The late Mrs. Flizabeth McKeown Bryce, 4th line, Warwick, whose death occurred on Sunday, Oct. 7th, in her 81st year, was one of Warwick's pioneer set-tlers having resided on the farm where she ind for eight for ware died for sixty-five years. On April 12th, 1848, she was married to Robert Bryce by the Rev. Robert Hardy. Watford was then unknown, and Warwick was a dense bush, with an occasional clearing where a bush, with an occasional clearing where a settler had made his home. Sarnia and London were the nearest market points, and the settlers made the trip through the bush with ox teams to barter their produce, money being practically un-known. This trip would sometimes take a week. Gardner's Mill and Kilworth week. Gardner's Mill and Kilworth were the nearest milling points, and Mr. Bryce and the neighbors frequently car-ried bags of wheat to the mill on their backs, returning with the flour. Mrs. Bryce shared all the hardships and priva-tions of early life in Warwick and was a faithful helpmate to her husband, and a neighbor who considered no sacrifice too great to make and whose services were freely given in aiding and comtorting those in need or trouble. Her door was ever open to the needy and none were sent away without receiving her kindly hospitality. Her genial and whole souled disposition will long be remembered by those with whom she was associated dur-ing her long and useful life. Mr. Bryce died fourteen years ago.

Mr. Bryce died fonrteen years ago. Mrs. Bryce was the mother of 13 children, 12 living to be married, and five pre-de-ceased her. The surviving members of the family are John R., of Warwick; Robert, of Brooke; Mrs. Robert Fleming, of Warwick; Mrs. Gideon Morrow, of Michugan; Mrs. Christopher Willoughby, Oil Springs; Mrs. Duncan Ward, Oil Oil Springs; Mrs. Duncan Ward, Oil Springs; Mrs. Thos. Kerr, at home. Among her numerous descendants she was affectionately known as "Grandma' Bryce, So grandchildren and 35 great-grandchildren comprised the third and fourth generations.

Apple Butter.

Take about one and one-half bushels of apples. Boil the cider down the day be-fore making the apple butter. Early, next morning heat the cider, pare apples, put into the cider and boil nearly all day ; stir constantly. It does not require sugar. A few sticks of cinnamon improves it. This receipe will give about five gal-lons of apple butter.

Goderich Will Vote on it.

The Goderich correspondent of the London Free Press has the following concerning an industrial proposition which was recently presented for the consider-

ation of the Watford Board of Trade : "A special meeting was held Tuesday morning and a by-law prepared in accor-dance with the proposition of the pro-moters of the Goderich Wheeled Kigs Company, who propose to place in God-erich a plant valued at \$150,000 for the manufacture of small wheeled rigs, baby

manufacture of small wheeled rigs, baby carriages, etc. The by-law is being prepared to-day by the town solicitor, and a representative of the company, and will be approved by another special meeting of the council this evening. This plant is under the name of the Lloyd Manufacturing Com-nany Mineapolis Minn and will empany, Minneapolis, Minn., and will em-ploy at the end of the year about one hundred hands.

They ask a \$50,000 loan from the town, They ask a \$50,000 foat from the town, repayable in annual payments without in-terest, and also free site, exemption from taxation, except school taxes, for a term of years. Practically the only com-petition in the manufacture of this class of goods in Canada is by the Gendron Manufacturing Company, of Toronto. Mr. Thompson is the gentleman represent-ing the American interests here, and the ing the American interests here, and the board of trade and council have expressed themselves in favor of the scheme, though the latter body made Mr. Thompson un-dergo a strenuous cross-questioning this morning before concluding arrangements were made.

The company have special and very valuable machinery, which is covered by world-wide patents, of which the new concern is to take advantage, and will con-struct no other plant in this country."

The Buffalo Express expresses the prevalent feeling in the United States of cool contempt toward the Newfound-land Legislature. Men like Archbishop Howley describes it as "hot heads," in urging that the local laws of 1905, "which the modus vivendi suspends for the time being and which are objectionable to American fishing interests, be strictly enforced." The Buffalo Express continues : American fishing interesst be strictly energetic in making Newfoundland accept the situation. So long as that document (the modus vivendi) exists, the United States has the right to protect its fishermen even to the sending of a warship to the Newfoundland coast.

And the British Government would have no other course than to sustain the action of our Government."







OBESITY A DISEASE.

It is Not, as a Rule, the Result of Laziness or Gluttony. It is a mistake and an injustice to many abstemious folk to assume that all fat persons are gluttons or large eaters. Very many excessively corpulent people, especially women, are small eaters, while some of the most doughty trenchermen are gaunt and

thin It is not the quantity so much as the quality of the food one eats which determines the putting on of flesh. Yet It is not always the kind of food that makes the obese, for some stout people eat very sparingly of sugars and starches, while there are large consumers of sweets who never put on flesh. In such cases it is a question of constitution, often of heredity and not at all, or very little, one of diet.

Another prevalent error in regard to fat people is that they are inert or lazy and never exercise. Of course exercise does increase the processes of nutrition and so leads to the burning up of superfluous fat, but at the same time it causes an increase in the appetite and thus tempts to the consumption of a greater quantity of food. So one thing balances the other, and want of exercise alone is not a very potent cause of obesity. Many very fat persons are, it is true, sluggish, but they have become so since putting on their flesh, for it makes a great difference whether one carries 150 pounds about when one walks or whether it is necessary to propel half as much again or even double the weight. It is a tremendous handicap, and there is small wonder that the lightweights do the most exercising. Obesity, indeed, is usually a disease

and not merely the result of laziness or gluttony. Its cause lies deep down in the animal economy, in among those mysterious chemical changes by which the food we take into the mouth is converted into blood and bones and muscles, skin, hair and brain cells. It can often be warded off by a proper diet and mode of living, especially if taken in hand from the very first and not allowed to get the upper hand, but the tendency to stoutness will gener ally persist through life and can only be modified, but never removed.

Any treatment for the radical removal of flesh should be carried out under the advice of a physician, as violent measures directed to this end may be productive of terrible harm to the constitution.



Few of the second crop of Toronto lawyers give evidence of high class ability, and clients will have to depend more largely on the provincial barristers, who are fully the equal of the present Toronto contingent in legal knowledge and skill as pleaders.

There was a time when Canadians could with considerable pride and satisfaction contrast their commercial methods and morals with our neighbors to the disadvantage of the latter. Any undue conceit developed by this comparison has been effectively eliminated by recent disclosures. In graft, peculation, political trickery, and frenzied finance we have nothing to learn, in fact some of our experts are qualified to give a post graduate course in their specialties. There will be an outcry for cleaner methods, a demand for radical reforms followed by the usual apathy, and back to the old games again.

Our legislators and cabinet ministers display wonderful energy and enthusias u in any matter that pertains to an increase in their incomes, but when it comes to remedying a long standing grievance of outsiders that is another matter. The scale of fees paid court officials, witnesses, etc., in the preparation and service of legal papers and giving testimony is absurdly inadequate to the present conditions. Probably they may have, been reasonable, when first adopted half a century ago, but there have been many changes in that time, and it is now up to the government to adjust matters on modern lines. The Attorney-General is said to have a law reform measure under consideration, and this is a matter he might well take prompt measures to

At the head of the party was the "commander," or "bearer of the seal of the god," the pharaoh. The official staff consisted of "masters of the house of metals," or assayers, scribes and secretaries, to make inventories of the output of the mines. Even more modern were the "devisers of metals," or prospectors. The working staff con-sisted of miners and their assistants. The commissariat had cooks, bread bakers, water carriers and even a doctor attached. The mines could only be worked for a certain period, from January to May, which is exactly the best period for archaeological work in Sinai today. The miners lived in camps, and the so called forts and camps were really miners' villages.

LONG WALK IN OFFICE. Average Business Man Covers Vast Territory In a Year.

"If I had a cent for every mile I walk during office hours every day I'd soon be able to retire," is a remark frequently heard from men and women who are kept on their feet while

at business. The general impression is that the distance traveled dally is very great. And so it may be. But the simple experiment of carrying a pedome ter for a few weeks will probably show that one's income at a cent a mile would not be worth collecting un-

til the end of a year. A downtown office man has just fin ished an experiment of this nature. He carried a pedometer six weeks, regis tering its total each night. At the end of that time it was found that the distance traveled, though varying greatly from day to day, came to a fairly even average at the end of each week. How many miles do you suppose he

walked on the day of his highest rec-ord? Twenty? Thirty? Fifty? No, only nine miles. The lowest record came the very next day and was a mile and a half. But the average for each week was thirty-three and onethird miles, or an average of six and a

half miles for each working day. The six weeks showed totals as follows: 39½, 27½, 37, 34, 32½, 30, or an aggre gate of 200 miles and a half mile over At the end of six weeks, therefore, he would have collected \$2 at a cent a mile.

In the course of a year this office traveling represents an impressive walking tour, with its total of 1.733 miles. If made as a continuous trip across country it would take him from New York to Bismarck, N. D., or to Galveston, Tex.



Canada's Great Transport Line at Jamestown Exposition.


Jamestown Exposition. Norfolk, Va,—Among the interesting transportation exhibits at the Jamestown Exposition, to be held on the shores of Hampton Roads near Norfolk, in 1907,-will be that of the Grand Trunk Rail-way, the pioneer road of Canada and the only double track system of that country. Not only is this road to participate in the transportation display at the Ter-Centen-nial, but they will have a special building to house their extensive exhibit. Ithough the headquarters of this im-mense system is located in Canada, the company intend to have a display second to noné, and with this in view, they will erect a handsome building in a central location of the exposition grounds.

The decision of the exposition grounds. The decision of the company to partici-pate in the Exposition makes them the second Trunk Line to determine upon such a course, the Southern Railway hav-ing decided to display a splendid exhibit of the varied resources along its thousand of wiles of track. The Beitimore and of miles of track. The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad are considering an exhibit in engine construction, the plan being to give a graphic illustration of the progress made in this line of industry, by exhibitmade in this line of industry, by exhibit-ing the first engine ever used by the B. & O. alongside of one of their present-day nonsters.

The exhibit of the Grand Trunk Rail-road will be unique in that it will contain enlarged pictures of the summer resorts, along their tracks, beautifully executed by noted artists, which in themselves will by noted artists, which in themselves will be works of art, specimens of fish, game and other products so abundant in the regions through which the system passes will all be displayed. The feature of the display, however, will be the mineral exhibit. One from the great mines at "Cobalt," and "Ontario," called the "New Silverdale" on account of its great wealth of ore, will be made. This mine was opened last year and is considered one of the richest silver fields in the world.
