water transport would be difficult.

How THE TROUBLE ORIGINATED Telegrams have arrived at St. Peters-burg, by a circultous route, dated Pekin June 15th and June 18th, describing the June 15th and June 18th, describing the origin of the trouble. They come from the director of the Russo-Chinese bank in Pekin. He eays in part: "The German legation on June 13th arrested an anti-Christian brigand. This was the signal for an anti-Christian spising, and at six in the evening the anti-Christians set fire to the American church and burned it to the ground. The Europeans then barricaded the legations and the rioters sacked and burned the houses in the European quarter." It further appears from these advices that by June 18th the legations were besieged and the Chinese government. were beeiged and the Chinese government had attempted to invoke the sid of M.
