The Heraid's coarse attack off Mr. Elliott does not in any way help Mr. Coffee's case, whose management of the road and bridge work has been in the strongest and most pointed manner censured by the Council. It is not true, as the Heraid says, that the road and bridge work has been in a state of irretrievable confusion for years. The mode in which the work was done has often been the cause of complaint, but for years past the Chairman of the Committee for the time being was always able to give a proper and correct account as to how the money was being spent. This Mr. Coffee has tailed to do, and between him and the Inspector they have made such a muddle that no one can tell how the money has been expended.

The Heraid blames Mr. Elliott for being for a long series of years a consenting witness to what it makes believe a series of abuses, but we must bear in mind that this is only the third year Mr. Elliot has been in the Council, after having been out of it; for a number of years. How, at them, could he be cognizant of the doings of the Road and Bridge Committee, or why should he be saddled with a responsibility which does not belong to him? The Heraid tries to make the public believe that Mr. Elliott was simply the chairman of the Special Committee, and their report was sustained not only by the members of it, but by a majority of the Council, only four, including the Mayor, voting Against its adoption. It is not likely Mr. Elliott would be able to influence all these members were there not facts brought forward which could not be denied, and which were fully sustained by evidence. Why, when Mr. Coffee himself moved that the clause in the report, censuring him and the Inspector, should be struck out, not one of his frinds—not even the Mayor or Mr. Petrie—had the courage to second the motion, but hung their heads in shame and confusion. The Manitoba Penitentiary.

The Manitoba Penitentiary.

The Globe's Manitoba correspondent has the following about this Provincial Penitentiary:—The work in connection with this building is progressing rapidly under the contractors. It will be an imposing and substantial structure. It is located at Stoney Mountain, distant about sixteen miles from this city. The excavation for the basement is being hewn out of the soid rock The size of the wing now being built is 173 feet in length, 68 feet in breadth at one part and 44 at another, and 45½ feet in height. It consists of a basement, ground, first and second stories, and will be built of brick and stone. The rock at Stoney Mountain is so honey-combed that the contractors have to get their material tor dressed stone from the neighborhood of the Stone Fort. The original Plan of the penitentiary consists of a central tower with five wings, and the part now being erected is therefore only a sixth of the entire structure. The contract of Mesers. Barclay & Morrison is for \$185,000, so that the penitentiary when completed will cost something over \$800,000. The basement of the wing now building is arranged as follows:—A long corridor, four kitshens, warden's dining room laundry, store-room, wash rooms, fuel closets, boiler room for heating building, bath room closets, twelve female cells, and a well. The ground floor will consist of corridor, warden's parior, drawing room and office, clerks' office, deputy wardens' office, officers' mess, store rooms, and twenty cells. At the end there is a quard's room and loby leading to it. The first floor will be divided as follows:—Corridor, three warden's apartments, matron's sitting and tedroms, women's work-room, chapel, and twenty cells. The second floor consists of corridor, five spare rooms, ten ordinary and five punishment cells. The size of the ordinary cells is four by seven feet, and eight feet in height, and they are approached by means of a gallery. The penitentiary will be built chiefly of stone, brick and iron, and wood will be used to the work c


