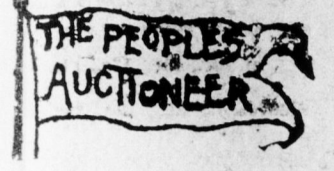

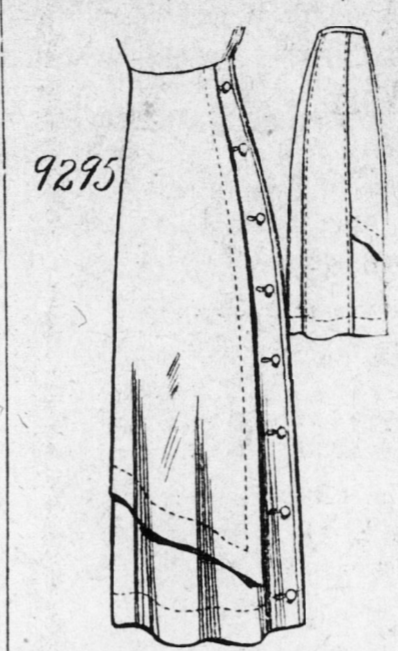

It has been stated in unusually well informed quarters for the past day or two, that Premier Borden and his colleagues are convinced that the international situation demands instant action on the part of Canada, and are prepared to recommend six million pounds for the construction of three Dreadnoughts. In an interview, Premier Borden said: "You have my authority for stating the reports are absolutely incorrect."

BOSTON, July 28. The cure of insanity by the injection of substances from a healthy brain is described by Dr. Smith, of the British Medical Association. In his report, the surgeon described several occasions in which he obtained cerebral cholesterin from healthy brain tissue and injected these substances into insane persons. The treatment, he declared, caused delusions to vanish and grave disorders to clear up.

MONTREAL, July 28. Word was received this morning that at 4.40 Saturday afternoon, the S. S. Empress of Britain collided with the Collier Hilvetia, in a dense fog, a few miles west from Fame Point. The Hilvetia was sunk and her crew rescued by the Empress. The latter is badly damaged and returning slowly to Quebec. The Empress sailed from Quebec on Friday night. The Collier was on her way from Sydney.

NEW YORK, July 28. A Berlin cable to the World, says: "According to a rumour current, the grandest military spectacle ever organized by the Kaiser will be during the visit of King George and Queen Mary to Berlin next spring. The spectacle will be the last stages of the battle of Waterloo according to the German version. The troops engaged will wear historic uniforms and be furnished with the weapons of 1815. There will be a march past of detachments of all the regiments that historically fought side by side with the British troops during the various periods of history, the idea being to impress on the public mind the lesson of ancient friendship and comradeship in arms."

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, July 29. The dockers strike, which was called early in May, and caused 50,000 dock workers and their families to live in a state of semi-starvation for ten weeks, was declared at an end Saturday, by the Strike Committee. Work will be resumed Monday. The strike, which involved dock laborers, lightermen and other branches of labour, and has caused so much distress in the shipping district of London, was brought about by a dispute between workmen and their employers over the engagement of a non-union worker—a foreman, who refused to join the union. The men refusing to work under his orders were locked out. Watson, President of the International Seamen's Union, tried to organize a national strike, but failed. In consequence, the Strike Committee decided work should be resumed.

WOODSTOCK, Eng., July 29. A great rally of the Unionist party which sees recent differences of opinion between the Liberal and Labor forces and the natural loss of strength to the Government as the result of Home Rule, Welsh Disestablishment and other reform measures, was held in the court yard of Blenheim Palace, Saturday. Three thousand delegates, representing various Unionist organizations throughout the country, and some three thousand members of the Unionist Workingmen's Club, a new organization started to offset the advance of the labor party. Speeches were delivered by Bonar Law, Sir Ed. Carson and A. E. Smith.

LONDON, July 29. The result of the bye-election in Crew division, county Cheshire, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Liberal member, W. S. B. McLarny, was a win for Craig, Unionist, with 6,260 to Murphy (Lab.) 5,894; and Holmes (Labor) 2,485. McLaren defeated Craig last election by 170.

Notes From the Ancient Capilat.

The cod trap season at Cape St. Mary's and Golden Bay is now practically over, and it is the worst for many years.

There will be good crops of hay, cabbage and turnips, but there will be a great shortage in the potato crop owing to the canker being prevalent in the ground in many places. Only a very few seed potatoes and other small seeds were distributed here by Mr. Devreux, M. H. A. this year. My friend, Uncle Podger, who has a penchant for poetry although he doesn't know an anapestic from a trochaic line, and makes what Tim Shannahan calls wooden poetry, has composed the following lines re the matter:—
Old Mother Ceres must have laughed
In her sleeve
At the antics of Dick Devro with his
agriculture seeds being prevalent
Seven and a half potatoes was each
farmer's share.
And a handful of small seeds
Was all he had to spare.

From this generous distribution
Many benefits were to flow.
But the potatoes took the canker
And the small seed didn't grow.

The ceremony of laying the corner stone of the New Boys' Academy took place here at 3 p.m. on Sunday last at the presence of a large assemblage of people and many priests. The building when completed will cost about three thousand dollars, and will be a credit to the people and their esteemed pastor, Mons. Reardon. His Grace Archbishop Howley addressed the people on the great boon of religious education, and represented the fact that some men in this country were trying to establish non-secretarian schools. He quoted many eminent authorities of different creeds to show the great value which the product of godless schools was producing in society and the world over.

Whilst listening to the eloquent discourse of His Grace on education, thoughts reverted to the very able speech of the Hon. M. P. Gibbs delivered in the Legislative Council last winter on the Council of Higher Education, and the merits of religious education in schools. I think that speech is one that every right thinking and god-fearing man should feel proud of. It should be printed in pamphlet form and distributed broadcast throughout the country. I was expecting something similar from the able and learned editor of the Chronicle, but I was sadly disappointed. I appreciated Mr. Gibbs remarks re the Council of Higher Education. I have had some experience of the Council of Higher Education and I must say I am a great believer in it. Since its inception there has been a great educational awakening, so much so that the remotest settlement in the island has felt its influence.

Prior to the establishment of the Council of Higher Education the irregularity of attendance had a baneful effect upon outport schools, but the Council of Higher Education has been an important factor in eliminating this great evil. The C. H. E. exams create a great rivalry among the children, among the teachers in each parish, and it has a great effect on the parents in the way of sending their children regularly to school. It also exercises a wholesome influence among the different denominations for first place in the different grades. There is a certain amount of pride in the make-up of every one of us, and consequently children, teachers and parents will do all in their power to make a good showing at the exams. Abolish the Council of Higher Education and you eliminate all these factors which have helped in a great measure to raise the standard of education in our schools. This system of the examination sifts the brains of the community, and gives the poor man's child a chance. I have known people to be opposed to the C. H. E. exams, because the poor class of children who had more ability surpassed those high in the social scale at the exams. The C. H. E. may not be perfect; no institution is perfect, and no doubt some of the criticisms to which it was subjected were justifiable, but there is no denying the fact that it has done a great deal of good, and has justified its existence. It is easy to tear down but takes men of great talent to build up. In my opinion the abolition of any of the Grades of the C. H. E. would be a step in the wrong direction and would be apt to lead to that educational apathy so characteristic of former years.

The genial Capt. T. Fitzpatrick has now settled down to work in his new position of Sub-Collector. While begrudging the gallant captain his good position, yet I think the time has come when civil servants should be remunerated according to the work they have to do.

The officers of Sub-Collector and Tide Water in outports in this country are almost sinecures. There is scarcely anything to be done, and if they were merged into one throughout the country the occupants would still have very little to do, and thousands of dollars would be thus saved. It is true for Mr. Jackman that we have the trappings of an elephant on a cat. The esteemed captain was remarkable for his quadrennial ebullitions of patriotism, and now that he is enjoying the sweets of office, I trust that he will be animated by the same spirit, and endeavour to the best of his ability to abolish the many useless offices which are surely sapping the life blood of this Colony.

The people are indignant at being denied the privilege of netting salmon on inside Gut, and I fear the enforcing of this law will result on someone's head other than the Game Board at St. John's. The people have enjoyed this privilege for centuries, and it is only natural to expect that they resent bitterly this cruel wrong. They say such a state of affairs would not be tolerated for a moment if Jackman were in power. He would not allow the Game Board to usurp the place of the representatives. Uncle Podger says:—

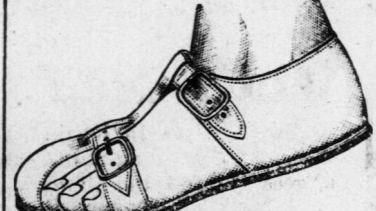

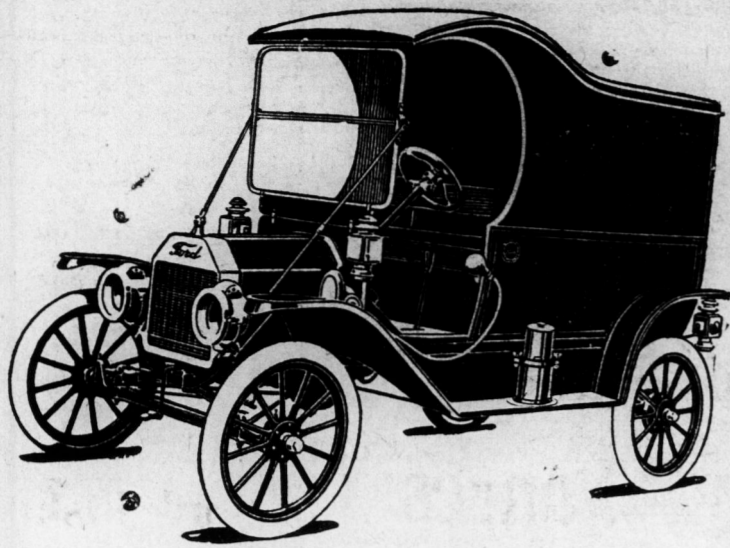

The Governor and the Fiona.

The Governor is now back in the city. He returned on Saturday. The time, therefore, seems opportune to take up again certain matters of public moment, which we kept in abeyance during his absence from the Capital. The first matter to which we direct his attention at this time is the impolicy of taking the S. S. Fiona from her usual work to provide him with sea-going accommodation. First

and foremost we must insist that the purchase and maintenance of the S. S. Fiona was and is for the benefit of the fishery, the revenue, the trade, and the administration of justice in Newfoundland, and that the Fiona was not purchased nor is it maintained for the purpose of providing yachting for a Governor. There may be occasions when the Fiona can be put at the accommodation of a Governor, without injury to the public service. But the accommodating of a Governor must be a secondary consideration and should only be entertained after the services of the public have been fully and properly provided for. In this instance there can be no doubt that the Fiona was taken off and for a time there was no suitable boat doing her work.

We do not know whether the Governor's trip was wholly official, or whether it was partly official and partly pleasure, and whether it served the double purpose of an official visit to the outports and a yachting and salmon fishing excursion. In any case, it was impolitic to take

off the Fiona at a time bankers were getting their early settlements. If it was a matter of picnicking, and so far as it was, it was questionable conduct to risk the success of the banking voyage. As far as the trip was an official visit to the outports, it was doubtful policy for an official visit, of which there was no need, and for which there was no urgency, and which could have been taken at a more opportune time.

These matters were of public moment and the attention of the Government was directed to them in a most incisive manner at the time the trip was only contemplated. But little heed was paid to the remonstrance and the Fiona was taken off her usual work.

Of course, the Ministers of the Governor are in the main responsible for this conduct, but it seems to us that His Excellency should not escape criticism, and now that he is back again, we record our protest once more. Even though his Ministers were willing to accommodate the Governor, His Excellency should not have taken advantage of their compliance, particularly at a time when the staple trade of the country was faced with a competition with the biggest catch of cod ever known in the history of the Norwegian fishery.

Bell Island Regatta.

Swimming Race.

There is a strong feeling in the city at the present time against the swimming race on Regatta Day and we hear that some of these connected with the conduct of the race will withdraw from it. With so many competitors and going over such a lengthy course, while labouring under the influence of intense excitement, there is ever present the risk of a sudden drowning accident. A man or boy may be seized with a sudden cramp or spasm and go down to bottom unnoticed even by those following in boats. This race at the coming regatta will be attended with more than ordinary risk to the competitors. Owing to protracted chilly weather the water will be ice throughout, very cold there is a big current in the lake and it will be especially dangerous for the brigade boys who must be under 20 years old to win. During recent regattas some of the strongest swimmers had to be helped into the boats before half the course was covered and were very ill for while. In fact, the man had to be attended by a doctor and clergyman. As a spectacle there is not much in the race and the opposition to its being placed on the programme is growing steadily.

Landslide at Petty Harbor

Shortly before midnight Friday, and when the storm had abated somewhat, the people of Petty Harbor were awakened by a terrific crash caused by a landslide near Brom Head, where several times before something similar occurred. The landslide occurred opposite H. A. Chase's premises and hundreds of tons of rock and clay with some immense boulders fell. Fortunately no houses were near, nor were there any people about. One flake was demolished by the fall. The Petty Harbor Road was badly torn up by the floods.

A Dastardly Act.

Tuesday of last week, between 5 and 6 p.m., a telegraph pole was found across the track near Trepassey branch road, between Merymeeting Pond and Ferryland. It was securely held in position, as it was run under the rail on one side and the upper part of it rested on the irons on the other side. The intention was evidently to derail one of the trains. When it was discovered a man stood near it, and when asked why he did not try to remove it, his answer was that he was a poor man and that he hoped for a reward for discovering it. His actions and excuse were taken to be suspicious by the policeman there and he was arrested.

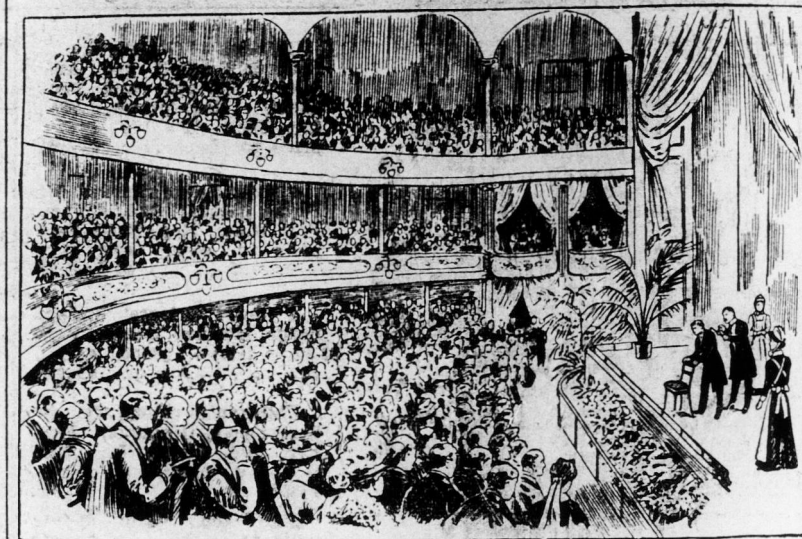

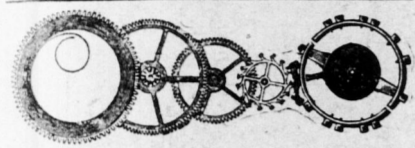

Canada Bay Rivers, viz:—East River, North East River, West River and Cloud's River; all of which are good salmon rivers. Salmon just starting in—July 12.
Baie Verte River.—The warden states:—"I have seen quite a lot of salmon in the river already. (July 16th) but none have been taken yet with rod, hook and line except one taken by Mr. Jackman. I expect there will be a large quantity of salmon up this river this season. This is an ideal place for sportsmen who are in for salmon fishing. Last summer while here I must have seen as many as a barrel of salmon in one small pool. Please remember just one pool, besides all the larger ones. I can recommend this as a No. 1 place for salmon. Prospero calls going North and South every trip. Calls at wharf always. Train running from wharf where the steamer calls to the mines about 2 miles in by the river.
Upper Exploits, Millertown.—Wardens states:—"Drivers and other laborers have caught quite a large number of quanaiche or land-locked salmon on this river; also on the Victoria River. As you will remember, there are no salmon come from the ocean over the Grand Falls to Red Indian Lake. Caribou seem to be just as plentiful around the Lake as I have ever seen them and to the best of my knowledge undisturbed. Bears—there seem to be quite a number prowling around and in several cases have gone in the camps when men have been there."
Gander River.—57 salmon.
Dog Bay River.—Salmon and trout fairly plentiful. No person salmon fishing as yet with rod, hook or line.
Indian Bay River.—24 salmon.
Middle Brook.—3 salmon. Quite a number of salmon at Tavers' Brook. No anglers as yet (July 12th) have been there.
Terra Nova River.—5 salmon; fairly plentiful.
Goose Bay River.—Good sign of salmon, better than last year.
Salmon Brook.—Near Trinity—8 salmon.
North and South Rivers.—Clark's Beach.—No person fishing for salmon in this locality as yet, with rod, hook and line, but salmon are going up rivers in fair numbers.

Colinet River.—Trout very plentiful. 66 doz. caught by residents of Whitbourne and Colinet during the last week. Salmon in river in fair numbers.
North Harbour River.—St. Mary's Bay.—Trout very plentiful.
Little Salmonier and Barchoix Rivers.—Salmon fairly plentiful.
Branch River.—Trout plentiful and many taken by residents.
Great Barchoix River.—Salmon in fair numbers. Trout plentiful.
South East River.—Placentia—65 salmon.
N. E. Arm River.—20 salmon.
North Hr. River.—Placentia Bay—4 salmon.
Pipe's Hole.—Salmon fairly plentiful.
Garnish River.—7 salmon; in goodly numbers.
Terreneville River.—10 salmon.

Cing Cert.—Salmon plentiful. Warden further states: very few seem to know we have such a valuable river. Thousands of salmon go up this river. I have been standing by my camp door at rising tide, watching out and saw a half dozen jump out of water at a time. No person salmon fishing here at present.

Farnes' Arm Brook.—17 salmon.
Grand Bay Brook.—3 salmon. Salmon fairly plentiful in this brook.
