

A Memory of Monchy-le-Preux and the Engagement of April 14th, 1917

> (By CAPT, LEO MURPHY) Wooing to sleep the gently waving trees; The hush'd bird slumbers on her dewy nest; Stars turn to gold the foam of azure seas.

Springtime in France! The mantle of Winter has been dropped and Summer is waiting with sunshine and warmth. The hillside stretches forth invitingly with its fresh green award and the early flowers uplift their petals to the new

And writing of flowers, one is reminded of the Rose of Jericho. At first, perhaps, it would seem like a bunch of withered roots, but plunged into warm water it expands-unfolds, and regains its former shape. Sometimes one thinks that our memories, too, are like the Roses of Jericho. They seem to be dead; but a sound—a thought warms their dried up fibres into a sudden renewal of life, and recreates, in all their freshness, hours of our past experiences.

One line may, like a friend who knows us well Re-open wounds whose smart is not forgot; The word that doth another's suffering tell May drop, like tears, on our own anguished spot Where hearts, misjudged, await their soothing spell."

And so, to-day, when we remember that it is the 14th of April, our thoughts flash back to that eventful date, seven years ago, when, in all the glory and vigour of their man-hood, a Battalion of Newfoundlanders went into action against a German Division and broke up an attack in which the former were hopelessly outnumbered, but where their excellent spirit of determination and sacrifice alone made such an event possible.

Seven years ago, on this morning, the Royal Newfoundland Regiment gave battle, and the fight raged unceasingly from the faint colour of the sunrise over the crest of the Hill West of Bois Vert until the advance line had been broken, the gallant little band shattered or surrounded and the enemy attack held up by the initiative of the headquarters

To-day—all over this Newfoundland of ours—in factory and mill, in office or mine, in mansion or fishing hamletthere will be many a solemn thought and silent prayer for the men who made this date memorable by their sacrifice, and, who, on the far-flung battle-fronts of Europe, united in one common brotherhood, forgot their personal interests, threw aside religious differences, trampled under foot political intrigues, and laid down their lives for the principles of liberty and the safety of civilization and Christianity. And of these gallant gentlemen, the memory of whose friendship we cherish, cannot we say, in all sincerity, in the beautiful words of the French poet, Leconte de Lisle:-

> Meurs donc, tu renaitras! L'esperance en est sure Mais qui rendras la vie et la flamme et la voix Au coeur qui s'est brise pour la dernier fois?'
