Liver is delicious cooked as follows: Cut slashes in the liver and thread into them thin slices of bacon Season with salt, pepper and thyme and bake for an hour or so.

A cork full of thumb tacks kept in the work basket will be found in valuable when cutting out garments as the tacks hold the patterns securely and do not wrinkle the goods.

An easy remedy for a skin of large pores is to wear at night a mask o cotton batting or of chamois, wet with distilled water. This has a sure effect if persevered in.

For mending table linen, save those long even threads which have been drawn from linen in hemstitching Wind them on an empty spool and pu aside until a table cloth needs mend-

If it is difficult to rid a frying pan of the smell of fish or onions, a little oatmeal should be sprinkled over it and the pan shaken over the fire until the oatmeal begins to scorch.







"I have not received any word from him, and do not expect to. It is hard to have to be alone and suffer, but I don't think it will last long. I am not long for this world now, and since this trial has come to me, I have not had a single day of good health.

"They cannot prove anything on Hawley; they cannot even prove that Belle Elmore is dead. Why should I believe him guilty? I know that he would not do such a thing. It passes belief. I may never know the truth, as I don't feel I can stand this worry much longer. I feel as if I would like to go away alone and die. I did my best to educate Hawley and his son. I did the best I could, and now in my old age I am alone and overwhelmed by this disgrace."

Locating Ships in a Fog.

Two Italian naval officers have in vented a device which they claim will do away with all danger of ships colliding in a fog. The visible portion of this invention, which is called the 'system of radio telegraphy,' consists of a recorder having the form and appearance of a compass dial. Near the latter is a thumb bar that influences the dial indicator, which manipulated causes the indicator to revolve over the dial's surface and mark the point of the compass from which an approaching ship is coming, giving its exact location and distance away.

About the skipper's ears are strapped a pair of the ordinary wireless telegraph receivers, by which means he is able to hear the sound given off by the wireless apparatus of the approaching ship. The operator manipulates the thumb bar until the wireless sound is at its highest pitch, when a reading of the dial face and indicator gives him the exact position of the vessel or shore wireless station from which the sound comes.

For this instrument to be effective of course, it is necessary for the approaching ship to be equipped with wireless apparatus and have it sending off the waves at the time the test with the instrument is made on the other ship .- 'The Pathfinder.'

To prosecute a battle without a conviction that the Lord had authorzed it would have been impossible to Cromwell. After his success at Naseby he wrote to the Speaker:+ Sir, this is none other but the hand of God, and to Him alone belongs the glory, wherein none are to share with At the battle of Dunbar he stood on the field in the presence of his men and sang the 17th Psalm through to revive their drooping spirits. And after cruelly putting to death men, women and children in St. Peter's Church, Drogheda, he could still believe that God had made him the instrument of such bloody work. "It hath pleased God to bless ur endeavors," he writes.

Was Cromwell's Work Enduring?

It is questionable whether the social and religious revolution of which Cromwell was the dynamic left a permanent impression upon English life. The fields, lanes, and streets of England had been stained with the blood of her noblest sons. It was a terrible price to pay for an unsuccessful attempt to push Puritanism down the throats of the aristocracy, or to attempt the establishment of a social system which the more advanced people of this generation are not yet prepared to embrace. A country cannot e ruled by any little Parliament of "holy men." The profligacy of the Restoration was the reply to Cromwell's patriarchal exhortations.

That Cromwell's socialistic spirit had exercised its influence was apparent in the demands of his army. Republicanism, sovereignty of Pariament, annual or biennial elections, extensions and equalisation of the suffrage, local self-government, codification of the law, complete religious liberty, and equal political rights were part of the socialistic propaganda presented to Parliament with all the urgency of a Royal proclamation At one period it was feared that cromwell's training of his army would ead to his own annihilation, for their socialism swelled into plots to assassinate both Charles and their stalwart leader.

One Act of Parliament must be ooked upon as permanent: the deatl of the old Monarchy. For one generation the Stuarts returned, but the old feudal rights and political power had departed forever. The Church of England reappeared, but minus the influence of Laud and Charles. Parliamentary government, equality of rights, equity in law, all date from the memorable year of 1649.

It is quite true that England reected Cromwell's system of government, namely, that it should rest with a Single Person and a Parliament, the Parliament making all laws and oting all supplies, co-ordi-Person, and not meddling with the executive; but it is a great compliment to Cromwell that the American people have adopted it. 
