Paris has again become the central point of attraction to all France, and we may say throughout the world. The recent discussions in the Assem bly, the differences in Thiers' Cabinet, and the excitement consequent thereon, have culminated in the resignation of President Thiers and his Ministry.

Last week a portion of the Assem-bly presented on interpellation, demanding the appointment of a Cabinet thoroughly Conservative. Another section of the Assembly on Saturday brought up a motion de-claring in effect that the complexion discussion, and rejecting the idea that the reconstruction of the Ministry did not afford Consumption westerday in a sleeping car, while on his way home from South Carolina.

A case of sunatroke occurred by the standard consumption of the Ministry did not afford Consumption of the M istry did not afford Conservative guarantees. This was adopted by a vote of 360 to 344. The result caused the wildest excitement, and the assembly adjourned till night, when the Mmistry announced that they had tendered their resignation, and immediately after President Thiers handed in his, which was promptly accepted. The Assembly without adjourning proceeded to elect his successor, when the choice fell on Marshall McMahon, the friends of the late Government abstaining from voting. McMahon was at once notified of his election, and accepted the trust reposed on him.

Throughout Saturday night, and all Sunday the excitement in Paris was intense, but there were no signs of disorder, and matters may settle down quietly. The new President promises to respect the laws and institutions of the country, to help in the work of liberating the territory and restoring order, and to maintain the tranquility so necessary in bringing France up to the status she formerly occupied. assembly adjourned till night,


