The Bonrenture left St. Paul's at 11 a.m. Tuesday, had it very rough Wednesday and arrived at Trepassey that night to shelter out of the elements. she did not meet much ice on the run from St. Paul's, steaming' through a miles of it and cutting across for Cape Ray. Nearly all of this time the ship was in the strain of Bryon Island, and was driven to and fro between this place and Bird Rocks, but could not penetrate the solid mass of ice. On the 24th March the ship was about 7 miles to the N. W. of Bryon Island when the ice began to raft at an alarming rate, and all on board realized that the Harlaw was in a serious situation. The ship was buoyant and rose up with the floe, but for which she would have been cut through and would have gone down instantly. As it was the ice smashed off seven timbers in the after hold and three deck beams or the starboard side, and received con siderable damage also to the pori side, especially in the bunkers, which not be ascertained. She began to leak at an alarming rate after this squeeze and two pumps were kept going the whole time besides the bilge pumps on the engine to try to keep her free Despite this and when the rafting had ceased the ship still continued forc ing to the N.W. for the seals, which were known to lay in that direction in large numbers. On the 26th the floe once again started to come together and catching the ship, repeated the nipping process, and did such damage that it was seen she was almost wounded to the death. The men. when she was first caught in the rafters, got all their clothes on deck and day and night after held themselves in readiness to leave the ship quickly, keeping the deck the whole time and getting little, if any, sleep.
