

#### The Irish Question.

Editor Evening Telegram Dear Sir,—The following dary of outrages committed by Crown forces in Ireland during the month of November last has been compiled from English newspapers, and is of necessity incomplete, owing to the obstacles placed by the same forces in the way of Press correspondents desirous of ventilating their activities.

"Nine days out of thirty passed with out a murder committed by the constabulary or military. On the other twenty-one days armed forces nurdered 61 unarmed, defenceless men, women, and children, and attempted to murder 8 others; 101 unarmed persons, including women and little children, were wounded; 38 public halls or clubs were wholly or partially lestroyed, 9 creameries burned down, 5 newspaper officers bombed or wrecked, 193 shops, private residences and farm houses burned; the crops were burned on 71 farms, and 35 men were seized and publicly flogged by the constab-

This terrible record throws a light on the provocation under which acts of retaliation on the Crown forces are unfortunately committed. It leaves a black mark of shame on the character of the present British Administration, which introduced these forces which continues to employ and uphold them, and which through its chiefest spokesmen has condoned their arocities. There is evidence that intelligent Englishmen are at length coming to a realization of that fact. The Times, whose opinions carry more weight than those of any other journal printed in the English language, makes the following comment in a recent editorial: "An army already perilously undisciplined and a police force avowedly beyond control have defiled by heinous acts the reputation of English; while the Government are not free from the suspicion of dishonour-

able connivance." More significant still, a memorial was recently presented to the British Prime Minister condemning "all murder and outrage" and expressing the conviction of its signatories that "the "action of the Government in permit-"ting 'reprisals' in Ireland is contrary "to the dictates of humanity and jus-"tice and is inconsistent with the maintenance of orderly government." Clynes, M.P., former Food Controller, Lady Courtney of Penwith, Mrs. Creighton, authoress and widow of the late Bishop London, John Drinkwater, poet and dramatist, Rt. Hon. Lord Emmott, A. G. Gardiner, former editor London "Daily News," William Garnett, D.C.L., noted educationalist, Rt. Hon. Lord Gladstone, son of the great Prime Minister and former Governor of South Africa, G. P. 

onderful hall stands in the lace of the Pharaoh Merenemphis in Egypt—the greatbe yet found. And not less wonderful than the finding of the hall is the fiding of the gorgeous throne which the Pharaoh sat whom he gave audience to Moses and Aaron. rs generally agree that Merenpiah was probably the Pharach who would not let the Israelites leave Egypt until he was smitten with ten plagues, and who even then changed his mind, pursued them, and was overwhelmed in the Red Sea.

The Pharaoh of the Oppression was Rameses II. the Great. The Bible mentions his name in connection with the cruel labor he forced on the Israelites at the towns of Rameses and Pithom. Now an original ascription of Merenptah, the son of meses, speaks of his victories over tes, and this makes it probable that he was the Pharach of the Exodus, the monarch "who knew not

This being so, it must have been throne room of Merenptah's palace that the scenes described in the Book of Exodus occurred scenes that are among the most impressive in the sacred history. It was here that the majestic leader, Moses, and his priestly brother, Aaron, appeared before Pharaon and warned him to let the Israelites leave Egypt. It was here that Aaron cast down his rod and commanded it to change into a sernent, which devoured the rods of the Egyptian sorcerers.

An Immense Throne Room.

The palace is one of the few discovered in Egypt and the only one at Memphis, the early capital of Egypt, which was destroyed some six hundred years B.C. The palace still shows marks of fire, and it is presumed that it perished in the sack of the city and was never rebult. The most important feature of this palace was an immense throne room which occupied the centre of the buildings. This is a room about forty feet by sixy feet in area. The roof was upheld by six immense-colums in two rows, all of which were elaborately carved. They are unfortunately broken to pieces, only the bases being in good condition.

The walls of the room are in a much better state of preservation Some of the beautiful doorways, with jambs and lintels, are almost perfect preserved. These were inlaid with falence, and in some cases with pure gold. Enough remains to indicate that this must have been 3 gorgeous room, and it is probable ever built in ancient Egypt.

At one end of the room is a raised dais with steps leading to it. This dais and the stairs are also inlaid and carved. Upon this dais stood the throne upon which the mighty Pharaoh sat when he listened to the leaders of the Israelites.

The palace is about 140 feet long and 100 feet wide and contains twenty rooms. A row of pillars decorated the front, and behind the entrance there was a grand vastibule containing two parallel rows, running across the building, of six columns each. These were about four feet in diameter, and the height was proportional. Only the bases and some fragments remain, for the fire seems to have been highly destructive. It is evident that the palace was conof it has been destroyed.

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

The chiefs of the colony refused to believe Sagean's story. Nothing was done to find El Dorado, and Sagean dropped out of notice.
