WIMAN MAY PLEAD GUILTY.

SUCH IS THE FIRM BELIEF OF THE PROSECUTION.

"It Has Come at Last," He Said When Arrested and Cried Bitterly When Leaving General Tracy—An Alleged Confession in Possession of Mr. Dan Dun.

New York, Feb. 22.—Gen. B. F. Tracy said to-night that he had been busy all day looking over the indictments and examining the papers relating to the charges made by Mr. Dan against Mr. Wiman, and that to-morrow he would advise his wife to have him released on bail. Mr. Wiman promises to speak when his "turn comes," and it is said that he will give a full and color to the story of his alleged forgeries. He contends that he has committed no crime, but only did what he considered he had a right to do in the course of his business relations with the mercantile agency.

Ernest Wiman passed a restless time in the Tombs last night. Mr. Wiman's cell is No. 3 in historical Murderers' Row. He passed a restless night, pacing the floor of his contracted quarters the greater part of the time. In anticipation of calls from friends the keepers kept the cell door open till midnight, but no one came, and after that hour the prisoner was locked in. The keepers think he dozed off for a minute or two, but at best it was for a very little while, and he heard his regular regular footfall for company throughout the greater part of the night. The prisoner was up and starting early this morning. At 8:30 o'clock his breakfast was served in his cell. In spite of his apparent restlessness the prisoner brightened up with daylight and he appeared to take a certain amount of his breakfast. After the meal a reporter came asking for his version of the circumstances which led to his arrest on the charges of forgery. He declined to see any reporter, however, and sent out the statement of the circumstances of the case would naturally warrant. When his father was taken to the Tombs last night his personal effects were usually taken from him. Among these was a bunch of keys. These were turned over to the son by the warden, and after conferring on Mr. Wiman's cell to identify a certain brass key in the lot, to which Mr. Wiman had evidently referred, the visitors returned to the Tombs. It was brought home to those who happened to be immediately conversant with the case by the sight of those little folders that the Board of Education scatters broadcast throughout the city advertising the courses and subjects of their course of free lectures for the people. In the last of these folders, which were scattered about the Tombs last night at Grammar School No. 27 on the "Great North Land," a subject which, as the circular points out, he was very well acquainted with.

It is said that Wiman is having considerable difficulty to procure bail, and that last night he told a friend that he had been arrested and wanted him to go bail, the friend said, "Have you been arrested for that?" Wiman said "Yes." This seems to indicate that he expected trouble. Wiman's demeanor was shown in an incident which on his way to the district attorney's office. As he passed Franklin's statue in Printing House Square, he exclaimed, "I gave 100 toward that statue. I wish I had it in my pocket now."

The complaint containing the charges against Erastus Wiman drawn up by former District Attorney Delaney Nicoll and forwarded to District Attorney Fellows, who had it in his possession for some days. Attached to the complaint was a letter written by Mr. W. G. Dun. This is said to contain the substance of the consideration and according to officials of the District Attorney's office is more than a partial confession on the part of Wiman. This letter, however, mysteriously disappeared after Wiman's arraignment before Judge Martine, and is now in the possession of the District Attorney, who refuses to make it public. It is said that this will be made one of the strongest points in the court inquiry.

In regard to this letter Gen. Tracy was very reticent. He said that the business relations between his client and the man, who had formerly been very close, and that while he had not seen the letter in question, he believed there was no ground for concern in regard to its contents.

The witnesses before the grand jury were the same men as those named in the letter of complaint to District Attorney Fellows. The nature of the proof that was offered through them must have been very strong, as the jury did not give over an hour's consideration to the case. The warrants were put into the hands of the District Attorney, who had formerly been very close, and that while he had not seen the letter in question, he believed there was no ground for concern in regard to its contents.

Mr. Wiman's cell was a narrow one on the first tier of the prison and he was taken to the ground floor and a larger cell given him, which pleased him greatly. "Warden," he said, "I heard a week ago that I was to be arrested, and some of my friends advised me to run away. 'No,' I said to those who gave me the advice, 'I'll stay right here and face my accusation that might be brought against me. If I'm guilty I want to be punished, but I assure you, Warden, that I have never committed a dishonest transaction in my life, and time will show that I'm perfectly innocent of this charge.'

De Lauey Nicoll, counsel for R. G. Dun & Co., who prepared and submitted to the grand jury the statement of Mr. Wiman's wrongdoing, said last night at his house: "The case is a plain open-and-shut one. Why, I even heard that Wiman had made a confession. The matter is in the hands of the district attorney now, of course, and I am the counsel for R. G. Dun & Co. I wrote the letter to District Attorney Fellows."

"On gathering the whole story of Wiman's betrayal of his trust and confidence," Mr. Dun said, "the whole matter before me on January last. I advised him that his duty to the mercantile world, with which he is so well acquainted, was to submit to Wiman's conduct to the authorities, and that he ought not from motives of humanity to allow a man to go on committing a crime which is so manifestly and so grossly an honest but unfortunate man."

"Out of the many forgeries," larcenies committed by Wiman the District Attorney has selected two for prosecution, although he might have taken many more. Two will answer the purpose as well as a hundred. There is no use multiplying the number of charges against a man. The two that

LOOKS LIKE GERRYMANDER.

MR. WOOD'S MOTION IN THE HOUSE YESTERDAY.

Application for a Return of the Federal Census for the Province Leads Mr. Meredith to the Conclusion That a Gerry-mander is Contemplated—Natural Gas Local.

Thomas Mathieson, whose arrest for the wholesale swindling of citizens by forged bills and checks was fully detailed yesterday, was arraigned before the Police Magistrate yesterday and pleaded guilty to three charges of obtaining \$100 from Samuel Alcorn, \$10 from Mrs. Elizabeth Cawthra and attempting to secure \$100 from Rabbi Lazarus. He was remanded for sentence.

Mathieson, who was a member of the Y.M.C.A. and a teacher in the West. Presbyterian Sabbath School, was released from Central Prison in October, 1910, after serving a two-year sentence for playing the same game in Perth.

At her home, 910 King-street west, Mrs. Anne Mathieson, wife of the confessed swindler, who is now in the jail, said that her husband's fraud has not been told her and she firmly believes in his innocence.
