PANIC MADE PERMANENT

Indications are not wanting to show that the reaction to the German Dreadnoughts has been anticipated. In the countenance of the British Lords is visible a gathering exasperation at the German move which now awakens him to panic almost every night with the cry of "Wolf!" If they persist in the practice of throwing him into needless alarm the inevitable result will be, either he will replace them with watchdogs who will not bark at flying straws or that he will sleep while they bark regardless of the cause or the cost.

The great Liberal Weekly, The London Nation, is a revolt against the foreign policy of the government, as the following excerpts from an article recently published under the caption "Panic Made Permanent," will show.

"The time has come when the Liberal Party must ask itself what aid it can render, by its own conscience and will, to the cause of European peace, to which the foreign policy of its leaders continues to gravitate. We will not ask why Mr. Churchill has been permitted, within a few weeks of a pointed and detailed statement of the relationships between the German and British fleets, to go over the same ground again with a more acute reference to the naval strengths of the two countries, a more direct suggestion of Germany's sole responsibility for the enormous forces we have collected and marshalled in the North Sea, and a new and fallacious suggestion of a close approximation of the two strengths in the near future. We should have thought that a Liberal Prime Minister, solicitous for a policy which we believe to be mistaken, but which all the world knows to be dangerous, would have taken care to present his material basis in as plain, as unpretentious, and unseasonal a form as possible. He has no reason to resent a request for precision in the statement of naval policy. His own treatment of the subject is much open to criticism. Three years ago he and Mr. McKenna created between them a 'critical period' in German shipbuilding. The period was 1912. The Prime Minister assured us that Germany was then likely to have 'seventeen Dreadnoughts. Mr. Haifour bettered this forecast by assigning her one or two squadrons more. Where are these seventeen, or twenty-one, or twenty-five Dreadnoughts today? They do not exist. We hold, instead of a precarious margin, a two to one superiority in Dreadnoughts, while we

Will be Two Months on the Road and Will Visit Nearly Every State in the Union

(By John Callan O'Laughlin.)—Washington, D. C., August 13.—Theodore Roosevelt is planning to make one of the most extensive and arduous political trips ever attempted by a candidate for the presidency. Beginning the first week in September he will go to St. Louis, thence through Iowa to St. Paul, and from St. Paul to the Pacific Coast over the northern route. From Portland, Ore., he will proceed to California, speaking before other points, at San Francisco and Los Angeles, and then return east after his Los Angeles visit, passing through Arizona and New Mexico. From Santa Fe he will travel north, addressing meetings in Colorado, and then will resume his eastward journey, covering speeches in Missouri, Kansas, Missouri and Arkansas. At Memphis he will speak before the Mississippi levee conference, and will then back to New York through Tennessee and North Carolina, Virginia, and Maryland.

South, Middle West, New York After a short rest, the colonel will make a trip through the southern states, visiting West Virginia, Kentucky, Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana and Texas. A third trip will include Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Iowa and Wisconsin. He will close the campaign by stopping New York.

In all the states he will be accompanied by two months on the road, and in that time will visit practically every state in the union. Before he starts west early in September this duty has been entrusted to the national committee in the several states, who have been requested to advise their suggestions to headquarters.

Central places, which are easily accessible to all in the neighborhood, are to be selected. It is desired to have as many people as possible so that he may be able to make explanations direct to the voters. His purpose is in stating him in again seeking the presidency and of the platform on which he is running.

Social Planks Important Mr. Roosevelt's attitude with respect to his speeches will be similar to that observed in the primaries. He will not fail to repeat what he already has said with respect to the various features of the Republican and Democratic parties; and both of the opposing candidates, it is expected, will be forced to make answer to his statements.

But of greater importance, in his judgment, the criticism will be the expression of his views on the various features of the platform. Of special interest, in the colonel's opinion, are the planks relating to social and industrial justice, and these will be discussed by him at length.

How to overcome the anticipated effect of the colonel's tour is the question the campaign managers of the president and Governor Wilson are sitting up nights to solve. To date there has been no modification of the decision that Mr. Taft shall not take the stump. In his place all the old war horses of the Republican party, led by Vice-President Sherman, are to enter the forum and abuse Col. Roosevelt and the Democratic candidate and platform.

Greatest Press Campaign In addition, the greatest press campaign the country has ever seen is to be launched. The president's policies, the achievements of his administration, and his refusal to sign Democratic and Progressive tariff bills will be praised. The methods by which Mr. Taft has been elected will be defended by competent speakers, and above all by booklets, hundreds of thousands of which are to be distributed. The president's tour, therefore, also will depend upon the Republican machines in various states to help the success of the electoral tickets.

President Taft, in the statements he will make, will refer to the election of candidates to congress and state legislatures about whose Republicanism there is no question. As the first move, he will send a letter soon to Congressman McKinley, as chairman of the congressional campaign committee.

Seeks Solid Foundation Col. Roosevelt will urge the election of Progressives who are candidates for state offices, and congress, not only to support him in his presidential election but to establish the Progressive party on a solid foundation. Governor Wilson will make no distinction between progressive and reactionary Democrats, but will appeal for the election of all running on Democratic tickets.

He says that it is not the scarcity of cars which is the source of the trouble, but the inadequacy of the elevators in handling the grain. An encouraging feature, however, he says, is that many of the grain growers are building small granaries, and it is hoped that in this way much loss will be prevented.

POISONING OF HAMILTON GIRL Baffles Police

Mysterious Death of Rose Zeipe Has Created a Sensation of Intense Interest

Girl Ate Four Candies Out of a Bag Which Was Left for Another Woman

HAMILTON, Aug. 18.—The police authorities admit that in the poisoning of Rose Zeipe they have an unusual mystery to unravel. The case has created a sensation in the city that bids fair to put in the class with other murder mysteries that have held the attention of the Hamilton people in the past, and the probability of it being solved early this week is not a foregone conclusion. The police admit they are completely at sea, although they are fully scrutinizing every aspect of the case that is worth investigating.

It was about 7 o'clock that the unfortunate girl ate four candies out of the paper bag which Mrs. Ada Bruce had left her by her husband, Rose Zeipe, earlier in the afternoon. One hour from that time Rose Zeipe was dead, and three companions, who had each eaten one or two of the candies, complained of feeling ill, but were restored without trouble.

The police say that Bruce admitted giving the chocolates to his wife, and that he had bought them at S. W. Shuter's, 244 York street. Bruce also admitted one of the detectives that he had seen one of the candies himself. Shuter, when questioned, did not recall having sold the candies to Bruce, but explained that his store was a busy place on Saturday, and unless he had some particular reason to remember the purchase he would not be able to throw any light on the transaction. The police intend to have Shuter help to the cells to see Bruce. The authorities, who are working on the case, say they believe Rose Zeipe died of strychnine poisoning, as the symptoms strongly pointed to that.

Organs Being Analyzed The internal organs of the victim have been forwarded to the government analyst at Toronto, and the police are waiting for the report to be received. The jury empaneled by Dr. Rennie met at noon today, with Robert B. Spens as foreman. Mr. Spens, by way, was the foreman of the coroner's jury which investigated the Kinrade murder mystery. There was nothing to do but to view the remains and adjourn until August 29.

Bruce is reported to have spent a comfortable night in the cell. He is being held on the pending charge of vagrancy, and this afternoon sent for Charles W. Bell, a local

lawyer, who will look after his interests. The activities of the police today were confined to an effort to trace purchases that have been made of strychnine, which will be followed up and thoroughly investigated.

Mrs. Bruce was seriously ill after the terrible events of last night, but the hospital people say she is recovering all right. One of her sisters today stated that she had eaten one of the candies out of the bag which Rose Zeipe and the other girls were there. Mrs. Bruce admitted last night that she had eaten one of the candies in the afternoon after her husband left them, but she spat that one out as it was rather bitter. The candies are in the possession of the crown and will be forwarded to Toronto to be analyzed.
