### Thrilling Race in Northland

REVILLION EMPLOYEES TAKE A WOUNDED YOUTH 750 MILES FOR AID—THREE WEEKS' DASH.

A two weeks race with death thro' the North Country is described by J. Berthe, an employee of Revillion Freres, who recently brought a young Scotchman, who had shattered his arm, from a fur station to hospital at Cochrane. At Rupert's House the assistant trader was a Scotch youth of 22 years who came to the North last year, he said to-day.

About a month ago while lifting a gun from the toboggan the assistant shot himself in the left arm, severely shattering the bone. First aid was rendered by friends at the post but when Mr. Berthe arrived here, four days after the accident, the young man's arm had swollen like a huge sausage and it was evident that if his life was to be saved he must be taken to a hospital as quickly as possible.

Fur-traders in the North must of necessity know something of surgery and Mr. Berthe began at once by removing between twenty and thirty splinters which had lodged in the flesh and which, if left, could cause gangrene. More than these he could not discover, but he was certain they were present and all hands set to work to have the patient rushed to hospital as speedily as possible. A special box was made on a sled, narrow so as not to extend over the toboggan trail and the wounded youth was placed in it and did not move from it for two weeks.

Fourteen dogs were used to haul the sled and every precaution was taken to make the journey as comfortable as possible. But in spite of the care taken, the sled, which was wider than the trail, banged against the trees at the portages, wrenching the sufferer's arm. By day the injured man suffered little—his arm was numb; but at night the pain grew intense and neither he nor those who cared for him could sleep. The gear of gangrene poisoning which would quickly spread from the left shoulder to the heart urged the party forward, and the only extra time taken was to dress the wound, a most difficult operation since it must be done in the cold like box.

199 Miles in Five Days. Rain made travelling difficult at first, but weather conditions were favorable after the party reached Moose Factory, and they made the trip of 168 miles from there to the railway line in the record time of five days.

It was exactly three weeks after the accident took place that the injured youth was placed in the hands of the doctor, who pronounced the wound in first class condition, and who proceeded to set the bone. Mr. Berthe, and those who made the trip with him, took the first opportunity to get much-needed sleep.

This adventure brought to an end a journey of 750 miles, most of which the fur trader accomplished on foot. He set out from Cape Dufferin, far up on Hudson Bay—Montreal Star.

As she had not made an appearance at 10 o'clock, a maid was sent to her room to call her. There was no reply to knocking on the door, and when the room was entered it was found to be empty.

A search party was at once organized, and the police were informed. A strange feature of the affair is that Mrs. MacLaren's mother-in-law lives at Armadale, a house situated on the Gareloch not far from Roseneath. Mrs. MacLaren did not, however, call upon her mother-in-law, but spent the afternoon and evening of the day of her arrival walking about the district.

When Mrs. MacLaren's room at the inn was entered, her luggage was found apparently intact. It was new, and attached to it was the label of a London hotel. Her purse, containing a considerable sum of money, and one or two articles of clothing were also discovered.

The Gareloch is a beautiful sheet of water situated in the midst of romantic scenery to the north of the Firth of Clyde. Part of the scene of Sir Walter Scott's "Heart of Midlothian" is laid here. In most parts the water reaches a considerable depth, and dragging operations would appear to be difficult, if not impossible, for this reason.

Bournemouth Case. Mrs. W. F. E. de B. MacLaren is the same woman as was sentenced to six months' imprisonment at Bournemouth last September for a series of thefts from shops, says the Daily Mail.

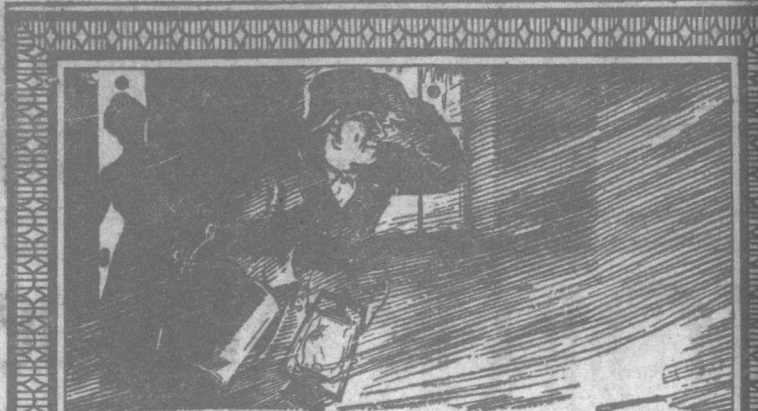
During the hearing of the case reference was made to previous convictions including one at the Hants Assizes in 1907, when she was sentenced for stealing jewellery. She stayed in Bournemouth last year and the year before, and on her last visit letters she received were addressed to Mrs. De Bois MacLaren, the name given in the Scottish deal notice. She was also known as "Buntz," a name which also appeared in the death notice, among her friends at Bournemouth.

At Roseneath, Dumbartonshire, from where Mrs. MacLaren disappeared, the belief is becoming strengthened that she has been drowned in the Gareloch, and that it was she who sent to the paper the advertisement announcing her death.

Process of Roasting Gives Kick to Coffee. German and Swiss scientists who have been investigating the effect of coffee, tea and cocoa on the human system have reached the conclusion that coffee and cocoa are stimulating chiefly because of the chemical changes brought about by roasting. Experiments were made upon both men and dogs to discover the effects of the three drinks which are commonly used throughout the world. These showed that tea was less exhilarating than coffee and cocoa.

Coffee from which the caffeine had been extracted also was tested, and men who had used this beverage without knowing the change made in it underwent the same stimulation enjoyed by those drinking ordinary coffee. They did not, however, have the increase in blood pressure which came to those who drank coffee from which the caffeine had not been extracted.

It was the conclusion of the investigators that the roasting of coffee and

### Missing Woman and Death Notice

STRANGE MYSTERY COMES TO LIGHT IN DUMBARNTONSHIRE.

MACLAREN—At Roseneath, Dumbartonshire, on February 25th, Buntz, wife of W. F. E. de B. MacLaren. No flowers, by special request.

Behind this announcement, which appeared in the Weekly Scotoman, lies what is at present an inscrutable mystery.

Not only it is uncertain whether Mrs. MacLaren is really dead, but the notice of her death was not sent to the newspaper by her husband or family, nor are they aware by whom it was forwarded.

Mrs. MacLaren, who belongs to a family well known on the Gareloch, arrived at Roseneath (about 25 miles from Glasgow), and booked a room at the Ferry Inn, telling the management that she would be staying until her husband arrived.

She went to bed early, leaving instructions that she was not to be called before breakfast at 9 o'clock in the morning.

As she had not made an appearance at 10 o'clock, a maid was sent to her room to call her. There was no reply to knocking on the door, and when the room was entered it was found to be empty.

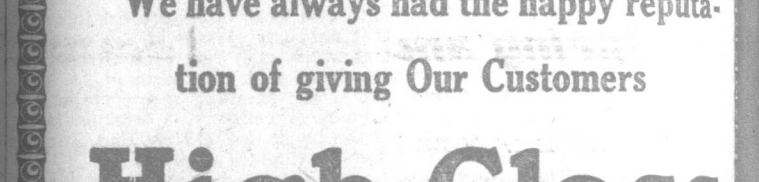

## The People of Greece Declare for a Republic

Trotsky Again Active--Labour Party in Denmark Secures Greatest Number of Seats--Germany May Apply For Admission to League of Nations.

**GREEK PEOPLE DECLARE FOR REPUBLIC.**  
ATHENS, April 13. The Greek people to-day voted for establishment of a Republic. The Government made it known this evening that a big majority in the plebiscite held throughout the country favored a Republic. The Greek National Assembly of March 25 passed a resolution in favor of the overthrow of the Glucksburg dynasty and the establishment of a Greek Republic. December last King George was forced to leave Greece by the Government pending decision of the National Assembly as to the form of government. He proceeded to Paris and later took up residence at Braso, Transylvania, where on April 8th he issued a proclamation to the Hellenic people, protesting against recent events in Greece and claiming the right to reign in accordance with the constitution of the country. The action of the National Assembly in overthrowing the dynasty was taken by unanimous vote, and in the celebration of the coming Republic, Athens displayed much enthusiasm, and preparations were begun immediately for holding the plebiscite upon which the Assembly based its decision. From the opening of the newly elected Assembly on January 1st last, there was a demand for a Greek Republic. The newspapers announce that martial law

will be proclaimed on Monday. This is probably for the purpose of preserving law and order. Voting in Athens and the towns was overwhelmingly for a Republic.

**GERMANY MAY ENTER LEAGUE.**  
GENEVA, April 13. The impression exists in League of Nations' circles here that the successful launching of the Reparations plans, based on the reports of the experts, will lead to early application by Germany for admission into the League, and Germany will favor the League as the medium for handling any project calculated to provide political security for France and Belgium and conversely for Germany herself. Germany is expected to insist on a seat in the Council of the League of Nations as a condition to her entrance into the League. The whole tenor of the atmosphere in Geneva is that the proposals of the experts will go far to stabilize Europe and constitute a big step toward return to normal conditions.

**GROUP GOVERNMENT IN DENMARK.**  
COPENHAGEN, April 13. Official returns from the parliamentary elections show that the Government party suffered defeat, the Laborites electing the largest number of members of any party to the Folketing. The House will be composed of 55 Laborites, 44 Liberals, 27 Conservatives, and 20 Independent Liberals.

**TROTSKY IN MOSCOW.**  
MOSCOW, April 13. Leon Trotsky, Soviet War Minister, who has been absent for a long period in the Caucasus because of ill health, returned to Moscow on Saturday. Before leaving the south eastern area he inspected the army of the Caucasus and took part in a party conference at Tiflis regarding the Bessarabian situation. He declared Russia was striving with all her means for a pacific settlement, but was by no means content to let the situation remain as at present. "We will never agree that Bessarabian workmen and peasants shall remain under the iron hand of the Rumanian nobles," he said in an interview. "We will not make war, and we will strive to avoid it by all means; this, however, does not mean that we agree to the present situation."

**TROTSKY DENOUNCES FRANCE.**  
MOSCOW, April 13. Speaking at a conference in Tiflis prior to his return to Moscow, Leon Trotsky, Soviet War Minister, said that Soviet Russia at the present

time was stronger than ever with regard to the Rumanian question. Trotsky declared Russia would maintain the policy of waiting. The door was open for an amicable settlement. However, he would not say that there never would be war. France, according to Trotsky, was playing a foul game in supporting Rumania and Poland against Russia, and in attempting to cause a break between Russia and Turkey. The Russian delegation, he said, would help to strengthen the position of the Labor Government in Great Britain by concluding a straight economic agreement with that country.

**RUM RUNNER'S CARGO SEIZED.**  
ST. JOHN, April 13. Seizure of more than 247 cases of Whiskey and gin, valued at over \$10,000, was made to-day off Mahogany Island by the Dominion Customs Officers in the patrol boat Ephia 1.

**TWO STRINGS TO HER BOW.**  
PHILADELPHIA, April 12. Wife of a carpenter in the day time and bride of a wealthy banker at night, Mrs. Anna Berwick to-day awaited hearing on charges of forswery, which, in an alleged confession, given out by the police, she said she was forced to commit to obtain money for blackmailers who had threatened to expose her dual life. Apparently Samuel E. Berwick, by whom she had eighteen children, nor William C. Martin, Vice-President of the Suburban Bank whom she declared

she had married last February, and from whom she said she had taken at least \$50,000 to pay for blackmailers' silence, who knew of her Jekyll-Hyde life. She said she had kept them in ignorance through various subterfuges. Martin married her, she said, in the belief that she had been divorced.

**SIXTY THOUSAND MINERS IDLE.**  
WASHINGTON, April 12. Sixty thousand miners were declared to-day, by John L. Lewis, President of the United Mine Workers, to be out of employment as the result of inability of the operators and mine union officials to reach an agreement on the basis of wage scale recently negotiated from the central competitive field.

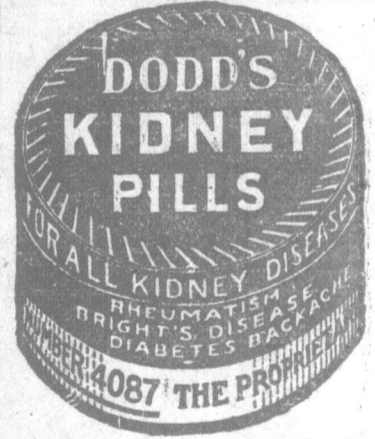
**POSTAL STRIKE NOT YET.**  
OTTAWA, April 12. There will not be a strike in the Postal Service on Monday. Leaders of the Canadian Federation of Postal Employees, to-day, informed the Government, that since willingness had been shown to deal with their salaries they would wait until sufficient time had been given for action. If action is not acceptable to the Service at large, the Postal leaders state that the strike order stands.

**DISORDERS IN DUBLIN.**  
DUBLIN, April 13. A gang of twenty armed men attacked a prison van en route to Mount Joy on Saturday afternoon. A running fight followed between the military escort and the attacking party, which was finally beaten off.

**CHECKING JAPANESE IMMIGRATION.**  
WASHINGTON, April 13. The Johnston Immigration Bill was passed on Saturday by the House of Representatives. The measure will practically bar the Japanese. It would fix a quota at two per cent based on the 1930 census, and would provide for examination of immigration overseas.

**Fads and Fashions.**  
Both blouses and frocks feature the chemisette front. Braids is often used to give the effect of embroidery. Fringes of ostrich feathers are seen on evening gowns. Skirts of talllours are noticeably shorter than dress skirts. Long scarfs of fluffy ostrich grace the evening mode. The latest version of the handkerchief frock is plaid. Rich embroidery in metal threads

is used on evening frocks in shades of rose. Both coats and frocks of cloth have scarf collars of crepe. Straight little jackets are worn over slim sleeveless frocks. Pockets have crept much higher on both jackets and frocks. The long crepe de chine scarf is lined with contrasting color. The silhouette remains uncompromisingly flat in the back. One's new hat pin may be a monogrammed affair of silver. Fringes finishes the scarf collar and cuffs of a novel sports coat. Sports frocks of plaid taffeta are worn with colored snude girdles. The buckle has replaced the button or string tie on the new coats. Crystal, bronze, or cut-steel buckles are used on small street hats. The French seem fond of combination of black straw and roses. from the broken pans. With the ship filled to the hatches, and 1,000 on deck, Capt. Bishop decided to discontinue the voyage, and bore up for home at 6:10 Saturday morning, a few miles off Canada Head. The ship made good progress out the Bay, and steered a course 5 miles outside of the Funks, after which open water was met with until port was reached.

The day being fine yesterday the trip up the shore was a pleasant one for all on board. The ship passed Cape Bonavista 5 o'clock yesterday morning and reached port in the hour stated.

Captain Bishop, who is looking quite well after all the hardships endured, states that the ice conditions were the worst experienced in his forty-two years at the seal fishery. The prevailing easterly winds packed the ice tight in White Bay, which played havoc with both ships and men. In the heavy swell last week, thousands of seals, panned by the respective ships were driven to the bottom by broken pans, or drifted away with the fast running ice. Had conditions been otherwise the chances of the steamers picking up their kill looked almost certain, and a more successful and profitable voyage would have followed. At first the outlook of getting any seals at all seemed most unlikely, stated the captain.

Capt. Bishop and the entire crew suffered no ill effects during their trying experience, and all feel thankful to be home again. Hearty congratulations are extended to Captain Bishop on being the first arrival and having a bumper trip of fat.

Mr. Wallace, the aeroplane mechanic, brought in a live harp seal which he intends to keep as a "curio." Yesterday afternoon a large gathering of interested spectators, who greeted the ship's home coming, viewed the seal, and listened to its heart breaking cries.

The crew are demanding \$5.00 per cwt. for their trip of fat, and it is not unlikely that any unloading will follow until the price asked is settled.

### Missionary Service at Wesley Church

The annual Missionary Services were held yesterday at Wesley Church and were largely attended. In the morning the Pastor preached a Missionary sermon dealing mostly with Japan and the progress made in fifty years of activity in that country. This is the Golden Jubilee year of Missions in Japan and naturally the fact claimed attention most of all. In the evening a platform meeting was held. Hon. R. Watson was the Chairman and prefaced his opening remarks by presenting greetings from the Women's Home Missionary Society of St. Thomas's Church to the Women's Auxiliary of Wesley, which was suitably acknowledged by the Pastor later on in the meeting and reciprocal greeting given to Mr. Watson to take back with him to St. Thomas's.

Mr. Watson said he had accepted the invitation to take the chair out of regard for the Rev. Mr. Joyce, who had been a warm friend of his for some years. He expressed the hope that his presence at Wesley Church, and that of his late Rector, Canon Earp, and of Canon Bolt, at the recent George Street Jubilee services, might in a humble way help to develop in our midst a spirit of Christian unity. He likened the definition of the Church given by St. Augustine and often quoted by Canon Earp: "Where the spirit of Our Lord Jesus Christ is, there is the Catholic Church." It required great faith on the part of missionary pioneers to confront the world's heathenism, with nothing but the Gospel in their hands, and to call upon it to surrender. That faith had been amply confirmed by the answer of time, and he would point to the beneficial social work being wrought by missions all over the world, such as the relief of sickness by medical missionaries, the enlightenment, elevation and education of native women, and the reduction of children's sufferings in pagan lands, as amply demonstrating the vital force of Christianity. By their attendance in such large numbers the congregation had shown that they were a live church and he congratulated the Pastor of Wesley Church on the missionary zeal of his people.

The report was given by the Pastor, Rev. J. G. Joyce, who showed the progress Wesley Church was making in Missions by comparing the givings in 1906 with those of 1923. The former was \$206.00 and the latter \$1440.00. The motto was success which meant increased givings for Missionary endeavour.

The address of the evening was delivered by Rev. Hammond Johnson of Gower Street. We shall not attempt to report it. We could not do justice to it with the limited time and space at our disposal. It was scholarly and instructive and dealt with Missions from an altogether different angle from which it is usually treated. Although not taking a text he called attention to a verse in Genesis which formed the basis of his remarks: "God created man in his own image, in His own image created He him." He dwelt on the need of Jesus for the service of humanity. Every man on Earth was created in the image of God and God needed him. Everything then that was Christianity was Missionary, and everything that was Missionary was Christianity. A telling point was the comparison of Newfoundland to-day with what she would have been if Christ had not come to our shores. No hospitals, no schools, no orphanages and taking China as a standard not one physician for our whole population. He closed a splendid oration with a fervent appeal to the people to do their best to help Jesus Christ claim all the people of the earth who were made in His image. He loves us, as much as He loves us in Newfoundland. A feature of the collection was a substantial offering by the Oblates present to be used in Missionary work in the land from which they came. The services were a decided success and quite up to expectations.

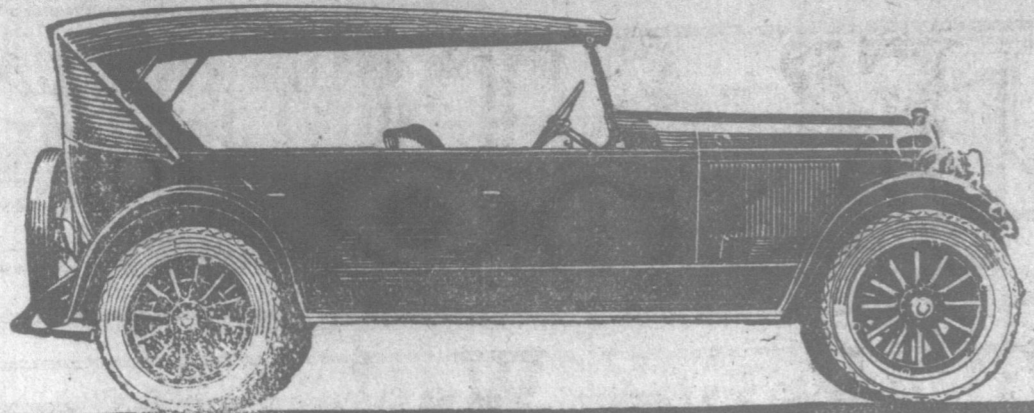

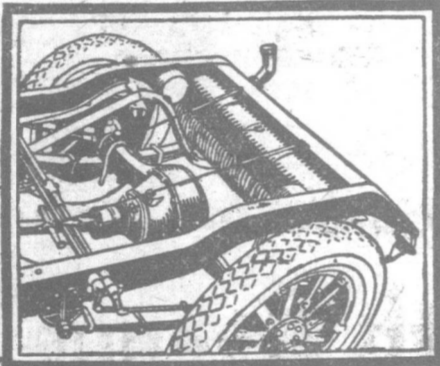
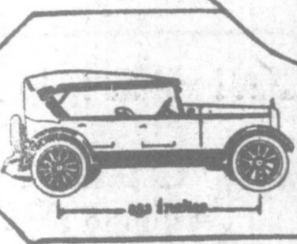

### Our Dumb Animals.

TWO ANSWERS — MISSING THE MARK IN EDUCATION.

When Mr. Angell was asked why he was so deeply interested in the protection of animals his reply was "because for ninety-nine who care for the welfare of suffering humanity there is only one who thinks of animals." Perhaps the answer to the same question made by another shows even a wider vision: "This work includes all the educational lines of reform which are needed to make a perfect circle of peace and goodwill about the earth."

Many an educator has never grasped this truth, has never seen how humane education strikes at the roots of humane character, has to do with that which right-guided leads to a life from which the things that separate and divide men and nations are eliminated. To think of humane education as primarily concerned with animals is to miss its deepest meaning. It is because so many educators have missed this meaning that they utterly fail to comprehend its significance. It is the child above all and what he is to be as a future citizen that is the primary concern of humane education.

He who determines the training of the child for the first years of childhood is, more than any other, the fashioner of the youth and manhood which are to follow. Interested always more in the animals about him than in his human kind, the child, awakened to the claims of these always more or less defenseless creatures for just and kindly treatment, comes soon to recognize these principles of justice and goodwill as those that should govern him in his relations to his human fellows. Those impulses to cruelty to man or animal which lead to strife, enmity, race prejudice, and war, like evil weeds in good soil, are stifled and die beneath the overshadowing growth of the finer and nobler impulses of the nature. And these are the elements of character that "are needed to make the perfect circle of peace and goodwill about the earth." These, too, are the forces that mean more for civilization in its highest sense than any

### Innocent Man's Ordeal

TWO AND A HALF YEARS' WAIT FOR MURDER TRIAL.

The long drawn out trial of Captain Mario Biselli, the artillery officer, who was accused of poisoning his father-in-law and attempting to poison his mother-in-law, ended at Bologna recently with a verdict of acquittal.

The jury were unanimous in finding that Captain Biselli had not caused the death of his father-in-law in August, 1921, by poison, nor had he attempted the life of his mother-in-law.

A special feature of this trial has been the violent animosity against Captain Biselli, shown not only by his mother-in-law, Signora Bini, but also by his young wife, with whom he was very much in love.

The attitude of the two women roused much unfavorable comment. Loud applause in court greeted the verdict, and Captain Biselli, who was at once set free, was accompanied to his hotel by a large crowd of sympathizers.

Captain Biselli has been in prison awaiting trial for the past two and a half years. He was arrested so long ago as in the week which saw—on August 24, 1921—the wreck of the steamship R35 over the Humber. His trial was begun in Florence last May, but it had to be suspended owing to the hostile attitude of the public towards his wife and mother-in-law.

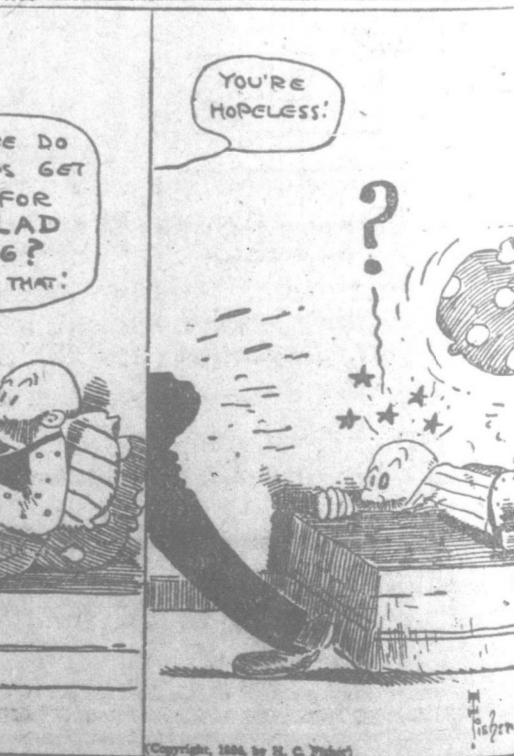

### Our Montreal Letter.

**HELP IN NIGHT FOR THE VERDUN SCHOOLS.**  
 There seems to be no help coming from the aid of the Verdun Protestant Board. At an informal meeting of Montreal Protestant Board of Commissioners, the Commission was unanimous in its opinion that the right notwithstanding "legislation" to spend the Montreal taxes in Verdun. The Provincial Government is not for the difficulty. In spite of Montreal and Westmount Boards to help them, Chairman J. Garth of the Verdun Board said, that he understood that the Protestant Board of Montreal and Westmount assist Verdun Schools in their district. At a stormy meeting held at the Verdun High School, Chairman said also: "If we run into for thousands more the Board keep the doors of the schools

open. Business as usual is our motto and the staff will be re-engaged." The history of the deficit and an account of the steps taken by the trustees to relieve it were given by H. L. Barnewall, member of the Verdun Board, who pointed out that, unless the Protestant Population of Montreal and Westmount gave temporary financial assistance the Board could not re-engage the teachers, and take on an added liability of \$80,000, which the staff would be in a position to sue for. They had not been able to meet their \$17,000 or \$18,000 bond interest in November and could not meet another payment due May 1st. If the bond-holders insisted on their rights they would probably have to close the schools. As a remedy he advocated a tenants' tax.  
 J. T. Howells suggested that the Trustees close the schools, give Premier Taschereau the keys and tell him "that it is up to him to face the responsibility in a manlike manner."  
 "What will the returned men think

when they find the very schools in their home-towns closed to them; and they have to move elsewhere to educate their children?" asked A. McLeod in presenting a resolution passed by the local branch of the G.W.V.A., imploring the Prime Minister of the Province "to take such action as will give equivalent opportunity to all children of the City of Verdun to be educated in fit and proper manner."  
 A communication received by the Trustees from the Hon. L. A. Taschereau, Prime Minister, was read, pointing out that the imposition of a "Tenants' Tax" for school purposes would drive people away from Verdun, and claiming that any pooling of taxes for the schooling of Protestants and Catholics was contrary to the B.N.A. Act.  
 The doctrine of "sweet reasonableness" and the necessity of Verdun Protestants proceeding in a more tactful manner and pocketing their pride to secure relief, was urged by Mayor J. A. A. Leclair, who attended the meeting at the request of the citizens. Passion had to be eliminated and the situation viewed with calmness. It was always easier to do a thing voluntarily than to have it forced upon you, and if Verdun, Montreal and Westmount were unwilling to comply with the suggestion of the Prime Minister that the former join forces with the latter for school purposes, they could just consider that they might have to do it any way.  
 He had a conversation with the Prime Minister who had said that he did not want to coerce Montreal and Westmount. Such a course was not desirable; but it would be a great calamity if the schools of Verdun were to be closed, and he was sure the situation could be settled amicably.  
 The next move by the School Board is anxiously awaited.

**KIWANIS TO BUILD HOSPITAL.**  
 The Kwanis, the men of "Go Ahead and Help Every Good Cause" fame, with the willing hearts and the willing hands, are to build a special hospital in connection with the Children's Memorial Hospital on Cedar Avenue. This hospital will be for the treatment of tubercular patients. It will be ready in seven weeks. The members of the Club, clad in overalls and rubber boots, will build it themselves at a cost of \$7,500; the money being subscribed by the members themselves. Each member was called upon to give his best effort in the work, not only financially, but to put forth his best in the way of "elbow grease."  
 Plans have been submitted and these contain notes of material which can be secured at cost. The building operations will be in charge of experts under which the members shall work. With the lengthening period of daylight the hopes of the committee are that the building will be finished within seven weeks.  
 It will be spacious enough to house

twenty patients. It will be a stucco structure over wood and beaver board and plastered inside, with a heating plant in the basement, water supply, hot water jacket heater, extra suite of rooms, surgical room, toilet and hardwood floors. Covered with an asbestos slate roof, it will have a guaranteed life of 20 years.  
 "The whole thing will be an architectural treat," said Douglas Bremner, "and work will commence next week."  
 Large verandahs will face the west and the south so that the little beds of the kiddie patients can be drawn from the dormitory to the south verandah in the morning and to the west in the afternoon. It will be literally "riddled" with windows. From the main roof of asbestos shingles an auxiliary roof will extend far out on the east side of the hospital so that the children will be able to enjoy the outdoors in rainy weather. A special room has been assigned for the children to play with toys and books.  
**GOOD QUALITIES IN YOUNG FOLKS.**  
 It would be well to study the good qualities in young folks before condemning them for certain faults. A writer says:  
 "To be modest, good-tempered, agreeable, teachable, and be able to hold your tongue—these are the things that make young people popular. And it is easy for you to possess these qualities. If your friends give in to your whims for the sake of peace, if they refuse even to argue with you, if you point if things do not go your way, and predict the failure of the plan, if you are always right and the other person always wrong, you may be certain you're not popular."  
 More than that, as you grow older and more set in your opinions, people will not tolerate you. You will drop behind in the great procession of life, and never be able to catch up. Study the lives and actions of the children you know, and remember that middle aged persons regard young men and women as children. When years have brought you experience and you have learned in the great book of life lessons far more important than any taught in school or college, you may look back to your youthful days and be thankful you were modest and sensible and did not think you knew everything.

ment is the home, and that it is the training, example and influence he receives there that will count most in his after life."  
 In his recent address before the Rotary Club the above vital expression of opinion was voted by Professor McKeerrow, of McGill University.  
 Modern conditions have done much indeed to change home training from the lines of years ago; the very largely increased number of places of amusement, coupled with decidedly changed housing conditions, are chiefly responsible for an order of things that the passing years and the advent of new customs have brought about. Possibly the most important factor that has contributed to the weakening of ideal home life has been the housing difficulty—which has become such a widespread problem of recent years.  
 A sign of the times is that there are landlords to-day who will not rent apartments to persons having

children, while the ordinary apartment certainly offers no great scope for model home training. It is of moment to note in this connection that an important company has recently been formed in Paris whose aim is to construct houses and apartments that will be peculiarly fitted to those having families. It is hoped that by methods such as these the dwindling birth rate of the great city will be checked, and that marriages will become more frequent owing to improvement in housing arrangements.

**AMATEUR BILLIARD CHAMPIONSHIP CONCLUDES.**

W. B. Skinner Acclaimed The New Champion.

The Amateur Billiard Tournament, to decide the championship of Newfoundland, came to a successful close on Saturday night last, and the final outcome, resulted in a new champion being acclaimed, in the person of Mr. W. B. Skinner, a prominent member of the B.I.S. Society. As already stated, Mr. R. C. Power held a comfortable lead of 53 points over his opponent on the first night's play, and when the aspirants for championship honors entered the fray on Saturday night to complete the 1,000 billiards, great interest was centered over the final outcome, a record attendance being on hand, including His Excellency the Governor and Capt. Goodfellow. From the very onset of Saturday night's play, Skinner set out with a desire to cut the lead of his opponent, and by heady play, and careful as to how he left the balls for his opponent, this was accomplished after 150 billiards had been played. Power, on the other hand, was showing a slight reverse of his previous night's form, and although he tried his hardest to maintain the lead which he secured from the beginning, the balls appeared to run dead against him, and was unable to set up the average run of breaks which were so cleverly executed on the previous night's performance. Going into the 700 mark the game took a sudden change, and found Skinner forging rapidly to the front with three splendid breaks of 50, 35 and 20. The billiards witnessed at this stage of the game was of a very high standard and the crowd took occasion to heartily applaud Skinner on his clever all round play. From then on the final issue was never in doubt. Skinner, playing with every confidence, gradually increased his lead and ended the game 123 points in advance of his opponent, thus winning the cham-

ship of Newfoundland. At the finish the new champion received a splendid ovation from the gathering, including a hearty hand-shake from His Excellency the Governor. Mr. Skinner's victory is indeed a most popular one. Throughout the tournament Skinner demonstrated to the spectators in attendance that he possessed a thorough knowledge of the game, and by persistent effort gradually worked his way to the front with flying colors and well deserved

the success he has achieved. To the runner-up, Mr. R. C. Power, a similar word of praise is due. Mr. Power's exhibition throughout the entire series showed that he was an excellent cue handler. A noteworthy feature in connection with Skinner's win is that he scored the highest break in the tournament; and is also credited with running off a game in the quickest time. The following are Saturday night's breaks:—

At the conclusion of the tournament, Rev. T. Nangle, on behalf of the billiard enthusiasts in the city, expressed his thanks to the Governor for the interest shown in the tournament. His Excellency had attended several of the games and stayed from beginning to end, thus giving the tournament every encouragement. Three cheers were called for and given with a will as was also the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow." His Excellency acknowledged the thanks rendered and the National Anthem brought the tournament to a close.

The competition for the prize-cue was continued after the regular games and as it was the last night many players tried their skill to beat the break of 28 made by Mr. W. Cooney on the first night of the series. For a long time it seemed that Mr. Cooney would be the victor until Mr. J. W. Allen came along, and when, after making 18, he took off his overcoat, the spectators realized that something big was going to happen. Mr. Allen continued until he had finished up having made 26, although he might have made more had he potted the "white" which was over the pocket. After this several others tried but the only one who looked as if he might defeat both was Mr. N. Snow, who made a break of 21. Mr. Allen was declared the winner of the prize-cue.

**THE IDEAL BREAKFAST TABLE.**

"Every day is a fresh beginning. Every morn is the world new made. So spite of old sorrow and older sinning. And trouble forecasted and possible pain. Take heart with the day and begin again."

Blessed be sleep. Not only for the sake of its deliciousness. 

### "Scrap it!"

Recently watched some hundred converts to the Salvation Army burning their "idols" in one of the streets of the city. Tobacco pipes, cigarettes, power-puffs, etc., were all thrown into a bonfire, where they vanished in smoke and flames.

Although this may seem a trifling matter for sober-minded folk, one wonders if it would not be a good fashion to encourage with a general now that the first of the spring-cleaning—heard in land.

With all due regard to the fervent wets of the Granite City, there things which tend to break up happy home almost as much as

cigarettes and cards. There are in our homes tons upon tons, thousands of tons, indeed, of what may be termed "rubbish."

Like a Jackdaw's Nest.

Unless the housewife is shiftless and pushes away all lumber into attics and odd corners, and literally draws a veil over it, these things have to be dusted, brushed, or washed, and then replaced at least once a year. There was a case in which an old-fashioned grand piano, together with other pieces of furniture, literally broke up a home. No one could play on the thing, which had succumbed to damp and age, and it took up a wicked amount of cubic feet; but there it stuck because it had been "dear grandma's," until the family split into rival camps on the question "to scrap or not to scrap."

Many of the things thus hoarded year after year are of so little value that the "lady" who so volubly assures you that she will give you a good price for any sort of old lumber stuffs scornfully at the specimens you produce.

The "gentleman" attached to her, who is in charge of the light trap at your gate, when called upon for an opinion, even hints darkly that it may be necessary to pay them a trifle to remove "the rubbish." But even if you do have to part with a leather

bag of the 1860 period for fourpence, a box of books for threepence, and a moth-eaten footstool, embroidered in wool by Aunt Matilda, for sixpence, you have at least rid yourself of them and their yearly "tiding." There is quite enough for the housewife to do without bothering with articles that are neither useful nor ornamental.

If you want the "seen" side of your face to be beautiful, make it so from the inside.



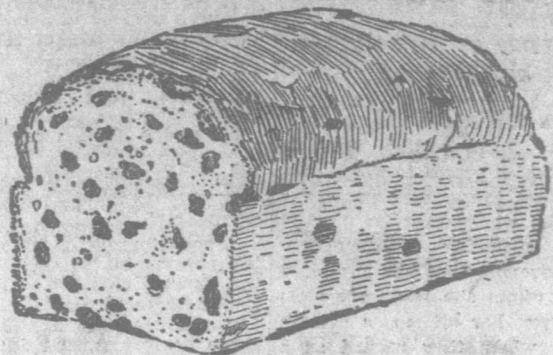










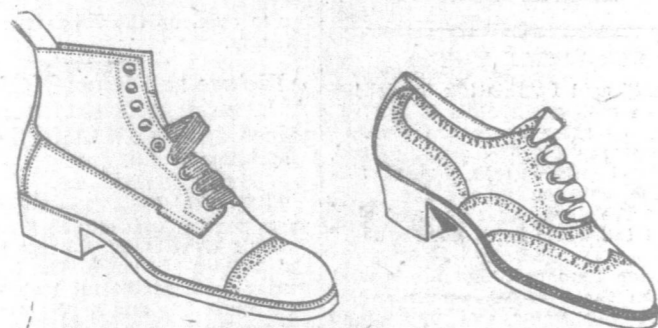
