If one buys thread by the quantity, which is the economical way of buying it, only so much as is needed for daily use should be taken out, and marrow-bone across into thicknesses of about two inches, these are boiled, laid on square pieces of buttered toast and served hot. Some careful cooks close up both ends with a layer of thin paste before boiling.

Every night the kitchen sink should be cleansed by a solution of two tablespoon-fuls of washing soda in a gallon of boiling water. This should be poured in while at boiling point. hand-sewing.
