



search to obtain any data at all. In olden times no one troubled to make note of average weather for writing was an art possessed only by few, and writing materials were hard to obtain: hence it is that mention is made only of something unusual, some abnormally mild winter or heavy fall of snow or prolonged frosts. And when all is said there are comparatively few of the latter, although they were likely to be recorded, while the milder ones would be passed over. A few years ago there was published in France some notes concerning very

mild winters in early times. Gregory of Tours tells us that 584 was exceptionally mild, as were the winters of 808, 834, 844 and 1007, when influenza was rife. Another mild season occurred

229, when the birds are said to have hatched their young by February, while the weather journal of the Rev. 

Islands Built to Order.

This Little Article Proves that the Feat is not so Difficult as it Sounds.

In the Bismarck Archipelago, nov occupied by us, are two small islands that the Germans, with characteristic resourcefulness, built up for themselves in a sea where formerly no land was.

This, however, is not quite so difficult as it sounds. One must have a foundation, of course-a coral reef for preference. Given this, and also an unlimited supply of native labour, and island-building in these comparatively calm and tideless waters becomes almost as easily possible as loes house-building elsewhere.

The Solomon, Islanders, for instance, are adepts at the art. When the population of any island of the group becomes too big for comfort, they just set to work and build another one, and the surplus families

The usual plan is to choose a coral reef, which must not be submerged more than three or four feet. In one instance mentioned to me very large stocks bought and paid for in America since the beginning of the year are still lying at New York awaiting their turn for transport to this country; and until they arrive no further supplies of this particular class of goods will be available for civilian use because the whole output of the English factories is reserved for our military requirements when the cold weathe sets in again.

ENTERPRISE IN THE DRY GOODS TRADE.

Except for the intimation that the usual machinery exhibits have this year come under the ban of the Government, it was difficult to realize that we were approaching the third year of the war when the annual Drapery and Outfitting Trades Exhibition opened in the Agricultural Hall, London, on May 1st. There was striking evidence on all sides of the enterprise and resource displayed by British firms, whose activities are all the more creditable in view of the severe depletion of stocks. One of the managers of the exhibition indicated where British enterprise had made good the gaps so that Germany's trade had completely vanished. Never again, he said, would there be any need to go to our enemies for anything in the dry goods trade. Excellent progress has been made in capturing the printing cotton trade, of which Germany made a feature. The difficulty with regard to dyeing is being gradually overcome. According to a representative of the industry with whom I had some conversation, there was no reason why we should not hold our advantage provided that labor, the supply of which was largely governed by the military position, remained satisfactory. Over 150 of the best known firms in the trade exhibited. The bit cotton and woollen manufacturers had stands in the Central Hall, while the Gilbey Hall, given over to smart gowns and costumes millinery and footwear, and to handsome mannequins wearing the latest creations, might have been a fashio able annex to Bond Street.

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
